## ADVANCE CREW SIGNUP UNDERWAY

### WRA CALLS FOR MORE LABORERS REGISTRATION "MERELY FOR INFORMATION," DUNN SAYS

Another call has been issued for more volunteers to assist in the sugar beet fields of northern Montana by the War Relocation Authority through their representative, Vernon T. Baker.

The signup of workers began Monday afternoon in the barber shop in Men's Shower Annex F and is continuing until a quota of 57 laborers is filled. Recruits will leave immediately to farms connected with the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company in the vicinity of Malta, Montana.

#### TOPPING SEASON UNDERWAY

The harvest hands will begin work immediately on arrival since the beet topping season is already underway in the region.

Kerme Anderson, United States Employment Service representative, began interviewing certain prospective advance detachment workers for relocation centers this morning in the Council Room.

### AT LAST! CENTER BARBER SHOP TO BE OPENED FRIDAY

With six resident barbers in attendance, the Center barber shop will commence operation Friday morning at Men's Shower Annex F.

Only haircuts will be given at 20 cents per cut, which is to be paid in script. The shop will follow a schedule of 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. daily.

The barbers include M. Takemoto, S. Mizuno, K. Hayashi, F. Sumioka, K. Akanatsu, H. Arie and one woman, F. Yamamura.

The shop will be operated under strict health regulations.

The announcement of the registration yesterday immediately set off rumors of imminent movement but this was punctured by Assistant Center Manager E. A. Dunn.

Dunn pointed out that the latest development "is merely for information" and does not indicate any change in plans or immediate relocation.

The USES, which is working with the WCCA, is arranging the recommendation of workers who will eventually form the 198 man advance crew to be called by the WRA center. The needed evacuees include workers to man the hospital, mess, office and work staffs.

In rebuttal to widespread talk of a split-up of the local Center in the event of relocation, Dunn assured the residents that everyone will go to the same WRA center.

At least 15 days notice will be given to members of the advance detachment who are to leave more than 6 days in advance of the remaining residents. (Cont'd on pg. 4 col. 2)

## EDITORIALS

YOUR KNOWLEDGE OF CO-OPS  
NEEDED FOR GREATER POWER

There is an old axiom which says that knowledge is power. Unfortunately, half-truths are regarded as truths many times, with deleterious effects on many individuals. An open mind which is receptive to new thoughts and ideas, even when one does not agree on a particular subject or topic, is an important, healthy factor in any human endeavor.

Many of us have our own opinions and ideas regarding cooperatives. But, have we really tested our preconceived ideas against the factual knowledge and data which have been gathered and compiled.

The seminar on cooperatives which meets on alternate Monday nights, is endeavoring to bring to the individual for mutual elucidation, the meaning of a cooperative in relation to the individual's everyday needs.

Perhaps we do not agree with the cooperative idea. Again, perhaps we do. However, the chance for further study and learning is available at the seminar on cooperatives, and whatever knowledge gained will make for greater power.

If we are to accept this challenge, then what we must do is clear.

The volunteers may return on the termination of contract in the best topping which will end in the latter part of November or make agreements with farmers whereby they may stay for the duration of the war.

Many farm hands have already helped to relieve the labor shortage in the rich agriculture region around Malta having pioneered the movements by volunteering early in June. Approximately 6,000 evacuees are now working in harvest in the western states.

(Cont'd from pg. 1 col. 3) miles of the advance crew will leave on the first day of the general exodus.

Evacuees with property in storage may have those sent to the relocation center at the expense of the WRA.

The following list of positions are open in the volunteer crew: 10 attendants, 15 maids, 1 secretary and 2 clerks for the hospital; 10 cooks, 10 cooks' helpers, 10 dishwashers, 20 waiters, 1 butcher and 2 bakers for the mess halls; 5 clerks, 10 guides, 1 store manager, 2 retail clerks, 4 recreation leaders, 1 social worker, 2 carpenters, 1 electrician, 1 plumber, 10 typists, 10 truck drivers and 70 laborers for the various other center preparation duties.

Music, social sciences, mathematics and English are among the regular courses offered in the high school curriculum along with the other practical arts instruction instituted earlier. Kay Mano is in charge of the high school and adult classes while Inez Nagai heads the pre-school and elementary grades.
