4,500 ARCADIANS SANTA ANITANS TO JOIN S.A.C.

Following in the footsteps of the departure of the Stockton Assembly Center's advance crew on Monday, September 14, came the announcement from the Western Defense Command Headquarters in San Francisco that the fourth movement of the Santa Anita Assembly Center that the fourth the new relocation center in Rohwer, Arkansas.

The evacuees from the Arcadia center who number approximately the same as the Stockton Assembly Center, 4,500, will begin relocation on Sunday, September 20.

Leaving at the rate of 500 every other day, the movement is expected to continue until October 6. The Stockton Assembly Center will begin relocation on October 3 and will continue until October 17.

The fourth movement of the Santa Anita Assembly Center includes families from stations in Lawndale, Downey and southeastern Los Angeles. The first two entered the center on April 13 and 14 while the last group was inducted May 6 and 7.

The relocation of the Stockton Assembly Center and the Santa Anita Assembly Center is expected to fill the project at Rohwer to capacity. The new cen-

In the Blue ...Of the night the semi-darkness of the center lit by the September half-moon revealed the barracks-- within the racetrack ovals --morging into the inky blackness beyond.

It is 10:30 and the lighted apartments drop their glow to comply with center curfew. The press staff have finished their work and they now wend their way thru the chilly, murky darkness to the warmth and the hospitality of Mess #4 to partake of their midnight viands prepared by the affable night cook, Mr. Kawamoto ere they disband and head for home to rest in the realm of Morpheus.

Now, it's twelve and with my stomach satisfied, I lie on my bed. Rambler thoughts enter the crevices of my mind and stir the cesspools within. The usual train of thoughts chugged by, then the question of evacuation seized my mind.

The months of January, February and March were uneasy ones for us as the merits and demerits of evacuation boiled merrily on the political stove. Then with startling suddenness, it came.

Evacuation! Like a salvo of 16-inch guns or a peal of thunder, the orders that were to concentrate a hundred odd thousand slant-eyed brethren came to sweep away our hopes, our ambitions and our future-- everything seemed so pathetically lost.

Despite our disillusionment, the government plied for cushioning the repercussions of mass migration pared inconveniences to a minimum. The day arrived and we left our neighborhoods to come here. Now we are to move again.

Unresistingly, we will go. Undaunted, we are to make our home and build a future in Arkansas. The incident below is worth remembering:

One day Booker T. Washington, the noted Negro educator and the builder of

However, though our past occupations and environments have been widely dissimilar, our present status is now the same.

Taking with us an attitude of cooperation and the feeling of 'comraderie' in order that relations between our two groups be readily established, we can bring about harmony so vital to the success of the Arkansas WRA Project.

With this fond hope and open frame of mind, the Stockton Assembly Center residents must make their way to Rohwer, and we shall not be disappointed with the result.

At present the center store expects to stay open as long as it can be of any service to the center.
