NEW CITIZENS FILL CENTER TO CAPACITY

All evacuation to the Frosno Associably Center was concluded Friday with the second group of the 1210 Japanese from the Sacracuto Valley. This brought the Center's population to 5085 evacuees.

- Wednesday's 648 arrivals came from the rich trusk gardening district of Elk Grove and Florin.

Five hundred and sixtytwo evacues arrived Friday from the same district to fill the Center to copecity. Only 24 single men were included in the number with the rest in family units.

D. T. Cowart, Property Accounts Section Officer said there will be no more evacuees coming into our Center. Any person wishing change of lodgings must arrange with the office and the person whose place he is to take. There are no more empty barracks where people may move to.
