TOP COURT BACKS RULING ON COVENANTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 12—The United States Supreme Court last Monday issued two specific orders to support its ruling of last week that racial covenants cannot be enforced.

The high tribunal directed the California supreme court to reconsider rulings which upheld eviction of D. Amer and Yim Kim, of Korean and Chinese descent, from a Los Angeles area reserved for "Caucasians".

It also flatly reversed an Ohio supreme court order requiring trustees of the "Monroe Avenue Church of Christ," in Columbus, to vacate covenanted property they had acquired.

Ruling on Eisler Case to Affect U. S. Aliens Facing Deportation

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 12—Japanese aliens awaiting deportation under current Immigration Service procedures have won another reprieve as a result of a ruling made last May 5 by Justice T. Alan Goldsborough of the Federal District Court here, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee reported today.

The ruling came in connection with deportation proceedings against Gerhard Eisler and four others accused of communistic activities.

Justice Goldsborough, ruling that aliens cannot legally be deported under present procedures, granted a temporary injunction to restrain the United States Attorney General and the Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service from continuing deportations under present methods. The court ruled that since the immigration service comes under the Adminis-

trative Procedure Act of 1946, its hearings must be conducted by impartial examiners outside the service as defined in the injunction.

This ruling definitely will affect deportation orders against hundreds of Japanese aliens who are unable to reside here permanently because of the expiration of their status as treaty merchants, students or visitors, the Washington JACL ADC office reported.

Jack Wasserman, former member of the Board of Immigration Appeals of the Justice Department, informed JACL-ADC national legislative director Mike Masaoka that the effect of the ruling would be to hold up all deportations under present methods until the courts could decide the issue.

The injunction was sought by Lee Pressman and Joseph Forer, Washington attorneys for the five men, who argued their clients were denied such impartial hearings when their cases were heard before immigration officers. They explained that under present procedures, officers of the Immigration Service holding the hearings have been prosecuting officials at one time and examiners at another. Pressman and Forer construed the ruling to mean that the Immigration Service is as much bound by the requirements of the 1946 act to grant a fair hearing with impartial hearing officers as are other Government agencies.

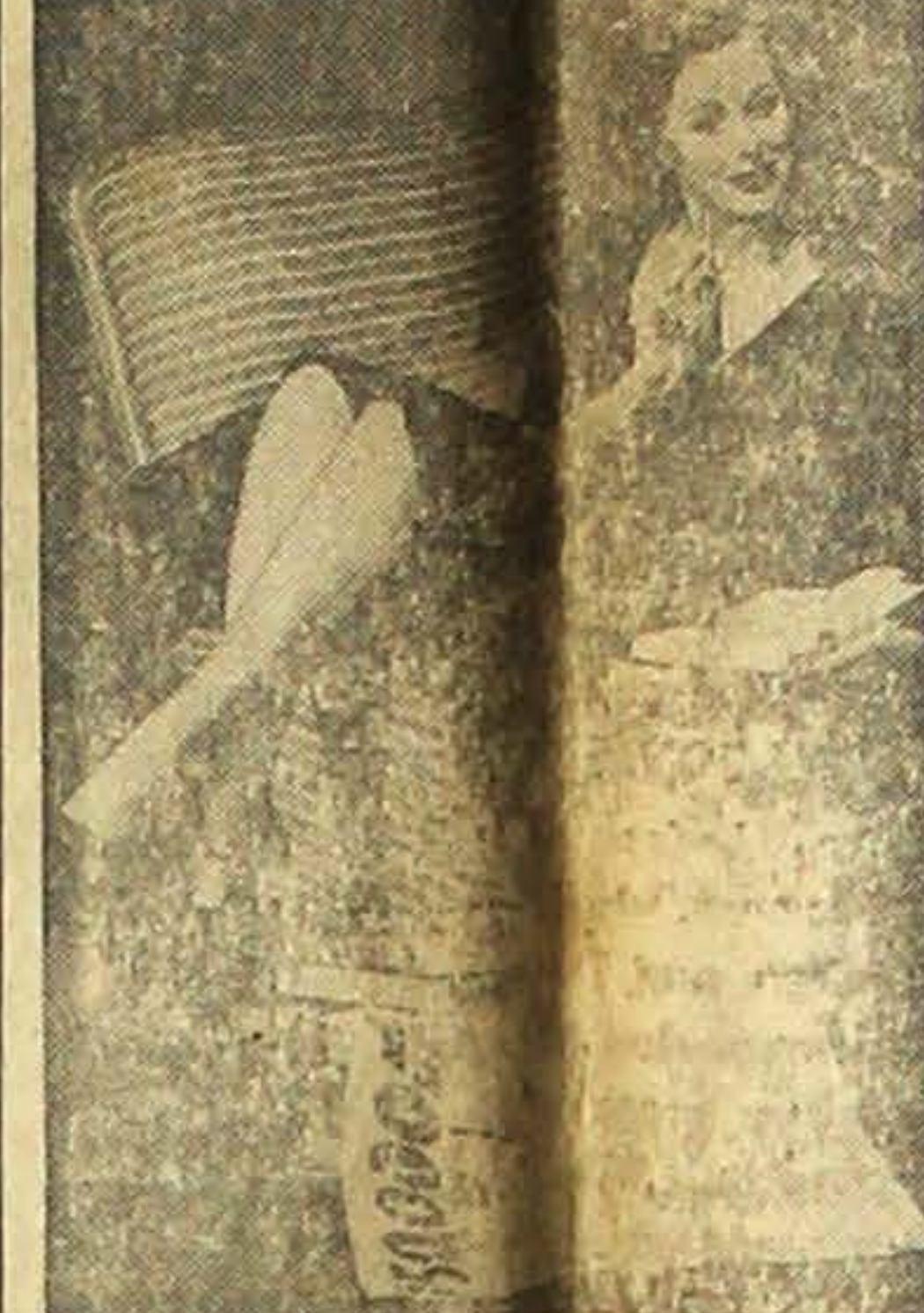
Attorney General Tom Clark, however, served notice that the Government would contest the ruling perhaps up to the Supreme Court. He said that "it has been our position since the passage of the Administrative Procedures Act of 1946 that it did not apply to deportation proceedings." He added his department would "take all necessary steps to have the case adjudicated as quickly as possible so that we can proceed with the deportations."

