WHAT AND WHEN



A Cooperative is a business enterprise owned and controlled by the producers or consumers, the control of which rests EQUALIT with all the members, and the gains of which are distributed directly or indirectly to its members.

In a consumers' cooperative the ownership and operation of the marketing organization ere in the hamis of the consumers; and in the producers' cooperative the ownership and operation of the manufacturing plants and other productive enterprises are in the humis of the workers. All cooperatives are based on the idea that the consumers or producers are to benefit by any gain from the enterprise.

on the enterprise.
Of historical importance is the achievement of the 28 weavers in Rochdale, England, who in 1844 started out with a capital of only \$140. This is the beginning of the consumers' cooperative movement. This Rockiels cothe consumers' cooperative movement. This Rochiele co-operative was successful from the very start. In ten years it had a membership of 900 and a capital of \$35,000. From this humble beginning the cooperative novement grew until we have 75,000 societies throughout the world, membership of 70,000,000 over \$16,000,000,000. and a business of

The successful cooperatives have followed the dochdale plan. The principles of the Rochiele plan will be discussed in the following issues.
