ELECTION SCHEDULED FOR TONIGHT MOVIES TO START TOMORROW NIGHT

DURBIN PICTURE, 'IT STARTED WITH EVE' TO BE FIRST FILM

"It Started With Eve" starring Deanna Durbin will probably be the 1st motion picture to be screened at the Center Bowl from 8 p.m. Thursday.

Each person is requested to bring his Mess card since it will serve as the admission ticket. Those with white cards will be permitted to see the show on Thursday, those with blue tickets on Friday while residents with pink mess cards are to attend the movies on Saturday.

The show, which will last two hours, will include animated cartoons and educational short subjects.

Passing of Mess tickets by a person of one mess hall to that of another will be allowed.

Arthur Fukuda is the theater manager while Sam Shinagawa and Bob Yoshikawa are the projectionists.

RESIDENTS TO VOTE IN MESS HALLS

With 32 candidates nominated approximately 3700 residents, both issei and nisei who are 16 years and older, are expected to go to their respective mess halls tonight between the hours 7 and 9:30 o'clock for the purpose of electing 21 persons to the Center Advisory Panel.

Voting will be by the secret ballot and each voter must present his mess card at his respective mess hall in order to vote. Two clerks and one judge will be assigned to each voting booth to check on the voters.

Center Manager E. P. Pulliam will select seven members from this panel of 21 to form the Center executive committee.

TEN ISSEI, 22 NISEI MAKE UP NOMINEES

Ten issei and 22 nisei, including a minister, Salvation Army Major, chemist, reporter and a club manager are among the 32 candidates who were nominated for tonight's election.

Agriculture is represented by 11 nominees while a varied range of occupations form the backgrounds for the rest of the candidates.

Fresno has the most nominees with 15 while Florin and Dolano come next with

Sacramento County voters should contact Hugh Kiino, K-16-1.

If ballots are not cast in either the primary or general election, voters' registration will be automatically cancelled.

IDENTIFICATION NEEDED TO GET REGISTERED MAIL

Any person receiving a notice that he has registered mail at the Post Office must identify himself in order to receive the letter, according to Center Postmaster C. N. Johnson.

Identification may consist of Alien Registration cards, driver's license, Selective Service card or birth certificates.

EDITORIALS

SUPPORT YOUR CANDIDATES AT NEW PANEL ELECTION TONIGHT

By an order of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, the Center general election will be conducted tonight to select persons to represent the community in the permanent Advisory Panel. Observing that both in number of nominees on the ballot, it appears that both issei and nisei are actively participating and are deeply interested for an efficient self-government. It also evidences that the first and second generation are adequately represented on the ballot.

From the list of 32 candidates, the people will elect 21 members to the panel while from this list the Center Manager will later select seven persons, two issei and five nisei, to serve on the Executive Committee.

Tonight's election is unique for the issei in that they are entitled to their franchise. It is democratic in that all persons, 18 years of over, will be given equal voice in electing the members whom they see most fit to serve on the Center Panel.

In choosing our leaders let us use wise discretion. Let us select people who are competent and capable and who will look after the best interests of this community. Let us all go to our respective mess halls and exercise our privileges as voters.

EXCHANGE EDITORIAL: SARCASM

A Webster's dictionary defines the word sarcasm as a satirical expression.

Sarcasm has its place and its time. However, we emphasize the fact that abusive words are being overused to a large extent. Such usage of profanity is not all habitual; but rather an act of negligence. Most of us do not realize that we are making usage of sarcasm all together too often.

In a larger sense, we do not denounce the usage of sarcasm when in use at the proper time and place. We do, however, attack the fluent usage of abusive terms, especially when the occasion does not necessitate it. We must face the facts that lie before us regarding children. We realize in the truth that the younger children acquire knowledge of such vulgar language through continual repetition on our part. Younger children are like that. They love to repeat sayings of elders.

We can and we must refrain ourselves from using profane words so fluently. We can and we must endeavor to save the younger children from future regret and disgrace. We can and we will do this little bit for the young men and women of tomorrow. Sarcasm has its place and its time; but not here.

FRIDAY NIGHTS' SHOW RATED MOST HUMOROUS

If laughter was the criterion for judging the success of an entertainment program, Friday night's Service Division show in humanity-jammed Center Bowl would be rated the best ever presented here.

The rib-tickling "Revue for you" musical was well backed in the way of laughs by the department's various skits and other staged variety acts.

If any **Revue number** had to be singled out for a major blue ribbon, it would be the "Take Me" night club scene routine in which director player **Yutchi Kamikawa** stole the show with his "Carmen Miranda" burlesque.
