# GREAT WASTE

By STAFF CORRESPONDENT (Special to Northwest Times) MILE AND A HALF AWAY FROM Vanport, Oreg., June 9-Blocked out by state highway patrol in cooperation with the armed men of the Ninth Infantry, the city of Vanport which drowned in less than twenty minutes on Sunday afternoon, May 30, lies a sea of great waste in human lives and proper-

A strange historical note is that the Vanport flood, which occurred May 30, 1948, is the day before the fifty-ninth anniversary of the tragic Johnstown, Pa., flood which on May 31, 1889, claimed 2,200 lives and cost ten-million-dollar loss.

The Johnstown flood was caused by the bursting of a retaining dam outside the city which had 30,000 people.

The Vanport flood, on the other hand, was caused when the Columbia river waters burst through leakage in the dikes. Vanport's population was 18,500.

The Johnstown flood is the most stion tragic in the United States to date. and the Vanport flood the most tragic flood in the Pacific Northwest.