Justice Goldsborough's ruling offered fresh hope to those Japanese facing imminent separation from their families. Legally denied powers to make any dispensation to Japanese aliens because of the ineligibility to citizenship provisions of the immigration statutes, the Justice Department, in its general tightening of immigration practices, has issued a series of orders seeking the deportation of Japanese who have lost their legal right to remain in this country with the expiration of the commercial treaty binding Japan and the United States. Temporary relief for these aliens has thus far been provided with the introduction of H. R. 3566 and a number of private bills.

The Washington JACL-ADC office reported that still under advisement by the Tenth District Court of Appeals is another deportation litigation upon which decision the fate of Japanese deportees may be determined. The case was argued last January by A. L. Wirin, of the Los Angeles firm of Wirin, Kido and Okrand, who presented the case of seven persons of Japanese ancestry facing deportation. Wirin said no question of disloyalty is involved and that the appellants are being discriminated solely because of their race.

The Japanese aliens involved in the case include those whose legal residence in this country was changed to an illegal status with the abrogation of the U. S. Japan commercial treaty in 1941. Mr. Wirin said that the cases will be taken to the Supreme Court in the event of an adverse decision from the appellate court.

FINAL WORD ON 'CITIZENS' DUE JULY 29

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., May 12—The recent decision rendered by Federal District Judge Louis E. Goodman of San Francisco restoring full U. S. citizenship to so-called wartime "renunciants" will become final July 29 if no appeal is filed before that date by the U. S. government attorneys, according to Wayne M. Collins who handled the case for the American-born plaintiffs.

According to information obtained from Collins it is still not too late for any person to join in the suits to be restored to citizenship.

Those who, under duress, renounced their American citizenship at Tule Lake WRA center or elsewhere and who now wish to cancel their renunciation may secure further information by writing to Collins at Mills Tower, 220 Bush st., San Francisco, Calif.

Persons seeking to be restored to citizenship should supply the following information:

1. Your full name.
2. Present address.
3. Date of birth.
4. Place of birth.
5. Place of renunciation.
6. Did you or did you not receive a letter from the attorney general approving the renunciation.

JACL-ADC Hails U. S. Decision On Restrictive Covenants

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 12—The United States Supreme Court's rulings last week that courts may not legally enforce restrictive covenants barring persons from white neighborhoods because of their race or color were hailed by the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee which pointed out that the decisions would have no small effect on the thousands of persons of Japanese ancestry seeking to re-establish their homes since the evacuation.

The court's decisions are expected to have an immediate and direct impact on those Japanese seeking relief from the lower court orders which barred them from residing in restricted areas. They would particularly affect a number of Nisei veterans throughout the country who have bought homes only to find that they could not occupy them because of these racial restrictive pacts. For the others crowded in the "Little Tokyos" on the West Coast and potential home purchasers who are on a constant lookout for better housing accommodations, the rulings offered greater hope for relief.

