## VANPORT CITY NOW SEA OF GREAT WASTE

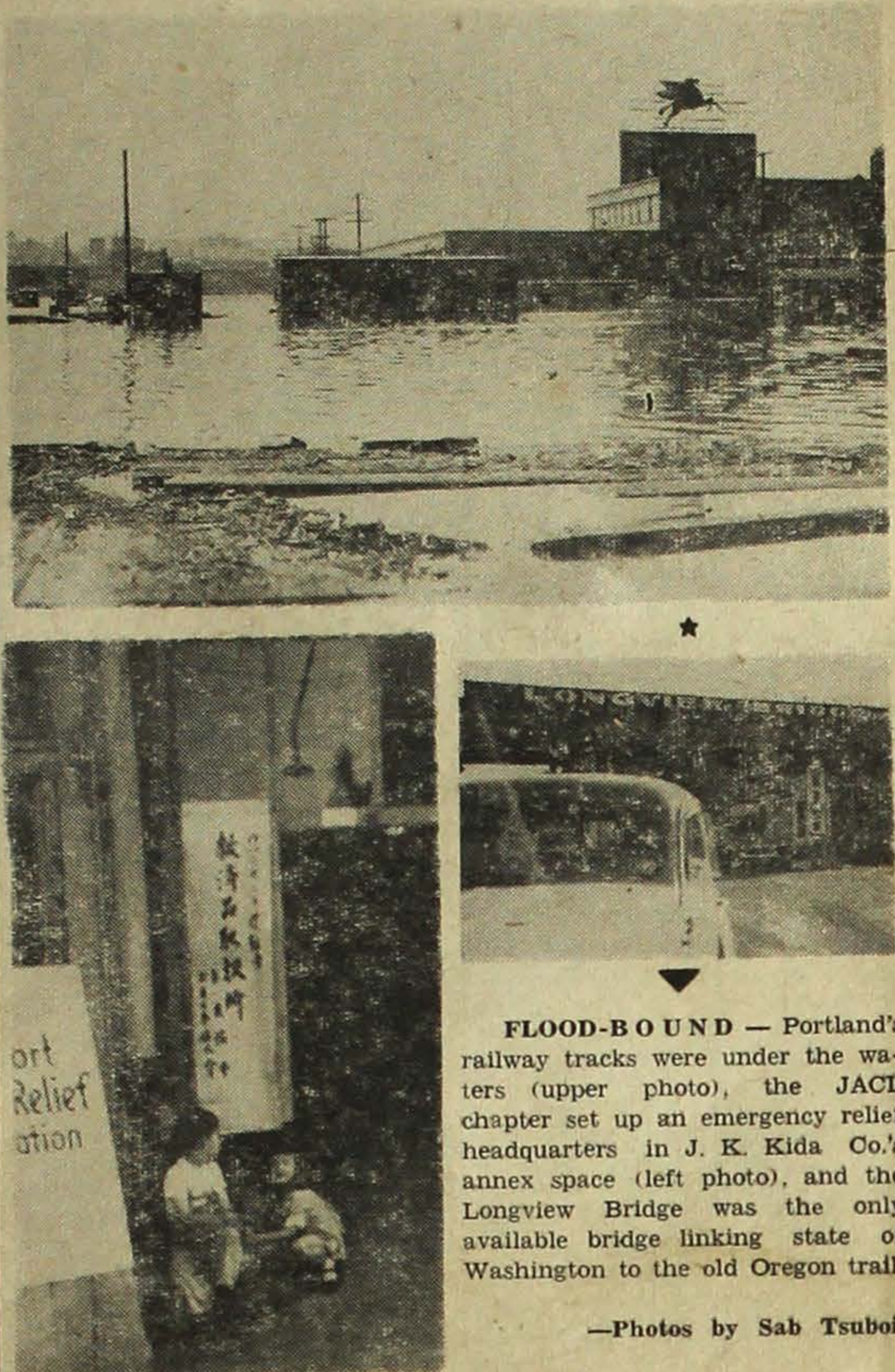
MILE AND A HALF AWAY FROM Vanport, Ore., June 9—Blocked out by state highway patrol in cooperation with the armed men of the Ninth Infantry, the city of Vanport which drowned in less than twenty minutes on Sunday afternoon, May 30, lies a sea of great waste in human lives and property.

