Fifty-six men, seven women and two children left on the southern Pacific, 5:25 p.m., Thursday; for the sugar beet fields in Glasgow, Chinook, and Malta, Montana.

The workers will be paid the minimum wage scale as set by the Federal government which is \$10/A for the first thinning or the equivalent of 45¢ per hr.

Workers and their families will be provided transportation to the area and back to the Assembly Center or Relocation Center when the seasonal labor is completed. The sign-up was entirely voluntary.

Merced Assembly Center reached a total of 4516 residents.

Headed by Fred Morimoto, assistant manager, twenty persons are employed. Cashiers are Lois Morimoto and Florence Kawaoka.

NEW MEAL TICKETS

The problem of feeding 4516 individuals and trying to keep everyone satisfied and happy is now being ably solved by Stephen Schram, Mess director. He is assisted by Norman Satow, executive chef. Naturally there are complaints but it is hoped they will be ironed out in the near future when the facilities are built.

With the installation of 3 bakeries, evacuees can look forward to having pastry included in their daily diet. To insure more fresh vegetables, a vegetable house will be built in Warehouse #11. Here workers will prepare the food before it is distributed to the mess halls.

Four walk-in ice boxes will keep meats and dairy products from spoiling.

Diners will no longer be able to eat in any

mess hall they please with the issuance of new meal tickets. These will be in nine colors, one for each mess hall, with the individual's name, identification number and the time of the meals. There will be no exception to this rule and it will be strictly enforced.

For children under five years of age and their mothers and people with special diets, meals will be served in mess hall G.

Positive instructions have been issued to each crew to serve seconds and thirds, if necessary, so don't be bashful.

Approximately 400 are employed in the Mess and Lodging division. There are 11 crews, one for each of the 10 mess halls plus a so-called roving crew, which is being temporarily retained in order to give workers a rest.

This is your library, for you have helped to make it possible. It is yours to benefit and enjoy! Watch the bulletin boards for the announcement of the opening day.

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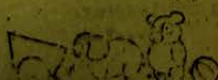
GETTING MARRIED?

EMERGENCY RULES

Because of the many doubts and fears in this community concerning isolation cases, such as measles and mumps, Dr. W. K. Iriki announced that the following procedure should be applied.

If a case is suspected, the patient is to be kept at home while someone is sent to the Emergency Unit of the hospital to report the case to the secretary in charge. In the meantime, people, especially children, should be kept out of the sick room.

Dr. Iriki emphasized the fact of not bringing suspected cases to the hospital since bringing them will only contaminate the hospital and endanger other children.

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FLAG CEREMONIES

Memorial Day Services were held at the baseball park before a huge, colorful gathering of 4,000 people. The program opened with the "Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag" and was followed by the Reverend's Invocation.

The crowd sang the "Star Spangled Banner." Several choral numbers were sung and the introduction of the administrative staff took place.

The program was highlighted when Asst. Center Manager, Mr. Harry Block, delivered Manager Dean W. Miller's message.

Dr. M. Higaki, commissioner of Welfare, delivered a message. The huge crowd then sang "God bless America," and the services were appropriately closed by the Boy Scouts' blowing of taps.

FIREMEN WITHOUT A FIRE TRUCK

LIGHTS OUT! CANDLES, TOO

"We prepared for black-outs," says Chief of Police W.H. Beckman. When a series of short toots for an interval of two minutes emanates from the Merced city siren, it is the indication of an official city-wide and center-wide blackout.

At this time the main switch of the Center will be pulled and the entire camp darkened. All residents must extinguish their lights, candles and any other source of light. Any person caught out strolling when the signal begins must go into the nearest building or barrack for shelter.

When the siren toots begin, the Center police and the Military police will make a check-up and then they, too, will take shelter. As soon as the lights go on again, it will mean that the blackout is officially over.

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NO TALKING PLEASE

Residents of the Center are asked not to converse with sentries posted in the towers. Army regulations forbid guards on duty to talk unless executing orders.

Four more barbed wires will be nailed to the posts to prevent small children from crawling through, according to Dean Miller, center manager. Persons are also asked not to walk in the narrow spaces between the barracks and the fence due to the hazards involved.

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DRAFT NEWS

Those receiving selective service questionnaires are asked to fill them out with the aid of their ward representatives.

They are to be notarized at the Administration Building. The Center officials will mail the blanks to the proper authorities.

TEN COMMANDMENTS

1. DON'T go over the fence.
2. DON'T speak to fire watchmen or sentries.
3. DON'T gamble. Any kind of games involving any money is considered gambling. If arrested, you will be prosecuted to the full extent of the California State Gambling Law.
4. DON'T enter the grandstand except during the official games. No smoking. Keep off the green.
5. DON'T go on the other side of the former fence after the grandstand is lighted in the evening.
6. DON'T walk on the street; use sidewalk.
7. DON'T play on center square on Sunday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.
8. DON'T disturb your neighbors after 10 p.m. Be quiet. WE DON'T WANT A CUREM!!
9. DON'T use any vacant apartments for anything except with official permission.
10. DON'T scatter paper or rubbish around. Cleanliness and sanitation is for your own good.

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ELECTRICIANS FUSE, PLEASE!