The Japanese American Citizens League, which took an active part in the fight against the covenants, regards the decisions as most constructive and describe them as a

milestone in the progress of all minority groups toward attainment of their civil rights objective. The JACL, it was recalled, had entered a friend-of-the-court brief in the four Negro covenants cases which were argued last January and upon which decisions were arrived at last May 3. It was pointed out that the JACL had gone even further by urging the Supreme Court in a separate brief to review two California cases, involving Americans of Chinese and Korean ancestry, as illustrations of how the enforcement of racial deeds affect minorities other than those of Negro birth.

Although those two California cases were not argued before the court, the tribunal's attention was called to these litigations. The JACL brief was also cited by one of the counsel in the Negro cases to demonstrate how covenants are used against World War II veterans because of their race or color. The arguments of the JACL stressed the pernicious effects of these housing agreements and the hurt caused by the courts upholding these restrictive pacts.

The brief said that while one of the reasons often advanced by the military for the evacuation is that the Japanese lived by themselves in "clannish Little Tokyos," the increasing resentment by white owners to put property under covenants had more than ever before forced the Japanese to "Little Tokyoize" themselves. The Little Tokyos would not have reappeared "had not a potent and powerful force worked against it. That force was the race restrictive covenant," the JACL brief declared.

The four cases decided last May 3 involved only Negroes, but the rulings were broad enough to include all minorities who are subjected to the discriminations created by these private racial contracts.

"Next week will be Clean-Up Week all over the city," Green said, "and the council is hoping that the Jackson Street area will make the best showing of any district in Seattle."

