JULY 4TH CLOG SANDAL CONTEST OPENS

Adding impetus to the nationwide rubber conservation campaign, the Welfare Department of this Center will sponsor a wood-clog and sandal contest, it was announced yesterday. Judging will be based on originality and craftsmanship, and the older generation is especially urged to participate.

Clogs and sandals made before the Fourth of July will be displayed at the exhibition planned for that day.

As a feature of the Independence Day parade, clog and sandal division will be open to all those who wish to participate.

PROGRAM SLATED

Commemorating the 166th Independence Day celebration, the Tulare Assembly Center residents will join the whole nation in observing this national holiday on Saturday, July 4 beginning at 9 a.m. and ending about

10:30 p.m.

Highlights of the one-day event will be a flag ceremony, under the auspices of the Boy Scouts and the parade in which all clubs and organizations will participate. Flags, streamers, placards, banners, and signs galore will bedeck the Center Grounds to arouse the holiday spirit. Activities slated for the day are exhibits, sports, refreshments, entertainment, and a public Victory Dance which will conclude the program.

HEADQUARTERS WESTERN DEFENSE COMMAID AND FOURTH ARMY--OFFICE OF THE COMMANDING GENERAL--PRESIDIO OF SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF.

Instructions and maintenance operation and maintenance of Assembly and Reception Centers under jurisdiction of the Commanding General, Western Defense Command.

USE OF THE PRINTED JAPANESE LANGUAGE IN ASSEMBLY CENTERS.

A. No news publications of any kind will be prepared or issued in the Japanese language in any Assembly Center which is under the jurisdiction of the Commanding General, and Fourth Army.

B. Necessary instruc-

tions for the proper conduct of fire, sanitation and police regulations may be printed in the Japanese language upon approval by this Headquarters. Proposed instructions will be submitted to the Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, this Headquarters, and necessary approval secured prior to posting in any Assembly Center.

C. Japanese print of any kind such as newspapers, books, pamphlets or other literature, with the exception of approved Japanese religious books (Bible and Hymnals), are unauthorized in the Center at any time and are hereby declared to be contraband and will be confiscated by the Assembly Center authorities.

Any couple desiring to tie the matrimonial knot should make an application for a license to the Welfare Department where a regular employee will be present to handle all applications. These applicants will be referred to Dr. Howard Suenaga for necessary blood tests and medical certificates. Information will include the party's names, ages, previous marriages, children or dependents, religious affiliations, (if any) date of desired marriage, general mental and physical health, and type of service required, including name of official to perform service and facilities needed.

After the application is filed, the applicants will confer with Chief White for transportation to the County Seat in order to file for intention to wed. Not less than three days after this application, the Chief of Internal Police will again arrange for transportation to the County Seat to secure the license.

All fees for the license shall be borne by the prospective couple.

VISITING INFIRMARY IS DISCOURAGED BY M.D.

For the benefit of patients in the Infirmary, the Medical Staff suggests the cooperation of the members of the Tumen Assembly Center in keeping visiting in the hospital to a minimum.

The lack of private rooms and excessive heat conditions at times lead to undesirable irritation of the patients when too many visitors come to the Infirmary.

Friends of patients in the Infirmary who wish to inquire about their condition may inquire in the second unit of the Infirmary from Miss Gracie Maneta. In case someone is in poor condition, the closest friend or relative will be admitted.

For the next few weeks, Dr. Howard Suenaga and Dr. James Higa will be in charge of the patients in the Infirmary. Drs. Herbert Hata and George Takano will be in the clinic to take care of the out-patients.

In order to avoid confusion, Diphtheria shots will be given only on Monday of every week; they will not be given on any other day.

The Medical Staff asks that all the people wanting medical attention please come to the Infirmary during the regular clinic hours, 9 to 12 in the morning and 6 to 8 in the evening. Only acute cases will be taken care of at any other time.

JOINT SERVICE HELD HERE

For the first time in this Center, a joint service of the Buddhists and Christians was held in the grandstand last Sunday evening at 8 p.m.

A piano prelude by Kiyoko Oda opened the mass meeting. The guest speaker of the evening, Raymond Booth of Pasadena, and present Executive Secretary of the American Friends Service Committee, spoke on the topic, "Things We Have in Common."

"One way to look at life is to put yourself in the Center, and be enriched by what everyone else has done," he explained.
