FIRST GROUP LEAVES FOR ARKANSAS

RESIDENTS HAVE THREE ALTERNATE DESTINATIONS

Fresno Centerites are offered three alternate destinations by the WRA in addition to Arkansas with the offers of harvest employment in Montana, Colorado and Idaho vying to attract their attention.

Joining the American Crystal Sugar Company representatives who began recruiting early this week, officials from the Great Western concern and Utah-Idaho organization arrived yesterday with offers from Colorado sugar belt and Madison County, Idaho respectively.

Under the supervision of WRA representative Ralph Northmeier, the men have set up offices in the Women's Shower Annex C to sign up volunteers.

RECRUITS MAY REMAIN

All of these areas under consideration are already populated with many harvest workers and permanent residents. Recruits may arrange to remain for the duration since the labor shortage is expected to persist for the duration.

More than 240 contract offers are now ready for examination at the office which will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday while weekdays will have the opening from 3 a.m.

SANTA ANITA GROUP JOINS FRESNO CREW

Reinforced by 18 additional volunteers from Santa Anita, the advance detachment embarked yesterday afternoon on their journey to the banks of the Mississippi River for the local Center's wartime home in Jerome, Arkansas.

This crew will prepare the project area for the first arrival of movements from Santa Anita who com-

Dates of block movements have been moved up two days. Section A will entrain on the 12th of this month instead of the 14th as previously planned.

mence evacuation for Jerome on October 3, four days previous to Fresno's first departures.

The Santa Anita group to relocate to Jerome are mainly from the Long Beach area including San Pedro, Wilmington, Torrance and waterfront sector.

Headed by Dr. Kikuo H. Taira as train monitor, first contingent left the Center at 1 p.m. for the "slow train for Arkansas."

Families in need of crate lumber must contact Bill Yamamoto in the warehouse section immediately.

The carpenters will then call at the individual residences to check on the amount needed.

EDITORIALS REMEMBER "DIFFICULTIES" EXIST TO BE SURMOUNTED

It is apparent to many that there are times when a sense of "utility" floods our minds. Many of us, especially in these uncertain days, are frequently assailed by these grave dilemmas and tempted to surrender to self pity.

When we are in such a predicament, we receive consolation by taking a look at world history and observing that number of individuals and groups have encountered hardships and difficulties...a reminder of what others, equally buffeted by life, have done. This advice may seem to offer very little, but it may tip the scales and give us added hope, courage and determination!

In times such as these we must maintain a sense of balance between our recreational and cultural activities. During our five months' stay here at the Center, the Service Division has been a contributing factor in maintaining this balance. It has provided the Center with adequate educational and cultural activities. After we become relocated it will be doubly important for us to bear this fact in mind. We must readjust our lives to make the most of our opportunities.

We must constantly bear in mind that the conditions and circumstances in which we find ourselves are temporary when we go to our permanent relocation center. Let us have perseverance, for as Emerson said, "Difficulties exist to be surmounted."

"THEY WERE SO KIND"

The following excerpts from letters and postcards from Helen Matsunaga, former Santa Anita resident and talented violinist, now attending Rockford college in Rockford, Ill., show another picture of relocation--the relocation of students in Eastern and mid-Western colleges and universities.

"The 'Welcoming Committee' waited for me at the station but since I came in several hours late at the depot I missed them. I took a cab and got to the college. I'll have to admit that I was very frightened for a while.

"After arriving at the college, I made the 'rounds.' Everyone has been so very kind to me....Rockford is really the 'forest' city. It's very beautiful. It typifies this part of the country. Unlike Los Angeles there are no mountains--just beautiful rolling hills. The whole city of Rockford is just like a typical picnicking ground--trees, lakes, streams, and flowers.

"Wisconsin is just a 30-minute drive from here--Chicago is very close (hour and a half)...but I miss 'exciting' Santa Anita so much.

