To the garbage collectors who work unceasingly at a task that most of us dread.

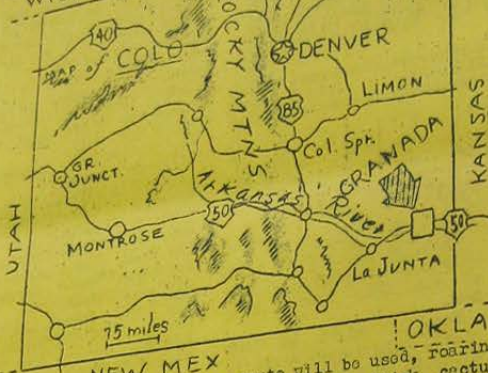
To the transportation crew who work so that we may eat.

To the warehousemen who supplied in food and clothing.

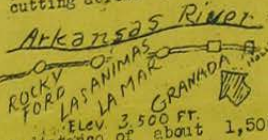
