ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TERM BEGINS

CENTER BANK TO BE OPEN FRIDAY

The Center Bank will be open this Friday, September 25, from 9 to 11 a.m. Residents with deposits in any branch of the Bank of America are requested to bring their bank books or other means of identification if they wish to have checks cashed without charge.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR PROPERTY MUST BE MADE

Center residents must fill out applications, available in the Service Division Office, if they wish to have household and personal effects in private storage shipped to relocation center at government expense.

Any article, except clothing, may not be brought into the Center hereafter or sent by any outside person.

Since property to be moved must be transported to a central warehouse prior to freighting, arrangements must be made within a prescribed time.

Property in storage by the Federal Reserve Bank is not affected since they are already registered.

780 MORE STUDENTS ENROLLED

The sisters--maybe their names are Mary and Haru---live together in the same barrack, "somewhere in Poston." One of their pleasures is the incoming daily mail, because like so many other girls nowadays, they each correspond with a soldier. And you would be right if you guessed that, for with them, this business of "writing cheerful letters to better up morale in the armed forces" is something a bit more special than a mere patriotic chore.

One afternoon, they both received the familiar, "postageless" mail. Haru was handed a letter, Mary a package and a letter.

Inside the small packet, Mary found an engagement and a wedding ring; inside the letter, a proposal. She cried a little, as women will when their happiness is unberrable.

Haru's eyes were shining with tears, too, as she finished her letter. They kept returning to a few words that insisted on blurring, "I am being sent overseas."

But the tears in her eyes will remain unshed, for a sense of something far more important just now than the love of a boy and a girl, then her own personal heartbreak, awes her and refuses to let them fall.

Corinne, Utah
9/16/42

"Well, I'm in Utah now and I certainly like the place. We arrived in Ogden about 7:45 p. m. and our final destination about 11:00 p. m.

"Our place is located 1 1/2 miles from Corinne and 8 miles from Brigham. Ogden is about 30 miles from here, so this isn't bad location.

GOING FISHING

"The river runs about 200 yards from us, so we look forward to going fishing for carp and cat fish which are about the only catches there. We can also go trout fishing up the canyon about 20 miles away.

"The first few days we fixed our room in the attic since it wasn't quite completed. Then we worked hauling hay, and we're rather sore all over the body since we haven't worked for so long.

"The people we work for are certainly nice and also goes for the Japanese fellows we work under. We had quite a time getting our blankets due to some train trouble, so we had to borrow enough to sleep in.

WILL TRY MILKING

"On the farm there are hay, corn, tomatoes, sugar beets and spuds planted. Oh, yes, and there are plenty of cows and hogs (hmmm) around the place. I'm going to try my hand in milking soon.

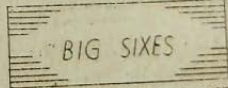
FLORIN HANDS HANFORD DODGERS 6-3 DEFEAT IN 'B' LEAGUE OPENER