At the end of the first week of cotton picking, prospects for a larger number of volunteers were decidedly encouraging. The average picking per person climbed rapidly as workers began hitting their stride. Hands which had never picked cotton were harvesting well over 100 pounds a day of the long, silky fiber.

TULELAKE COLONY

Shipment of 500 hogs arrived over the weekend for the Tule Lake hog farm.

The construction of 20 laying houses will be underway soon. The plant will be among the largest poultry farms in Northern California. A flock of 40,000 laying hens will fill the plant when the enterprise is in full operation.

MANZANAR

In a flurry of excitement such as never seen before, 700 men left for the sugar beet fields in Montana, Idaho and Utah last week while 300 more were expected to follow this week. They will be gone about six weeks to help in the harvest season.

SANTA ANITA

Announcement of Santa Anita's fifth and sixth movements to relocation projects was made early last week. Formerly from San Francisco, 640 persons in the fifth exodus will leave for Delta, Utah, from the San Pedro--Long Beach area, will be removed to Jerome, Arkansas, beginning next Thursday.

PLANS TO MOVE TUBERCULAR CASES TO ARIZONA, MADE

W. E. Pollock has been arranging the transfer of families with tubercular members to Arizona with the United States Health Service. The list of those who will be provided with pullman accommodations is now being compiled. This will include babies, mothers and the infirmed.

Kits containing baby formulas and pharmaceutical supplies are now being completed by the Service Division for the feeding of babies and care of the sick.

RESIDENTS WARNED TO LEAVE BOXES UNNAILED, UNTIED

"Don't nail those boxes," warns Harry Condee, in charge of baggage. "Nailing or tying boxes double our work and delays the shipments."

Freight should be ready for shipment any time before four days previous to the block movement, in order to insure early delivery to Jerome. Check baggage will be picked up on the day before the embarkation, while hand baggage may be taken by the individual. Hand baggage should be as light as possible. Blankets will be taken on the morning of evacuation.

"Inspection of baggage is not for contraband," assures Condee. "All government property must be accounted for, and this inspection is designed only to check on blankets and moss equipment."

Residents having freight that is ready to be shipped may notify their councilman who will arrange for the pick-up.

NEW MONTGOMERY WARD CATALOGS SHOULD BE ORDERED FROM MISSOURI

Montgomery Ward and Co. of Oakland announced today that after Fresno Center residents are relocated to Jerome, Arkansas, they may send for new catalogs from Kansas City, Missouri.

The catalogs are issued separately by each of the Montgomery Ward mail order houses situated throughout the country. The merchandise and the price of the items listed vary.

WELFARE OFFICE RECEIVES MORE MONEY DONATIONS

Donations received by the Social Welfare office to date total \$181.45.

The total expenses to date amount to \$147.20. The money was used for the following purposes: medical aid, stamps, envelopes, personal welfare, clothing, and office supplies, such as journals and ledgers. Seichi Mikami, head of the office, said.

after the evacuees arrive in Jerome, must be shipped by freight.

Freight will be picked up and shipped as soon as it is ready. Freight should be left at the corners of the No. 5 apartments and the Works Division notified upon completion of inspection.

Tops of boxed packages should not be nailed until inspection is finished. Articles which are necessary during the first three or four days after arrival should be sent as baggage in the express cars accompanying the train.

All baggage must be ready 24 hours ahead of departure time should be left at the end of the No. 1 apartments. Boxes and baggage must be legibly marked.

It is suggested that passengers take a blanket and a pillow for use during the trip.

There will be three diners attached to each train and each will accommodate 45 persons at each meal call.

There will be one monitor to each train and one captain to each car. They will work directly under the train commander and Military Police escorts. These officials will be appointed from each block at least seven days ahead of Block departures.

Completing a circuit of the ten mess halls, the "E" for excellence pennant will be displayed in Mess D next week, revealed Clifton Snelson, Mess and Lodging Division.

Statistics for September showed that 1,718,080 meals were served to some 5000 residents of the Center. 212,515 pounds of ice and 30,170 quarts of bottled milk and 4,860 gallons of bulk milk were used.
