

STUDENT RELOCATION PLANNED POPULAR ELECTION EDUCATORS SET UP NATIONAL ADMINISTRATION COUNCIL TO AID NISEI WILL APPROVE WORKABLE PLAN

"A popular election will be held if the residents of the Center desire it," was the statement released today by Mr. A. S. Nicholson, Assistant Center Manager.

However, he reports, a workable plan must be presented to the administrative office for approval. He recommends that responsible groups or committees undertake to draw up such plans.

The best points of each will then be taken out and be coordinated into the final draft.

A Chicago meeting of educators on May 29th held at the request of the War Relocation Authority and under Mr. Clarence Pickett, Executive-Secretary of the American Friends Society, resulted in the formation of a "National Student Relocation Council".

CENTER SCHOOL ADDS COURSES

Special English classes began this morning under the instruction of Miss Misao Hiramoto. The Advanced class, primarily for Kibei, begins at 8 a.m. in the Study Hall; the Beginners' class, for Issei, at 10 a.m. in 1-17-C.

The foreign language courses, which were dropped by army regulations, will be replaced by Trigonometry and Corrective Reading (remedial class for diction and pronunciation).

The War Department through Assistant Secretary of War McCloy has written in an endorsement of the program.

With President Robbins W. Barstow of the Hartford Seminary Foundation as Executive Secretary, the council will be responsible to Mr. Pickett who in turn will be under Mr. Milton S. Eisenhower of