A strange historical note is that the Vanport flood, which occurred May 30, 1948, is the day before the fifty-ninth anniversary of the tragic Johnstown, Pa., flood which on May 31, 1889, claimed 2,200 lives and cost ten-million-dollar loss.

The Johnstown flood was caused by the bursting of a retaining dam outside the city which had 30,000 people.

The Vanport flood, on the other hand, was caused when the Columbia river waters burst through a leakage in the dikes. Vanport's population was 18,500.

The Johnstown flood is the most tragic in the United States to date, and the Vanport flood the most tragic flood in the Pacific Northwest.

## When Dikes Broke, Vanport Became A Panorama of Nature's Wrath

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9—At 5 o'clock Sunday morning, May 30, the Vanport housing authority issued a mimeographed statement to its residents stating that there is no cause for alarm, that the dikes will hold and that a 24-hour notice will be given for evacuation.

At 4 o'clock that afternoon, the dikes broke. The usually slow-drifting Columbia river was a wild sea of terror.

At 4:20 o'clock, Vanport was no more. It had sunk.

And the area which was once Vanport was a panorama of nature's wrath as houses and people were lost.

## Sato's Fled Flood With 9 Children

The Sato's comprises of Ben, 65, his wife, Kayo, 54, who are with Mr. and Mrs. John Hickey, and their nine children: Tommie (Tomiko), 25, sophomore at University of Oregon, Eugene; Joe, 23, employee in Benson hotel, Portland; Henry, 22, now in Spokane; Wake, 18, staying with Mrs. Stater in Beaverton, Ore.; Yasuko, 15, and Mary 16, with Mrs. Johnson; George, 14, Herbert, 13, and Alami, 12, with Mrs. Larson. The Hickeys, Mrs. Johnson, and Mrs. Larson have their homes in St. John's Woods.

Two other daughters, Yuri, 20, and Mrs. Tsuyako Matsumoto, 27, of 1322 N. E. Terrace, are in Seattle, Wash.

Mr. Sato, the father, is employed as a gardener at Lewis & Clark college in Portland.

## Hopes Wane

Arrangements for the first community-wide memorial services for the Nisei War Dead, to be held from 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 19 in the First Methodist Church, 5th & Marion were completed this week, Yoshito Fujii, president of the Nisei War Memorial Committee, revealed today.

The remains of five Nisei War Dead will arrive in Seattle on Wednesday, June 16, escorted by five former members of the 442nd Combat Team. Major Steven Capasso, of the Army Graves Registration Depot at Ogden, Utah, will also arrive with the escorts.

Fujii announced that following the services, the remains of the following will be taken to Veterans Memorial Cemetery at Washelli Cemetery: Sgt. Ned Nakamura, T/5 Eugene T. Amabe, Pfc. Yoshio Kato, Pfc. Yoshito Noritake, Pfc. Tetsuo Shigaya, Pvt. Jiro Kanetomi, Pvt. Eugene Hayashi, Pfc. Masao F. Shigemura will be interred in Lake View Cemetery, June 22.

## NW Airlines Gets Safety Award

Northwest Airlines now flying routes totaling 17,761 miles in the United States, Alaska and the Orient today won another safety award from the National Safety Council based on the airlines' 1947 operations record. Frank C. Judd, vice-president Western Region, announced today.

The airline, second oldest in the United States, also set another safety record by flying a total of 1,228,604,000 passengers miles since the spring of 1942 without a fatal accident.

Northwest Airlines was one of only two airlines in the United States to reach the billion mile mark without a fatal accident.

## Houses Sought for Homeless Nisei Children in City of Seattle

There is an urgent need for good temporary boarding homes for homeless Nisei children being cared for by the four state-licensed adoption agencies, George Fahey, chairman of the Seattle-King County Council of Social Agencies, announced this week.

The Council made its appeal on behalf of the Associated Lutheran Welfare, 307 Medical Arts Building, Main 1742; Catholic Children's Bureau, 907 Terry Avenue, Main 8880; Medina Children's Service, 3020 Arcade Building, Eliot 0966; and Washington Children's Home, 6516-32nd Avenue, Kenwood 8696. All four are non-profit, state-licensed agencies, and the latter three are Community Chest-supported.

