#### MONITORS MEET TODAY

Evacuation monitors, mbo were selected yester-day, will meet today in the grandstand at 2 p.m. Under the direction of Henry Kuwabara and Frank Sakamoto, these monitors will conduct groups of 45 through the complete evacuation process.

The purpose of the aseting is to discuss the details of the evacuation, and to form a system of coordination among monitors. Each monitor will head a single group, and the closs cooperation of the individuals and the monitors are necessary for mooth operation. The monitors will be responside to the former unit councilmen, who will be in charge of the daily groups. According to Nils Annonen, the administration is setting up the final quota of daily movements. The rotation for evacuation has been announced as taken from the C and D units, or the area inside the tracks. Starting from the second day, everyone execut the workers, who will move into the places weated by order, M, L, K, C, F, E, H, and J sections. On the ninth and tenth day, those remaining in the C and D sections, including the workers, all be evacuated.

### AVOID BAGGAGE CHECK, RETURN GOV'T. PROPERTY


