Dear Dad,

Received your letter a few days ago and thanks. Due to unfavorable weather conditions we were unable to work for a few days last week. Putting a full days work that is about 8-9 hours, we thin about half an acre of beets, which is about seven dollars. His says that we are very fortunate to get fourteen dollars an acre, for they are working for eight and a half dollars an acre. His is not thinning beets, but planting spuds. He says it rains a lot there, too.

I'm on seasonal leave and not on an indefinite leave. Knowing it is very impossible for me to be deferred, I haven't tried as yet, for an occupational deferment.

Glad to hear that you're taking mom out to look around the country. I'll sure

would be nice to smell the country
air after two years in camp. Ge. camp
life is really monotonous.

Glad to hear that you are
doing fine, and having a nice farmer
really helps to keep up the morale.

We are doing fine so don't worry
about us. Well, take it easy and give
my regards to your and Jack. Boy the
wags have their baby getting along fine.
