The maximum amount of any family will not exceed \$7.50. (People over 16 years old are not considered members of the family.)

GERMS

BY DR. WM FURUTA

"Seeing is believing"
may be a valuable phrase,
but in the case of "germs"
this popular saying simply
does not work. By "germs"
we mean those small living
creatures responsible for
a large number of diseases
attacking man. So small
are these minute imps that
after being magnified a
thousand times under a mi-
croscope, they are almost
as large as a pin point!
A housefly normally carries
millions and millions of
germs inside its alimentary
tract!

These "germs", or more
appropriately called micro-
organisms, are usually di-
vided into several basic
classes according to their
characteristics. In the
first and the largest group
are the bacteria which be-
long to the plant kingdom.
They are the responsible
agents of such diseases as
tuberculosis, pneumonia,

diphtheria, typhoid fever
and others. The animal
kingdom is represented by
the protozoa, some members
of which are responsible
for malaria, syphilis,
and a certain type of dys-
entery common in the Ori-
ent. Lastly, there is a
group of micro-organisms
so small that each indi-
vidual is invisible, only
clusters of them being de-
tectable under the micro-
scope. These are the vi-
ruses which take part in
sick diseases as small pox,
measles, mumps, etc.

Just where are these
microbes to be found? The
answer is rather simple;
they can be located in the
air, in the soil, in water,
in fact everywhere. If
you had the eyes of a mi-
croscope, you will be al-
lured to see countless
number of microbes swarming
about on your skin.
