MOST OF RECRUITS ARE NISEI

Volunteering their services to help alleviate the current Farm labor shortage, 101 local evacuees left yesterday afternoon for the beet-fields of Box-Elder County in northern Utah.

Most of the recruits were young nisei although many of the elder bachelors from Section A were included in the group.

The contingent will start work as soon as possible on arrival at the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company farms.

General truck garden labor will be undertaken by the volunteers until the beets are ready for topping. The recruits are allowed to form their own crews in order that relatives and friends may not be separated.

Vernon T. Baker of the War Relocation Authority, expressed satisfaction with the immediate response of the Center residents, and indicated that more work offers may be forthcoming. Baker has released a number of forms (Cont'd on pg. 4 col. 2)

NATIONALLY KNOWN AUTHOR-PASTOR SLATED TO SPEAK HERE WEDNESDAY

intimate friend of Toyohiko Kagawa and since the outbreak of the war has been devoting a large portion of his time in helping the Japanese evacuees. His appearance is being sponsored by the Center Christian Youth Allowship.

EDITORIALS

PARENTS URGED TO ENROLL CHILDREN FOR SCHOOL WORK

Regardless of our indefinite stay at this Center, it is gratifying to note that the fall school term will open next Monday with a complete staff of well qualified teachers on hand.

This year's fall session will be quite peculiar to the children of Japanese ancestry in that not only will the school system be operated under war-time conditions, but the students will not be able to continue their intellectual pursuit sharing their friendship with their many Caucasian acquaintances. It is also apparent to the residents that the school will be conducted under limited circumstances with a lack of proper facilities.

In spite of the inconveniences, however, from the encouraging response of the residents shown toward the new school system, the Center Educational Committee is all out to promote a worthwhile study session. Various new subjects, including courses on social sciences and mathematics have been added to the curriculum along with the classes offered during the summer months.

It is the responsibility of all parents who have children of school age to avail themselves of this worthwhile educational opportunity.

WOMEN AND THE WAR

There is no doubt that this struggle of democratic forces against fascistic forces is going to affect the women of the world. It is necessary that we women take stock of ourselves so that we may control that effect for the best. We have to recognize the fact that whatever part we play in the future must have its groundwork laid in the present.

We, here in camp, are letting a feeling of "inside-ness" pervade all our thoughts and actions. Our minds are filled with whether the breakfast was good or bad, whether there is hot water in the laundry and shower rooms. We constantly complain and feel justified in doing so because, "Who asked to be put in here anyway?"

To become active partisans in the post-war world as we wish, we must realize that in a war which is so important to win, our being here is really a small part. Take in number of people involved, we are less than one-tenth of one percent of the people of the United States.

We can no longer pursue the even tenor of our pre-war days and wait for some "intellectual man" to come along. We must learn to think and to exercise our common sense. We must fight to win the war so our stock will not go down, but rather go up.

BELIEVING THAT ALL THOSE with black hair and slant eyes had left the day before, we thought we were seeing ghosts when we ran across three objects which looked very much like human beings in one of the otherwise barren barracks. The "spirits" were still in bed when the nosy gentleman of the press barged in. Upon questioning, we found the occupants were waiting for a permit to go to Chicago.

PICKING UP THE LOOSE ENDS.... Hanging on one of the clotheslines we saw the inevitable forgotten pair of woman's unmentionables, perfectly good ones as far as we could see from a respectable distance.... over here all buildings are numbered; so matching our home addresses with that of those here, we found that one of our number would be living in a latrine if he were removed to Tulare and retained his present address.
