Rubber Saving Plan Launched

Suggested by the 15-day, nationwide scrap rubber campaign launched on June 15 by President Franklin Roosevelt, the Tulare News is sponsoring a drive in all Assembly and Relocation Centers for the conservation of rubber soles and heels by extensive use of wooden clogs and sandals whenever possible, it was announced today.

The already popular use of wooden clogs by the Tulare Center people and the recent announcement of the scrap rubber campaign suggested the use of wooden sandals in place of shoes.


The possibility for such a revolutionary move was revealed when many people in the Center were approached on the subject.

Many of the first generation claimed that they did not mind wearing wooden clogs if it were around the barracks. Others said they did not travel far in the Center so the use of the new footwear may become popular and serviceable. The feminine group stated that wooden sandals will be comfortable and if proper straps could be applied there will be little trouble in using the new fangled.

The use of strong cloth for straps nailed to the clogs will do double duty, by conserving leather and rubber was also pointed out.

Several of the boys exclaimed that the use of the new footwear will save their stockings, provided they wear their clogs barefooted.

Thirty-four persons were enrolled in the recently organized Red Cross class under the tutelage of Misses Lynn and Shupe, resident Red Cross instructors.



This first class will be taught to become instructors who will eventually conduct their own classes for the younger people. At present, there is no age limit in registering for the class.

TELEPHONES INSTALLED

New Water Wagon

A two ton water wagon has been secured for sprinkling the Center grounds. Holding about 600 gallons, it will be used to sprinkle about 75,000 gallons of water per day.

For additional improvements, two hundred tons of crushed rock have been purchased from the United States Engineering Department. It will be placed around barracks and buildings for cement work to keep excess dust away.






