## COUNCILMEN TO BE ELECTED

"TALENT SHOW  
SEATED FOR JUNES"  
SAYS KOMAI

ISSEI, AMERICAN BORN TO GO  
TO POLLS JUNE 8

With programs contributed by the people of the Center, the first "Patriotic" Talent Show of the Tulare Assembly Center will be held on Friday, June 5, was announced by the Entertainment Committee which met Monday evening to discuss plans to entertain over 4000 people of the Center. Tetsu Komai, Japanese Hollywood star, K-10-1, Kei Sato, Pasadena, E-4-2, and eighteen unit representatives led the issei group, while Yoichi Nakase, Bueland, D-19-1, and a reporter of Tulare News represented the nisei unit in the discussion.

Nisei and issei talents of all ages are asked to participate in the coming shows, which will be given as often as programs are available. Those interested can sign up with the committee men or at the Tulare News, where all matters concerning the show will be centralized. Outsiders are asked to cooperate by handing in names of people, who are able to perform.

## COMMISSIONERS TO BE CHOSEN

Five commissioners, who will act as coordinators will be appointed by Nile Amonsen, Center manager, it was announced by Ken Utsunomiya, chairman of the Provisional Council.

These men will be commissioners of works and maintenance, mess and lodgings, service, welfare and safety. They will sit in on all committee as well as council meetings. The appointments will be made before petitions for candidacy for councilmen are filed, according to Ken.

The election of unit representatives to the Tulare Center Council will be held on June 8, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Two councilmen will be chosen from each of the ten units. A run-off will be held on June 11, if necessary.

Qualifications are as follows:

1. Candidate shall be a resident of the unit he shall represent.
2. Candidate shall be twenty-three years of age or older.
3. Any qualified candidate shall have fifteen or more signatures of qualified voters from his unit on a form to be provided by the council.
4. Any man or woman, issei or American-born, meeting the above three provisions, shall be a qualified candidate.

### FILING OF CANDIDACY

1. Any qualified candidate shall file his intention to run with the recording secretary of the council at Council Headquarters, D-4-5.
2. The recording secretary shall notify the headquarters of the unit the candidate has filed his candidacy for, and his name shall be posted in the bulletin board at the headquarters. All candidacy's shall be published in the Tulare News.

3. There shall be no further filing of candidacy after 12 noon, June 2.

### QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTER

1. Any person who is 18 years of age or older is qualified to vote.
2. The voter shall be a resident of the unit he votes in.

### VOTING PLACE

A voting booth will be provided in the unit headquarters for the election.

### ELECTION

1. Candidate must have a simple majority to be elected.
2. In event that no candidate receives a majority of votes in any unit in the election, a run-off of those highest pluralities shall be conducted.
3. In event that one candidate receives a majority of votes in a unit a run-off of two highest pluralities shall be conducted for the other councilman.


