

# 1,400 PUPILS ENROLL FOR SCHOOL FIRST GROUP LEAVES FOR EDUCATIONAL MONTANA BEET FIELDS UNDER WAY

Demonstrating their loyalty and willingness to cooperate with the government in its labor shortage problem, Se workers and one femily voluntarily entrained yesterday afternoon for the sugar beet counties of Montans.

The workers ranged from mineteen years to sixty-six years in age and are for the most part inexperienced. The family, Mr. & Mirata and their nine year old daughter, June, had previously lived in the sugar beet country and thus know of conditions there. They will be forty-sight hours enraute and will arrive in time to begin work Monday.

In Montana the workers will be provided housing and all sanitary facilities and will be paid the wages set by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. Work in the hay and grain fields will fill in the slack time of the beet work. Thus workers will be always employ-

After the beet season which will be over about the first of November, the workers will return to the Assembly Center.
