RELOCATION MOVEMENTS START IN OTHER CENTERS

On what may be a prelude to mass relocation of Japanese in all assembly centers, the Western Defense Command Headquarters issued orders for evacuation of 4,800 persons from Wagera (Sac'to) Center, beginning June 15, and 2,500 persons from Marysville Center, beginning June 24, to Tulalake Relocation Center (capacity of 10,000) in Northern California.

Leaving in groups of 500 daily, the population of Wagera is expected to be completely relocated by July 1.

The government is preparing for the eventual relocation of all evacuees in 12 permanent centers. Seven of the approved relocation centers and their prospective projects are:

1. Tulalake in Northern California (10,000), potatoes, field peas, small gardens, forest products, canning and dehydrating plants.

2. Manzanar (10,000), gasulite plantations, small plantations, small industries, public works.

3. Parker Dam in Southern Arizona (20,000), irrigation projects, production of subsistence food crops.

4. Gila in Southern Arizona (10,000), irrigation projects, production of subsistence food crops.

5. Minidoka in Southern Idaho (10,000), irrigation projects, sugar beets, potatoes, beans and onions.

6. The X-Y ranch country, 100 miles east of Pueblo in Colorado (7,000).

7. Picher, DeWitt County, in Southern Arkansas.
