It is believed that hundreds of workers may be leaving Manzanar in the next few weeks to take advantage of furlough opportunities which will increase as harvesting begins in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Utah, and the labor shortage becomes desperate.

Workers will not be required to pay expenses for any member of their family remaining behind, contrary to previous arrangement. Both single men and families will be eligible for furlough employment. They may remain for permanent relocation if work turns out to be long-term, if not, they may return to the Center as soon as harvesting is over.
