FIRST STUDENT LEAVES CENTER FOR COLLEGE

TWO MORE SCHOLARS TO GO EARLY NEXT WEEK
Fumiko Ichiba, former Fresno State College pre-nursing student, left Tuesday for the University of Denver in Denver, Colorado as the first local Center resident to relocate for further education.

Theodore Ono and Richard Henmi will leave early next week for the University of Colorado at Boulder to continue their studies. Ono was a junior at the University of California during the previous semester and Henmi was formerly a freshman at Fresno State College.

ARMY GRANTS FURLOUGH

These three students were granted furloughs by the Fourth Army Command through the help of the National Student Relocation Council although their applications had previously been accepted by the colleges.

The National council has been working on relocation throughout the summer and a certain number of those who applied for consideration

will definitely be granted opportunity for further education according to an announcement by Joseph Conard, Northern California representative of the council.

EDITORIALS

COOPERATION NEEDED FOR EFFECTIVE PANEL FUNCTION

The recent election was significant in that 60% of the Center residents exercised their franchise to select persons on the Advisory Panel.

It is evidenced from the orders issued by the Western Defense Command that insofar as the management of the Center affairs is concerned, the Army intends for the residents to manage their problems through the newly created Advisory Panel which acts as liaison between the people and the Administration.

Since it is intended for the residents to direct their affairs as democratically as possible, these 21 competent and understanding Panel members should constantly bear in mind the famous phrase uttered by the world's great political philosopher, Jeremy Bentham, "The greatest good for the greatest number," for harmony and efficient functioning of the Center. Here is no place where rotten politics can be exercised. In assuming their responsibilities as representatives of the people, the Advisory Panel should be democratic in thoughts and deeds and should look for the respective interests of both issues and misci with impartial minds.

Above all else, impartiality in making decisions and open mindedness on part of the members will be a strong factor in determining the harmony of the Center residents. Not only are there varied duties imposed on them, but it must also be remembered that the coordination of all the activities and functions will depend greatly upon the degree of cooperation we give to the Panel. We should not be hasty in condemning and criticizing the actions taken by them, but let us appreciate them with open minds and consider the circumstances and situations which they must confront and contend.

For further enhancement of our welfare and the betterment of our Community, let us all work together and cooperate with the new Center Advisory Panel.

RESPONSIBILITY AHEAD

In every Center where relocation movement is underway, excitement is running high among the residents in anticipation of their new homes. But along with excitement, there is the realization of grave responsibility lying ahead. The following is a significant letter written by James Sakamoto, former National JACL president, as published in the Evacuzette, North Portland, Oregon:

"There is much work to be done by all of us. It is pioneering work and it must be done with courage, sincerity and hard work. To you and I and others like us, this is a challenge to our initiative, foresight and strength to prove that we have the mettle as being Americans to the core. Once we get to Minidoka we have a responsibility to fulfill to our people and to the country of our birth by demons treating our loyalty to America by founding a community based on the ideals and principles indelibly written into the pages of our constitution by the blood and tears of the men and women and the founding fathers of their nation."

CENTERS ELSEWHERE

SANTA ANITA

The complete evacuation of the Santa Anita assembly Center will begin today when a contingent of approximately 600 persons will leave by train for the Colorado River Relocation project at Parker, Arizona.

An additional group of 600 evacuees will leave for the same destination tomorrow.

These two groups will be made up of families evacuated to Santa Anita from San Diego city.

The exodus commencing Sunday will involve approximately 3450 residents who will be transferred to the Heart Mountain relocation project at Vocation, Wyoming near Cody. This group will be made up of the families of evacuees from Santa Clara county, the city of San Jose and portions of the city of Los Angeles.

MERCED

The 4500 evacuees of the Merced Assembly Center will be moved to the Relocation site at Granada, Colorado beginning on Monday, August 31.

Daily trainloads are scheduled during the period of August 31 September 3, by which time it is expected that all residents of Merced Assembly Center will be removed to Granada.



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SCOUTS, CUBS RELINQUISH USE OF CENTER BOWL IN FAVOR OF MOVIES
