As yet, officially, the answer remains "destination unknown", but the community must come to realize that wherever we are sent, our cause for worry need not be felt; for, the final decision and our future dispensation will be adequately taken care of by our government.

The two main causes of failure of cooperatives are poor management and lack of support by the members. Last week we emphasized the importance of good management and we wish to point out again how vital it is for the success of cooperatives to have capable personnel.

The other cause of failure is the lack of support by the members. It is generally true that the private businesses will become competitors and will do every possible thing to take the members from their cooperative enterprises and unless the members wholeheartedly and completely support the movement it will fail.

In our relocation cooperative, these points should be kept in mind constantly so that our project will be a success.
