"Pe prepared for black-cuts" says Chief of Police W.H. Bachman. When a ser-ies of short toots for an minutes interval of two emanates from the Merced city siren, it is the in-dication of ar official city-wide and center-wide blackout.

At this time the main switch of the Center will be rulled and the entire camp derkened. All residents must extinguish dents must extinguish their lights, candles and any other source of light. Any person caught out strolling when the signal begins must go into the nearest building or barrack for shelter.

When the siren toots begin, the Center police and the Military police will make a check-up and then they, too, will take shelter. As soon as the lights go on again, it will mean that the blackout is officially over.

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# NO TALKING PLASE
