It is almost impossible to obtain fresh fruits and vegetables in quantities and qualities desired. Our orders are placed 12 days in edvance of our needs, but we cannot often obtain some items. Consequently, we must accept parishables which are not in accordance with our specifications. Bither that, or do without. For example, cantaloupus recently received were already 10 In order to incure a constant supply of perspoiled. istables we must maintain a supply above our daily moods. This, in turn, results in a curtain percentage of spoil-So, the spoilage of fruit and wagetables to which the writer refere, is an unavoidable spoilage, and not the result of excelerances or microstogenest.

As to the shortage of food at the last moss, we must depend upon the bitches personnel to advise us when such siortages occur. We are endeavoring in every way pos-sible to sholish any shortages. To our knowledge no shortages here been reported within the last tun days.
