## C AND M UNITS TO MOVE FIRST

### CENTER TO BE CLEARED IN 10 DAYS

According to Center Manager Nils Aanonsen, the procedure for evacuating this Center will be as follows: On the first day all of C section will move with a portion of M section to fill our the daily quota of approximately 500. On the second day, M section will go, followed by L, K, G, F, E, H, J, and D sections. As soon as each section is evacuated, members of work crews who are to stay behind will move into C unit, and will form the last contingent.

Under this system, units will not go intact, as some of them are under the average quota, and others, are over. D section therefore will go on the ninth day, and the workers will leave on the tenth.

## COUPON SALE TO CLOSE AUG. 15

According to present plans, the 15th of August has been selected as the day to stop the sale of coupon books in order to determine the purchasing power of the evacuees and stock the store accordingly. Only in an emergency will coupons be sold after the deadline, stated Center Manager Nils Aanonsen.

### HUYCKE IN IDAHO

Lorne Huycke, who was the hospital manager here, left Sunday night for the W.R.A. Center in Idaho, where he is to work with the housing project there, according to Corlies Carter, head of the Service Division.

### CLASSES TO CLOSE

All classes from the nursery through senior high school, including the adult evening classes will end their sessions on Saturday, August 15, it was announced by Helen Osaka, educational director.

In an emergency will coupons be sold after the deadline, stated Center Manager Nils Aanonsen.

Also, provisions have been made for the redemption of unused cash coupons. Applications must be made at the Center Cashier's window, and the proper forms must be filled out. One application form with unredeemed coupons attached, will then be forwarded to San Francisco. The refund in the form of a government check will be mailed directly to the applicant.

The canteen has been receiving various merchandise this week, and it is believed that there will be sufficient stock on hand to accommodate everyone, according to Ben Turpin, Store Executive. Such necessary items as rope, toilet articles, candy, cigarettes, soap, etc. will be in stock.

## LAST CALL!

A last call has been issued by Sumire Sugita, head librarian, to donors who have generously lent their books to the library and wish to have them returned. Anyone desiring to have such books returned must call for them immediately or they will be taken to the Relocation Center with the other packed material.

## VOTING CLARIFIED

The policy concerning the obtaining of absentee ballots by the citizen evacuees has been released by the W.C.C.A. The right to apply for the ballots is solely up to the individual and the state and county governments of his former place of residence. The full policy, which governs the procedure of obtaining absentee ballots, notarization, and campaigning is outlined below.

1. The question has been raised as to the right of evacuees in assembly Centers to vote by absentee ballot. The exercise of the right of franchise by

qualified citizen evacuees through the medium of absentee ballot is a matter solely between the individual and the State and County governments of his former place of residence.

No books will be issued out of the Library after today, Wednesday, but will be open till Saturday for free reading.

## NO SHOE REPAIR

Mr. E. E. Pixley, head of the Works and Maintenance Division, announced that no further shoes will be accepted for repair at the Center Shoe Repair Project until further notice.

1. Anyone possessing any rentable property, new rented or offered for rent in any of the defense rental areas, must be registered by the owner of such property.

2. Registration forms can be obtained at the Commissions Office. All applications should be made not later than Saturday, August 15.

3. The rent law covers all types of dwelling units except: (1) commercial structures, unless portions of such buildings are used for dwelling accommodations and (2) farms lands or any dwellings on these lands which are used in farm operations. If, however, such dwellings on these farms are rented solely for the purpose of residence, it must be registered.

4. If any evacuees are in doubt as to whether their property is situated in one of the present defense rental areas, it is suggested that they be on safe side and register such property.

# STUDENTS TO GIVE PROGRAM TONITE

## VOTING CLARIFIED BY W.C.C.A.

(Continued from page 1)  
 If the laws of the state of the evacuee's legal residence permit absents voting by citizen evacuees in their present circumstances, and the evacuee is a fully qualified voter under those laws, the right of franchise by absentee ballot may be exercised without interference.

Qualified citizen evacuees occupy the same position in regard to the exercise of their right of franchise by absentee voting as does any other citizen who for any reason is absent from his voting precinct, or is physically unable to go to his polling place on the day of election.

Assembly center managers will take such action as is deemed essential to facilitate absentee voting by the individual citizen evacuees, but no active assistance will be given by any member of the assembly center administrative staff or by members of the Interior Security Police.

The exercise of the right of franchise by evacuees in assembly centers will be governed by the following regulations:

a. Absentee ballots must be secured by mail or by the individual citizen

evacuees on application to the proper civil official as designated by the laws of the State of legal residence.

b. The notarizing of the absentee ballot is the obligation and responsibility of the individual evacuee. A notary public may be permitted to enter the visitors' area for this purpose, but all costs must be borne by the individuals concerned.

c. Certification of the absentee ballots of evacuees by Army officers is not authorized.

d. Properly identified Registrars of voters of appropriate counties may be permitted to enter the visitors' area for the purpose of registering voters.

e. No restrictions will be placed on the discussion of politics and candidates for political office by the evacuees.

f. No person will be allowed to enter the Assembly Center area for the purpose of political campaigning. However, political workers may be permitted to enter the visitors' area, under existing regulations governing visitors, to talk to individual evacuees concerning the political campaign.