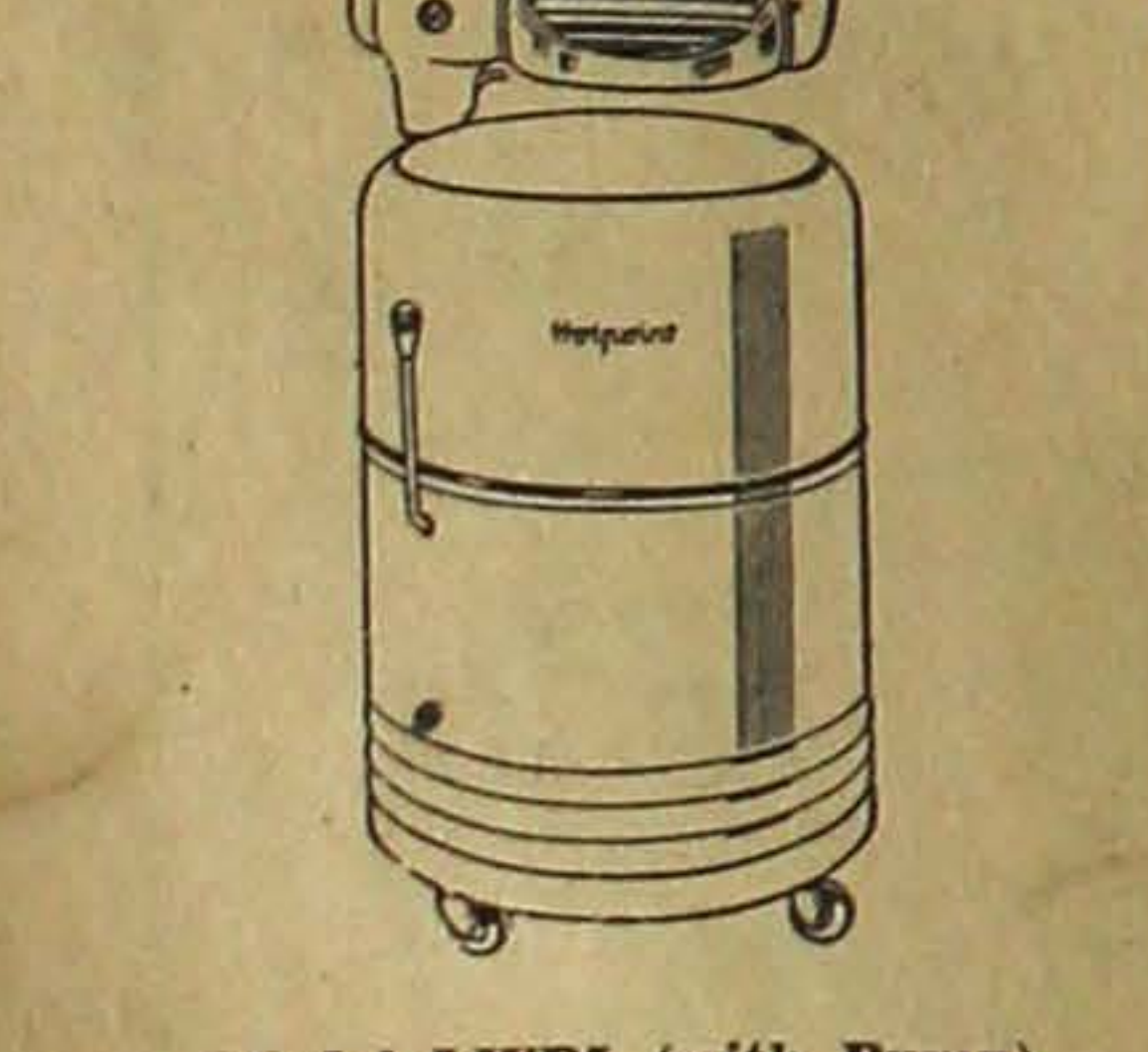

Nisei Girl Attacked, Companion Robbed down 'Lover's Lane'

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 12 (Rafu Shimpo Dispatch)—A 23-year-old Japanese American girl was raped and her companion was robbed of \$21 last Thursday morning at the foot of Loring in Pacific Beach.

The "Lover's Lane" attack occurred while the couple were seated in their auto about 1 a.m., police said today, as they began a search for the thug, described as a Negro about 25 to 35 years of age.

At the point of a snub-nosed blue steel revolver, the two were ordered to get off the automobile. The couple were forced to walk some 200 yards. After tying up the male victim, the girl was assaulted in the secluded spot nearby.

The bandit later left the bound girl beside her escort. Sighting another car parked next to the vehicle owned by the Japanese, the assailant repeated his attack on a white couple.

The thug took them to the same spot where he left his first victims and later ordered the Caucasian youth to drive him to southeast San Diego under threats of death.

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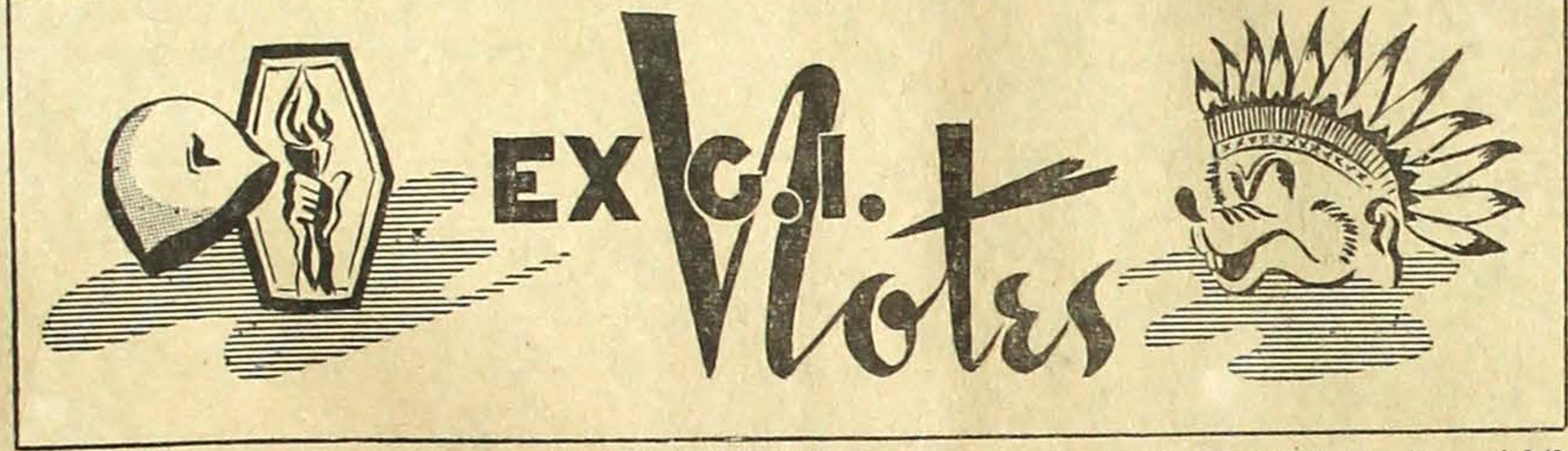
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MEETING NOTES

VETS LOSE TO HIGHLINE, 9-5

The Nisei Vets ball club, journeying out of town for last Sunday's Puget Sound League tussle, absorbed a 9-5 shellacking at the hands of a hard-hitting Highline team, the game being played on the White Center diamond as the result of a last-minute switch. The loss was the first of the season for the Vets, who now have a .677 percentage.

