550 ATTEND FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL

Five hundred fifty students answered roll call on the opening day of the Center Summer School Monday morning. Classes are held in barracks 25--kin-sugita, 248--groups 1 and 2, 249--groups 3 and 4, 257--group 5 from 8:30 to 11 a.m.

Normal education is being taught with a 15 minute recess period for organized outdoor activities. Text books were issued for home study.

Paul Nakada, superintendent of the school, gave credit for the smooth opening day to the instructors and Nancy Tomono, secretary of the education department. WELFARE BOARD NAMED

Establishment of a social welfare committee to act as a friendly body for promoting goodwill and harmony for the community at large was announced by Alvin Loughlin, Welfare Department head.

Plans for the committee are to aid in family relationships, character building, relief, delinquencies, public health, and to act as a clearing house for general complaints until a special

bureau is set up.

A confidential house to house survey is planned so that families may consult competent social welfare workers on their problems.

It is requested that enrollees consult this department at any time when special problems arise. Temporary offices are being held in the Welfare office in the Administration grounds, it was announced.