Recently there has been too many fuse blow-outs with electric irons, stoves, and heaters overloading the lines. Due to the dangers of fire caused by the overheated powerlines, Electricians Fred Hashimoto, Franklin Okuda and Fumio Sako request that not more than one appliance be used at one time.

They also request the users to try to cooperate with their neighbors as to the time of usage. If any electrical trouble should occur, report at once to the local Information Office or to the Police.

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BETTER HOMES SOON

Furniture made by the Center carpenters will be distributed to every unit as soon as they are completed. One table and 2 benches each are now being issued.

Making of screen doors, dressers and shelves will soon be underway. Furniture for the Recreation department will also be built. Remodelling of the mess halls was completed Thursday.

VISITING RULES FOR FRIENDS

A visiting room has been constructed at the west end of the administration building. The following regulations will govern visitors:

Visiting hrs.--8 a.m.-5p.m.

1. All visitors must report to the information official at the administration office, and enter their name and the name of the person or persons they wish to see in a permanent record. This official will then refer them to the reception room where the interview may be completed.

3. The information official will give them a note to the information clerk, who is situated in the reception room, au-

thorizing the interview.

4. The information official will make the necessary arrangements for notifying the Japanese resident or residents that a visitor or visitors are in the reception room.

5. The time the visitor or visitors report in and out shall be a matter of record, and shall be entered by the information official in his daily record of such visits.

6. Visitors, cars and trucks will not be allowed to go into the center, unless accompanied by a member of the administrative staff and the visit authorized by one Center Manager, or his authorized representative, or by the authority of an official pass issued by the Center Manager.

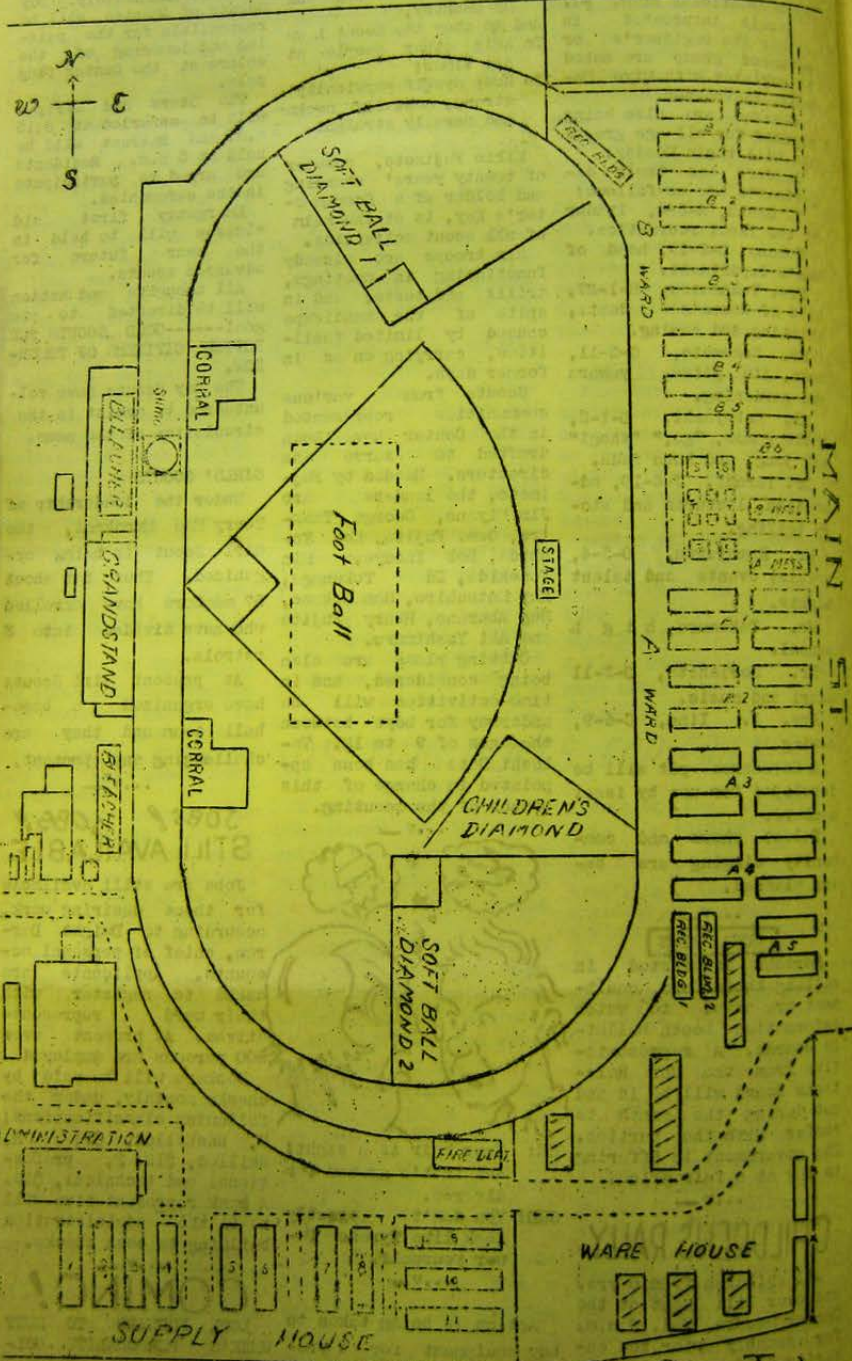