The Vets drew first blood by scoring two runs in the initial frame and added one more in the third but Highline drew on even terms by knocking over one counter in each of the first three frames. Nakamichi, who started for the Vets and was touched for six hits during his stay on the mound, was lifted in the third inning after two hits and a walk had scored one Highline run. Edo Sasaki, appearing in a relief role, pitched himself out of a huge jam in that inning after an infield error had filled the bases with none out, retiring the side without further damage in a nice display of clutch hurling.

Highline went ahead 5-3 in the fourth inning and held the lead the rest of the way, adding a run in the seventh and icing the game with

a three-run burst in the eighth frame, featured by Al Aries' long blast over the wall in left-center-field. Up to that time, the Vets had kept the game close by virtue of Kiyohara's inside-the-park home run in the fifth inning and another counter in the eighth which resulted when Funai doubled and came home on a wild throw into left field by the Highline catcher.

The Vets, although never able to cluster more than one safety per inning, managed to gather a total of eight for the game. Kinoshita and Matsushita getting two each to fatten up their averages. Kiyohara's round-tripper, Funai's double, and Fujiwara's double were the longest blows gathered by the Vets. Al Aries, Highline outfielder, was trouble all day long, with two singles and a homer out of five trips to the plate.

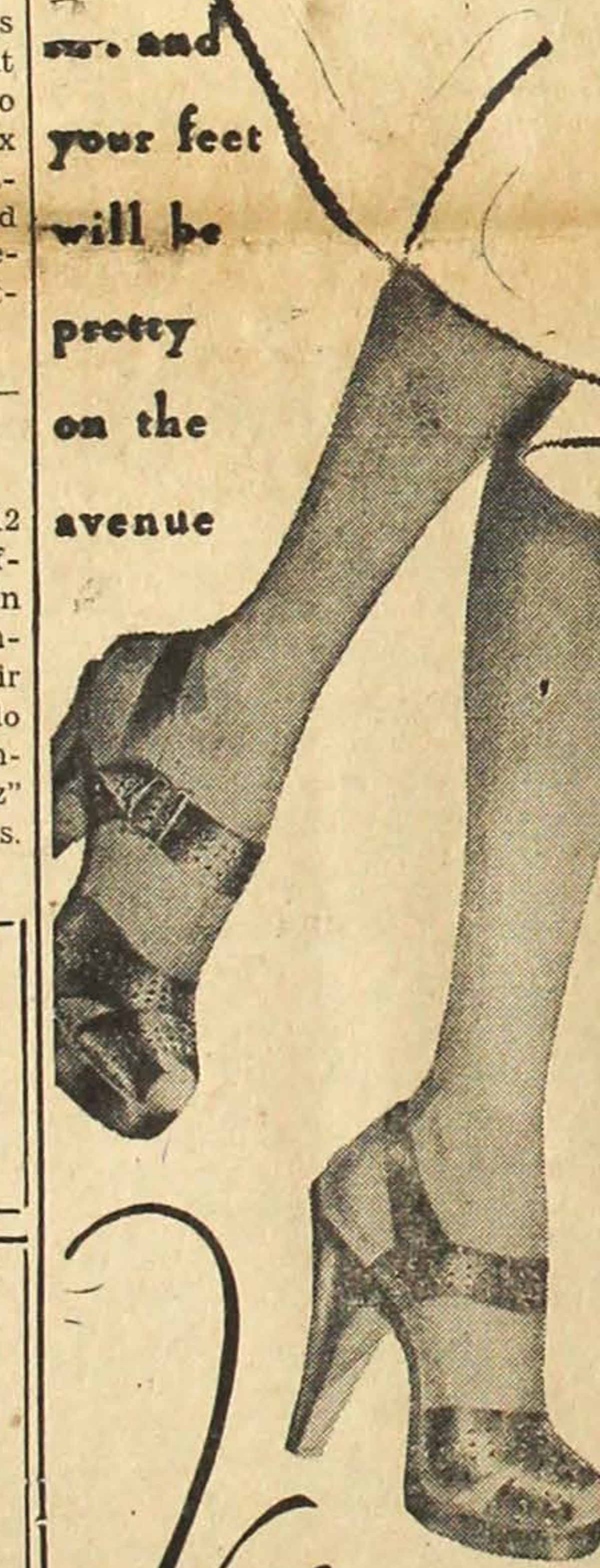
