

RULES AND REGULATIONS

The following regulations rules and governing the now election setup, in compliance with the orders from new W.C.C.A. Headquarters, have been submitted by the the W. on the present Advisory Council. ELECTION WILL BE HELD ON AUGUST 17.

DEADLINE FOR NOMINATIONS IS AUGUST 14.

1. Each barrack will select two persons, one man and one woman, to act on the block nomination committee and one as registration clerk.

E. A. A meeting will be called of the barrack nomimation committee representatives in each block, at which time a temporary chairman will be elected to accept nominations for a chairman.

B. The chairman will call for advisory committee nominations and two English-speaking Issei and two naminated to be voted on aggligh-speaking Nisei will be nominated to be voted on at the final block election.

c. The chairman will call for nomination of five persons to act as a block election committee; this committee will not include persons who have been nomine ted ss advisory committee candidates.

5. The three condidates in each block receiving the highest number of votes will be considered elected as members of the advisory committee panel, excepting that at least one Issei or Nisei shall be in each block

group. 4. The six persons who receive the least number of votes, in proportion to number of registered voters in their respective blocks, will be automatically elimi-

This elimination will be without regard as to mether or not the person is Issei or Nisei.

The rules in repard to procedure of nominations have been submitted have gained the approval of the San Francisco Office.

Present Block Hepresentatives will begin the registration of voters, persons over 16 years and older, on Monday.

The meeting for nominations will be held at the mess halls next Friday at 8 p.m.

Voting by secret ballot will be held on August 17, 8 to 11 a.m., 1 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. at the far end of the mess halls.
