First day for filing applications will be August 5 and the last day will be August 20. Primary elections will be held in California on August 31 and ballots must be marked and sent to reach the registrar of voters within six days after the date of election.

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HISTORY OF 'BON'

"The exact history of the "Bon" (Buddhist festival to the deceased), has been lost in the archives of antiquity. What, with its origin far back in India, the story of "bon" is a mere legend," explained Rev. Yonosuke Mokuren, a disciple of Oshaka-sama, lost his beloved mother by death. However, Mokuren being somewhat a prophet, could see with his "mental-eye" that his mother is suffering in a purgatory called "Gakido" — world of greed.

The soul-rescue of his mother becomes an obsession with Mokuren, who earnestly seeks her return from his master, Shaka. The Master replies: "As ye sow, so shall ye reap—there is nothing I can do for your mother." But Mokuren pleads with increased determination.

Oshaka-sama's aid is finally won. The high-priest reasons and explains: "Since oneness is the formula of life, if the unity of the universe can be obtained to give offerings at once, the merit of such philosophy should be answered."

Disciple Mokuren followed the high-priest's advice and the story goes on that his mother was resurrected. Overwhelmed with joy Mokuren introduced the dance of "Bon" in gratified supplication.

To this day the "bon odori" is observed by all Buddhist followers as an offering to the deceased for their soul resurrections.

RED FIRE WAGON ARRIVES

**ICE SALES
HIT 2,700 LBS.**

Total sales of ice at the canteen up to July 22 has been placed at 41,900 pounds costing Center residents \$2740. according to figures released from the Center stores.

These figures cover the period from June 20 to July 22. Ted Sogeshima, who dispenses the cooling block of solid water, stated that last Wednesday was the busiest, when he sold 2,700 pounds. He also reports that some ingenious people buy ice in 50 pound blocks, and place a fan in front of it and blow cool air into their rooms. One block will last about five hours, he said.

Prices are fixed at 15 cents for 25 pounds, and 10 cents for twelve and a half pounds.

500 GALLONS A MINUTE SAYS HOYT

The center of attraction, and the pride of the Firemen of Tulare, has finally come—a beautiful little red fire wagon, purchased from the Fabco Fire Engine Company in Oakland. Fully equipped with 750 ft. of 2½ inch hose, 300 ft. of 1½ inch hose, 2 fog nozzles and 1 straight nozzle, it tips the scale at 3,000 pounds.

The first test of the coveted wagon was held on the evening of July 23. Amid the stream from the hose and the racing of the engine, the mighty firemen displayed a fine exhibition of their new equipment before the amazed people of the Center.

Proud as a peacock are the firemen and Chief Hoyt of their little 98 horse-powered Chrysler marine engine which puts out 500 gallons a minute at 120 lbs. pressure.

To date, the local fire preventers have been forever on the alert for fire hazards with poor equipment and have done excellent work. With their new fire engine added to their use, they will be prepared for the worst.

Although we have such fine fire fighting apparatus, always be careful and on the watch for any possible means of fires. We are lucky to have such a wide-awake fire department, but there's always something lost by carelessness. So let's give our full cooperation to prevent any disaster by helping the men wearing the fire badges.


The spot was pretty well marked, but the flowers planted alongside the fence didn't even have a scratch. There must be something to a Sunday!




