150 STUDENTS TO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

248 SIGN UP FOR 'R' DAY AT CENTER, SAYS E. HOYT

Grads to Wear Caps, Gowns

Twice as many Americans of Japanese ancestry answered the latest Selection Service call in this center as compared to the citizens in the city of Tulare and vicinity, it was revealed today by Chief Eugene Hoyt, who is connected with the local draft board.

Two hundred forty-eight out of a population of 8000 or 4.9 percent signed up here, while 352 out of a total of 15,000 people living in the surrounding territory registered for a percentage of 2.4. If these figures can be accepted as general, the Japanese Americans potentially can contribute two soldiers to every one conscripted from an equal sized group.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION TO BE GIVEN

A minimum requirement of six hours per week at school and physical education classes proposed by the Education Department, will be expected of all those ranging from 6-16 years old who are physically able and not employed. This ruling which is backed by councilmen, juvenile officers, and the Social Welfare Department, will go into effect immediately.

One hundred and fifty students will participate in the Tulare Center commencement exercises tomorrow evening at 8 p.m. in front of the grandstand.

Mills Anonson, Center Manager, will be chairman for the evening with officials of Tulare County Schools as guest of honor. Invocation and Benediction will be delivered by Reverend R. Susu-Ihago, and T. E. Nickel, County Superintendent of Visalia Schools will deliver the address.

George Takemoto, representing the university graduates, will speak on "Education for Leadership." Misses Amy Hiratska, junior college representative, and Yoshie Fujita, high school representative, will deliver addresses on "Education for Morale" and "Education for Service" respectively.

Following the ceremony, the graduates will adjourn to recreation halls, K-6 and L-4, for refreshments and dancing.

Repatriation Clarified

Because of several inquiries submitted to Center managers regarding the procedure whereby Japanese evacuees may initiate repatriation proceedings in their own behalf, the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army has issued the following clarification on the subject:

"At the present time only those persons requested by the Japanese government are to be repatriated. We understand that it will be some time before all of those that have been requested to date can be repatriated. It is obvious therefore, that it is too early to burden the State

C. R. CARTER TO HEAD SERVICE UNIT

Official Statement by Aanonson

The official appointment of Corlies R. Carter as Supervisor of the Service Division by P. L. Nicholson, chief of the Exception Center Division, was announced by Center Manager Mills Aanonson, Monday.

Carter, who replaces Harwood P. Stump, who recently joined the Army, was born in Salids, Colorado, in the "heart of the Rockies." Only 29 years old, Carter has spent most of his life travelling through the U. S., Alaska, Canada, and South America.

Starting his working life at the age of eleven, he has done everything from fruit picking to labor foreman, and financial secretary work.

After graduating the University of California in 1936, Carter went into partnership with his brother in a gold mining and lumber company in southern Oregon for a year. After this experience, he went into social welfare work, which led to another year of school at U. C. This time he earned his Social Service Certificate, and became a W. P. A. labor relations man.

Before coming here, he was appointed as the Supervisor of the National Defense training program in Alameda and Contra Costa Counties.

Among the other activities, he spent a short term at the Pacific International School for the Ministry while attending school. His earlier intention was to become an anthropologist, but was disillusioned before participating in graduate work.

His chief interest at present, is his wife Dorothy, to whom he has been married for two years. "I

Your residential consumption of Hot dogs, lemonade, watermelons, and chicken was enormous! According to L. J. The National Student Relocation Council is making it possible for Japanese-Americans previously enrolled in colleges and universities to continue their education in inland institutions before the academic year begins in the fall.

Among those who have aided in this project of relocating students already are various national student organizations, foundations, state universities, independent colleges and national church boards.

"The American Friends Service Committee will coordinate all these efforts and secure the substantial funds that will be required for tuition and maintenance," states a recent report. Eventually, all problems now in questionable minds will be smoothed out.

Data and all the intensive survey will be assembled by a West Coast Committee located at 2227 Union Street, Berkeley, California

Directing this Student Relocation Council is Dr. Robbins W. Barstow, president of the Hartford Seminary Foundation, who has been granted a leave of absence.

Through the combined efforts of all the committees advancing this program, students desiring transfers can continue their schooling. The work has been commended by such personalities as M. S. Eisenhower former War Relocation Authority, and John J. McCloy, Assistant Secretary of War.


