PRINCIPLE #3

Money invested in a cooperative, if it received interest, shall be limited to a fixed percentage which shall not be more than the prevailing current rate.

Any business needs capital to start and those that invest in a cooperative should be rewarded, but only in the form of interest at the rate that prevails in the mainess world.

This principle may not apply to us in our relocation project but is an important principle for any cooperastarted voluntarily.
