Glamour girls, heroes and villains from Hollywood will make their first appearance before a movie-hungry crowd when motion pictures are shown on the Center Bowl "silver screen" soon.

The parts required on the projector are scheduled to arrive here on Friday, it was announced by the Center Council.

NISEI ASKED TO VOLUNTEER FOR ARMY INTELLIGENCE CORPS

Young men of draftable age who are versed in the Japanese language are being given a wonderful opportunity to serve their country by volunteering for the Army Intelligence Corps.

A recent visit of Colonel Rasmussen to this Center revealed the importance of the nisei's support and the procedure for enlistment. The Army needs men who have studied the Japanese language to work as interpreters, translators and teachers.

Young men who are able to read hirakana, katakana and between 250 to 400 kanji are eligible to volunteer. Candidates will be given a six months course at a training school in Minnesota. After completion they will be given a rating according to their efficiency but it is a type of work which is not only interesting but with a promising future.

It is disclosed that sooner or later all young men of draftable age will be inducted into the Army. This is an opportunity for those interested to join up in a division where they may be best fitted.

The school in Minnesota today has several hundred nisei doing a commendable piece of work as their contribution toward the war effort. So far the kibe nisei have been outstanding in the field, but more are being sought by the U. S. Army.

It is interesting to note the number of nisei who have already applied for the service at the various Centers. Interested nisei here are asked to contact Center Manager E. P. Pulliam for further information.

MUSIC LOVERS INCREASE

A few weeks ago a group of music lovers started the music appreciation hour. Recordings of well-known composers, such as Schubert, Strauss, and Tchaikovsky, were played. Interest was so keen that the group decided to continue the program.

If attendance is any indication, the growing number of listeners attests the mounting interest among the young people of this Center.

Appropriately fitted for the occasion of the Service Division celebration, we honor the members of the hospital staff numbering close to 100 people who serve diligently and are on duty twenty four hours a day. The staff is divided into two groups: the professional and administrative system.

Under the professional group, there are doctors, nurses, pharmacists, the laboratory technicians, diet kitchen and formula staff and the sanitation corp.

The administrative division has hospital management, clerical, orderly, ambulance and milk formula delivery boys.

There are three capable doctors who are serving to their utmost for the benefit of the welfare and health of the residents of this Center. We salute Doctors Hashiba, Taira and Koda. Hospital 1, headed by Dr. Koda is chiefly for confinement of patients with communicable diseases and inoculation of diphtheria toxin, vaccination for small pox, whooping cough and typhoid injections to prevent disease growth.

Hospital 2 is headed by Dr. Taira and the duty there is for general and special obstetric cases and minor surgeries such as tonsilectomy and stitches. Eye clinics are also held there.

Hospital 3 is headed by Dr. Hashiba, chief of staff, and most of the difficult diagnostic cases and chest clinics are held there. The treatment of diseases and extensive clinic services are held in each hospital.

In the dental division, Dr. T. T. Yatabe heads the department. His staff includes Dr. T. Inada and Dr. I. Saito in the dental clinic. Assistants are James Nagatani and Mrs. Yatabe. Dr. Yatabe has a complete set of dental (Cont'd on pg. 5 col. 3)

unit installed in Hospital 2 to offer maximum service to the patients. All fillings, treatments and extractions are done in his office now with the exception of bridge work.

Registered nurses who are offering their kind and courteous service to the patients are Tamiye Matsuda, Fusaye Yamataka and Mary Miyamoto. Under them, there are five trained nurses and approximately thirty aides.

In the diet kitchen where all the meals and patients' necessities are prepared, we find Louise Iwamura. Karl Nagata is the manager of the hospital and administrative department, there are Kiyo Hase and Momoyo Koga, both licensed technicians. The sanitation corps is headed by Lewis Toshiyuki and Walter Isei Kawai is the top ranking clerk.

More than 70 formulas for the Center's babies are prepared and delivered five times daily by the messengers. This doorway delivery service is a task to be appreciated by the residents with babies. Pharmacists who prepare prescription and analyze medicine for the Center are Michio Toshiyuki, Tom Arase and Fred Koyama.
