## DIMOUT ORDER AFFECTS CENTER

### NIGHT EVENTS TO GO ON

Arrangements are being made so all night activities can continue here without interruption despite the dimout rulings.

Special reflectors will be installed to make basketball games and Center Bowl programs permissible. Roofing will be placed over the sumo, judo and boxing rings to comply with Army regulations.

### NEW DEWITT RULING BANS BRIGHT LIGHTS

#### MOVE IS COAST WIDE

General DeWitt's dimout regulations for the Pacific Coast were felt by the Fresno Assembly Center's residents Wednesday night as all night activities requiring bright lights were abruptly halted. Only the klieg lights near the sentry towers were illuminated.

#### RULES COVER WIDE AREA

The regulations which cover an area from Vancouver down to the Mexican border and 150 miles inland became effective 12:01 a.m. Thursday. The regulations were ordered because of the many cargo ship sinkings on the eastern coastal waters by submarines due to the silhouetting of the ships against the glow of the coastal cities' lights.

#### MOVIES TO CONTINUE

The dimout will not effect the showing of movies outdoor and any night activity not requiring bright lighting will be allowed.

Fifty watt globes will be used on top of the barracks from which the 300 watt globes were removed and the holders will be bent horizontally with the ground.

The use of lights inside of the barracks will still be allowed in accordance with regulations issued previously by Center Manager E. P. Pulliam.

### CENTER VOTERS SHOW INTEREST IN ELECTION

#### BALLOTS NUMBER 1547

Manifesting interest in the council election, 1,547 voters or 60 percent of the total eligible voters cast their ballots Wednesday night in their respective mess halls.

From a ballot listing 32 candidates, the voters elected 15 nisei and 6 issei to form an advisory panel of 21. Write ins skyrocketed the total number of candidates to 173.

#### KEBO GARNERS MOST VOTES

Johnson Kebo, former Fresno insurance man, led in the votes with Dr. T. T. Yatabe, second. Following in close succession were Fred Yoshikawa, John Hirohata and Ken Zenimura.

At least one candidate from each section was placed on the panel. Section I claimed the most representatives with four while Section B had three. All of the other sections except A and H, were represented by two elected candidates.

#### SECTION H LEADS BALLOTERS

Section H voters showed the greatest interest in the election with 240 turning out while the poorest showing was indicated by only 79 voters from Section F.

## ADULTS ASKED TO OBSERVE 'MILK' RULES

Milk for adults?

The Mess and Lodging office has requested that adults avail themselves of milk when it is served in bulk form in pitchers on tables every morning.

Such adults needing extra milk at other mess hours are requested to present a doctor's certificate.

A definite count must be taken in order that an adequate supply may be ordered, both for adults needing this extra diet requirement and for children at meal time as well as at snack time.

Since different persons distribute the bottled milk, such certificates must be presented at each mess time, it was announced.

Former employees of the Mess Halls are requested not to enter from entrances in the rear or side of kitchens. Chefs are requested to report infractions of this rule to the Mess and Lodging headquarters.



A payroll of \$17,000.00 and \$10,000.00 in issue books per month...that's a lot of money in any man's language.

All that sum is paid to the wage earners of this Center which numbers more than 1500.

Working in the office located in the Center Store area, the cashier headed by M. E. Johnson, an clerks Tsuruyo Matsui, Hideko Otake and Louise Miyake, cashier Toyoko Hoshiko and assistants Michi Tokumoto, Hideko Murenaka, and Helen Henmi. They should be highly commended for their efficient and speedy service plus courtesy unsurpassed.

When the scripts are issued, each book is carefully listed and registered according to numerical order, and when the scripts are used up, the covers must be checked back against the registry. This will enable them to compile the figure of total spending by the Center resident. The books whether they are issued or sold, the balance of registry must be checked and balanced.

The clerks date the books, stamp the Cashier's signature, check the ID numbers and file the registry sheets. For the payroll, the pink slips are listed according to the ID numbers and then separated according to skilled and unskilled labor.

Besides handling these regular payroll checks, the girls must keep record of all supplementary checks. More than fifteen hundred checks are issued through the Payroll Window each month.

We salute and honor our Cashier M. E. Johnson and his staff of courteous girls.
