WORKERS TO GET CHECKS

Monthly payment in Treasury checks for work performed by enrollees was disclosed by Clayton Triggs, manager of the Center.

Wages are being based on monthly work schedule consisting of 44 hours per week. Employment for enrollees under 18 years of age is prohibited, although no maximum age limitations are in effect. Employment is determined by the ability and satisfactory manner in which the work is performed.

1700 ALIENS REGISTER IN 3½ DAYS

Up to noon Thursday, 1700 aliens had been registered, Clarence Uno, chief registrar, announced.

With registration closing today at 4 p.m., all aliens are asked to report at 2714 11st Street regardless of whether they have reported individually their change of address to the four governmental agencies, namely: U. S. Attorney, FBI, Immigration and Naturalization Service, and Provost Marshal, Western Defense Command.

Aliens should also report to the Alien Registration Division, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D. C. individually, he added. Forms for this report are available at the Post Office by the Center Store.

OLD RIVALS MEET

UNDEFEATED FORMER SAN GABRIEL TEAMS CLASH IN FEATURE AFFAIR ON SUNDAY

In what promises to be the biggest tilt of the first round softball competition two undefeated forces, the Valley Sportsmen I and the Sho Gabriana, come to battle for retaining leadership of the Senior Circuit Sunday in an after-dinner engagement on diamond one.

Toshio Asano, Valley fireballer, will go moundward for the Sportsmen while for the Sho Gabrians, Frank Hayward will do the chucking.

The teams have met two common foes in the Chucksteers and Fog City. The Sportsmen piled up 20 points against the Chucks while the Sho Gabrians chalked up a 4-0 win last Wednesday evening. Valley put the Fog City gang away by a 24-0 count whereas the Sho's were only able to straggle out a 7-0 triumph over the Priests lads.

George Mizuki and Fred Iriye lead the Valley Sportsmen hitting attack. Mizuki, initial sack guardian, has been on a hitting spree up to this date and expects a field day at the plate. The home run touch is added by Iriye, who last season performed under the Gabrians' colors.

Leslie Iriye, Fred's older brother, who was one of the most feared hitters in So. Cal. JAU ranks, provides the spark for the Sho's.
