Aliens Forbidden To Hold Office

Latest orders issued by the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army Office of the Commanding General are certain policies governing evacuee self-government in WCCA Assembly Centers.

Effective July 1, 1942, the following restrictions are placed on previously authorized self-government provisions for evacuees in all Assembly Centers and will be strictly enforced and complied with by all Assembly Center managers:

1. No alien will hold any elective office whatsoever in any Assembly Center.

2. Aliens are not authorized to vote for elective members of advisory committees in connection with the self-government of any Assembly Center.

3. No alien will be appointed to any advisory committee or sub-committee of a self-government organization or agency in any Assembly Center.

INSURANCE SURVEY TO BE MADE

TO APPEAR THURSDAY Deadline July 5

FLAGS TO BE USED IN CENTER

One hundred thirty-six American flags, which will be used to decorate the Center, were donated by the Santa Barbara chapter of the J.A.C.L.

Use of Fire Buckets Told

"Please do not use the fire buckets for personal use," was again voiced by Fire Chief Eugene Hoyt, who stated that these buckets were to be used only in cases of fire and not for other purposes.

Several fire buckets have been seriously damaged with holes punctured in them so that they will not be usable again.

Fire barrels should be kept clean of all debris. Also the water in these barrels are changed twice a month, and disinfectant is put in them so that they will prevent the breeding of mosquitoes.

FIREMEN Sprinkling keeps Dust Down

Approximately 50,000 gallons of water are utilized daily in sprinkling the Center grounds, disclosed Chief Eugene Hoyt of the fire department. Besides the main runway of the Center, passages between barracks are watered daily, taking 14 to 16 hours per day.

All those wishing to have the grounds sprinkled around their barracks are asked to remove the clothes lines for free passage of the trucks. In case of emergencies, the trucks will not stop to remove the lines, stated Chief Hoyt.

Drivers for the two trucks, working in rotation, include Kenji Ota, Shigeru Yoshimoto, Yasuo Hirai, Isamu Hasama, Minoru Yamamoto, Tsuyoshi Mano. Swampers who are responsible for operating the sprinklers are voluntary workers.

The July coupons will be issued beginning Monday July 6, with C unit receiving their books at that time. The schedule calls for a section each day, with D unit on Tuesday the 7th. Other sections will come on the following days: E-8th, F-9th, G-10th, H-13th, J-14th, K-15th, L-16 and M-17th. Hours are from 9-12 a.m. and 1-4 p.m.

This time, each individual over the age of 16 must call for his own books. Cards are being distributed for signatures and unless these are signed, books will not be issued. Heads of families, who sign for their dependents must call in person.

Paychecks for May and June are coming soon, and the procedure for claiming them has been announced. As before, they will be given out 7-9 p.m. at the cashier's window. All workers claiming checks must present their work slips at the window.

For the month of June, 3,948 coupons valued at \$9,311 were issued. 1,102 one-dollar, 2,108 two-fifty, and 732 four dollar books were given out. Despite the issue of free books, the sale of coupons is continuing at a brisk rate.

Butchers Busy Says Inadomi

Have you ever stopped to consider exactly how much meat, eggs or butter is actually consumed each time you sit down to eat? If not, this kernel of information as dispensed by John H. Inadomi, Chief Center butcher and former Fillmore merchant, should prove interesting.

As an old saying goes 'Friday, fish day'—and 12,000 smelts, equivalent to 1,000 pounds is distributed equally to the two mess halls. Each time you receive eggs for breakfast, 27 cases, or 9,720 grade A eggs are eaten by the Center population. Twenty-seven slabs of bacon, sliced on the newly installed slicing machine, 13,000 pounds of assorted lunch meat, 1,000 pounds of weiners and 320 pounds of butter are used each time these foodstuffs are distributed for consumption.

Now that new one horse power electrical meat grinding apparatus has been installed, it will be possible to grind meat here instead of having it done elsewhere, disclosed Inadomi.

The meat cutting personnel, consisting of experienced workers, travel to the Tulare Electric Hatchery Company, located about one mile from the Center, each day in performing their daily task.
