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MEMORIAL DAY MAY 31 A BUDDY POPPY REMINDER

For the seventh year since Pearl Harbor, our people will find themselves decorating the graves of the nation's honored dead on Memorial Day while the spectre of war again looms on horizons not too distant.

Are we keeping the faith with the heroes who died in yesterday's battles? Do those who rest in the hallowed graves of our national cemeteries and in distant lands sleep in peace? If they could speak to us from their silent tombs—would they commend our efforts to justify their sacrifices? Or would they deplore our failure to appreciate how great a price they paid to defend the nation which they entrusted to our care? Would they agree we are doing our utmost to defend the legacy of freedom which we inherited

through their patriotism? Or would they rebuke us with silent contempt for the pledges we have failed to keep?

There is reason to believe history will testify that America, as a nation, fought its way to victory in World War II inspired by an unconquerable desire for the blessings of human liberty. We predict that future historians will make due note of America's steadfast allegiance to the fundamental ideals of freedom for which it hero dead have given their lives. Whether or not we as individual citizens have earned the mute respect of our soldier dead poses a question which we must answer for ourselves. In our own hearts we know how far we have permitted our patriotism to encroach upon our personal comforts or our personal comforts or our selfish desires.

Each man must be his own judge and jury. If the verdict finds him guilty of disloyalty to our country, punishment is inescapable. He may succeed in fooling others, but he is doomed to suffer a sense of self-loathing whenever he remembers the brave men to whom the spirit of Memorial Day is dedicated.

Let us all—each and every one of us—perpetuate our undying gratitude to our fallen veterans by making sure that those who survived do not remain in need. Let us see that the dependent orphans and widows of our valiant dead do not suffer from want. This may be achieved most effectively by your purchase of a V.F.W. IT'S PAINLESS
Are YOU registered to vote? It's a fair question, inasmuch as we suspect that a great many eligible Nisei citizens have not yet complied with the first step which is prerequisite to exercising the democratic privilege of voting for the candidates and issues of our choice. With one of the most important presidential elections in history scheduled to be decided by the electorate this coming November, no adult person who takes pride in the fact that he is an American citizen can afford to bear the stigma of being "not registered to vote".

The process of registration is so simple that it's actually painless, especially right now when the registration clerks are not busy and can take care of everyone with a minimum of waiting. A few questions, a couple of signatures, an assignment of a voting precinct, and the process of registration is completed—a total of only five minutes of your time.

If you live in Seattle, you may register on the first floor of the County-City Building. Registration books will be open until August 14th, then will be closed for a time until the final registration period. Out-of-towners may usually register in their respective city halls or other designated places.

Our advice to all unregistered eligibles is, don't wait until the fi-

nal registration period, which, like the week before Christmas, will be one mad rush. Don't sweat, don't strain, take it easy—register while it's painless!
