### WILKINS SCORES AGAIN!

Special mid-morning and mid-afternoon feeding for all children between the ages of two and twelve years inclusive became a reality in the Tulare Assembly Center at 9:30 a. m., June 8. From that time henceforth, each morning at 9:30 a. m. and each afternoon at 3 p. m., all mess halls will serve special refreshments dietetically balanced to the children of this Center.

The Center Manager, Nils Aanonsen, warned the residents today not to pay attention to rumors now circulating to the effect that evacuees from this Center will be relocated in the near future. The Manager went on to say that instructions have been received regarding the procedure to be followed when relocation begins, but at the present time, he has no information as to when evacuation will start and to what location the residents here will be sent.

This should help clarify the many doubtful minds of the people here who have become restless and upset because of the wild rumors spreading throughout the Center.

Official orders will be released to the ten unit councilmen who in turn will notify the residents. Statements coming from any other source are rumors and are to be disregarded.

### FLASH!

The withdrawal of Izuto Otani, from E section, in favor of Fred Ito, in tomorrow's re-election has been nullified by the administrative staff of the Center. Therefore, the two candidates running for re-election from this section remain Otani and Ito.

# INCREASE IN TRANSFERS

## \$50 GIVEN FOR FUNERAL EXPENSES

The Federal government will pay a minimum price of \$50 to help those families desiring aid in the defrayment of funeral expenses for any deaths occurring in the Center. This will provide for a single and unostentatious funeral. Arrangement will be handled through the Sullivan Funeral Parlor in Sanford, with interment following in the Lemore Airfield Cemetery.

Cremation, which will be done in Fresno, and other extra expenses must be paid by the private parties.

The Center Social Welfare Department will arrange for details with the families.

The number of persons applying for transfers are increasing day by day, but no approval from the army has been received as yet. Requests have been made to release only those who expect to attend school or accept employment in inland states, and those who comprise the immediate family. The army will not be responsible for any of those who do move; therefore, people moving from center to center must pay their own expenses.

It seems that quite a few people who have applied for transfers wish to take up farming in Colorado or Utah. However, the most recent instructions do not include those persons, so until army regulations have been changed, people of this class will not be able to move.

# POLITICAL UPSET EXPECTED IN ROUND TWO

As the fever of the first election dies down, we find seven incumbents resuming their seats on the Center Council. Although this seems to be only a small percentage of the original group of twenty, there are yet few veterans who will have another crack at the political apple in tomorrow's re-election.

With the appointment of five of the old council members as commissioners, and two failing to run, it left a leeway for other capable leaders to fill in the gap. According to the figures presented, each candidate running for re-election has a fifty-fifty chance.

There is no doubt, the elected councilmen will carry out their duties to the best of their ability and be true representatives of the people.

## NO KITS FOR MESS Playing in Showers Tabooed

Plans to supply all mess halls with first aid kits have been dropped because more adequate and experienced aid can be given by the hospital staff. However, some necessary materials such as disinfectants may be supplied to those kitchens which are located some distance from the infirmary.

Parents are urged to prevent their children from playing in the showers.

Many cases have been reported where children have removed shower caps and have drained out all the hot water. Many such instances have resulted in the cold showers people have been taking.

If you desire to take warm showers it is asked that everybody stop all children from playing in the showers.

## GIRLS TO MEET

Girls under twelve years of age will meet K-6 for recreational purposes when not going to school. With the arrival of new equipments, various games will be played and enjoyed daily from 9 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. and from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. The announcement was made by Hama Tachihara.

All children from 9 months to six years inclusive who have not been immunized against diphtheria, are asked to report to the Infirmary for immunization on Monday, June 15, between 9 a. m. to 12 noon and 6 p. m. to 8 p. m.

## NEW CANTEEN TO OPEN SOON

A canteen will open shortly in the L unit headquarters (barrack L-9-5), according to Henry Kawabara, who is in charge of arrangements.

Although open to all, the primary purpose of the new store is to serve L and M sections, which are too far from the present canteen in H section. The articles to be sold will be the same as that in the present store.

With the canteen tak-

ing up the L section headquarters, M unit will house councilmen from both units.

If there is sufficient demand, a nursery school will be opened in that district also. The purpose is to avoid having the small children walk over to the F section where the present school is located. All persons interested are asked to contact Kawabara in headquarters.

## INCREASE SEEN IN SUNDAY SCHOOL

Performing before a capacity crowd of approximately 3,000 people, the first variety revue of the winter turned out to be a most successful, despite adverse weather conditions.

The program opened with the congregation reciting the oath of allegiance, led by the Center Scouts of America, followed by the singing of the national anthem, "The Star Spangled Banner." Harry Miyake introduced the manager and the various department heads of the Welfare Assembly Center.

With the dulcet strains of "Aloha Oe", presented by the Hawaiian orchestra, marking the atmosphere with solemnity, the program came to a close.

In order to eliminate unnecessary work upon the kitchen staff of the ten Center commissaries during the children's snack periods, Harry Miyake, Commissioner of Welfare & Lodgings, requests that recipients of those in-between snacks be on time. This appeal is especially made to mothers accompanying their children.

The first in-between snack hour attracted from 800 to 900 youngsters between the ages of 2 to 12 years. Milk tickets provide as temporary passes for the young ones until some type of permanent pass has been devised.

With membership increasing by 57, the Buddhist Sunday School total figured 264 last Sunday. Because of the large classes, it was suggested that K-5 be used to teach new songs. Classes will be rotated.

The usual after-church meeting was officially called to order by James Sakoda, program chairman. So that he may devote more time to his work, Sakoda appointed James Nakagawa to conduct meetings hereafter. Problems pertaining to teaching classes or the improvement of the services, are to be brought up for discussion at this time for clarification. George Matsuura, in charge of the ushers, appointed Yutaka Kodera, Masaki Mitani, Shigeo Otsuki, and Nakagawa to aid the teachers in handling the children in the classrooms.

## Storage Plant To Be Built

An insulation plant for storage of fresh fruits, vegetables and mainly meats will be constructed shortly on the north side of the track. Two railway refrigerator box cars will be placed

far enough apart so as to provide space for construction of a concrete floor. This procedure is for the benefit of the workers who will be employed there. Also, a roof will be built over the two cars, connecting them into one big building.