All four agencies have Nisei children placed in their care from time to time. Most are from temporarily broken homes to which they may eventually be returned. Prolonged illness of the parents, desertion, and removal from their homes by court action because of neglect are some of the reasons for making the children temporarily homeless.

The case of abandoned children presents the most difficult problem for the agencies, for it calls for several foster homes in readiness to receive the children on short notice. There is also a need for parents willing to adopt such children.

The agencies try to place children in wholesome, happy boarding homes as quickly as possible, so that they will have the advantage of normal family life rather than institutional care.

Care for these children in foster homes may range from a few days to several months and longer. The agency pays for their board, as well

as all medical and clothing expenses.

The foster homes must be licensed by the State Welfare Department, after certification by a City Health Nurse or member of the Visiting Nurse Service as to wholesome, healthful conditions, and proper sleeping space and facilities.

The Associated Lutheran Welfare can accept only Lutheran boarding homes, and the Catholic Children's Bureau only Catholic homes, but the Medina Children's Service and Washington Children's Home have a need for foster parents of all denominations.

All persons who are in a position to offer temporary care to such children were urged by Mr. Foley to contact directly one of the four agencies.

A membership drive is being held by the Baptist WWG's with Chickie Ishihara and Betty Jean Andrews as captains of their respective teams. The losing team is to treat the winners to a beach party.

Friends of the WWG members and parents are invited to attend the installation ceremony.

The WWG's will take over the church choir for the summer months with Mr. Ira Jones as the director.

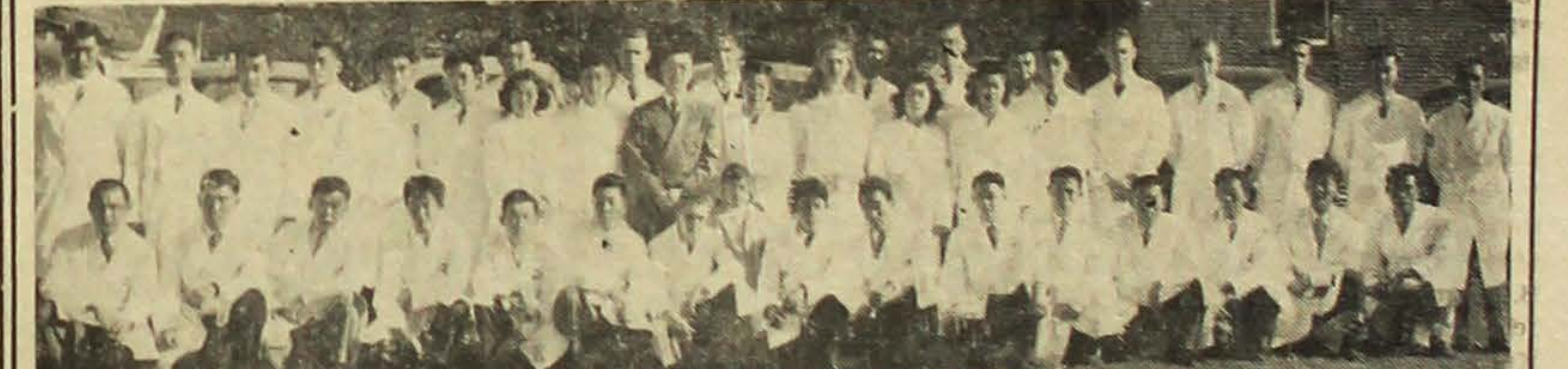

The Vanport Japanese homeless has suffered from several cases of discrimination in housing.

One girl was told the room was rented. She started to walk down the stairs, and then returned to the landlady to advise her that it should be a nice idea if she took down the sign.

Other Japanese, although they identified themselves as flood victims, were frankly told by landlords that Orientals are not welcome.

Mrs. Marjorie Hughes, disaster case worker from Indianapolis, Ind., in the eastern area, said the Vanport flood was a major catastrophe in comparison to the Bradford, Pa., flood, the Coatesville, Ind., tornado, and the Monticello, Ky., tornado.

The J. K. Kida Co. graciously offered its annex space as JACL relief headquarters which were managed by Bill Oda and George Azumano. The JACL office was handled by Toshi Kuge, president, and his wife.

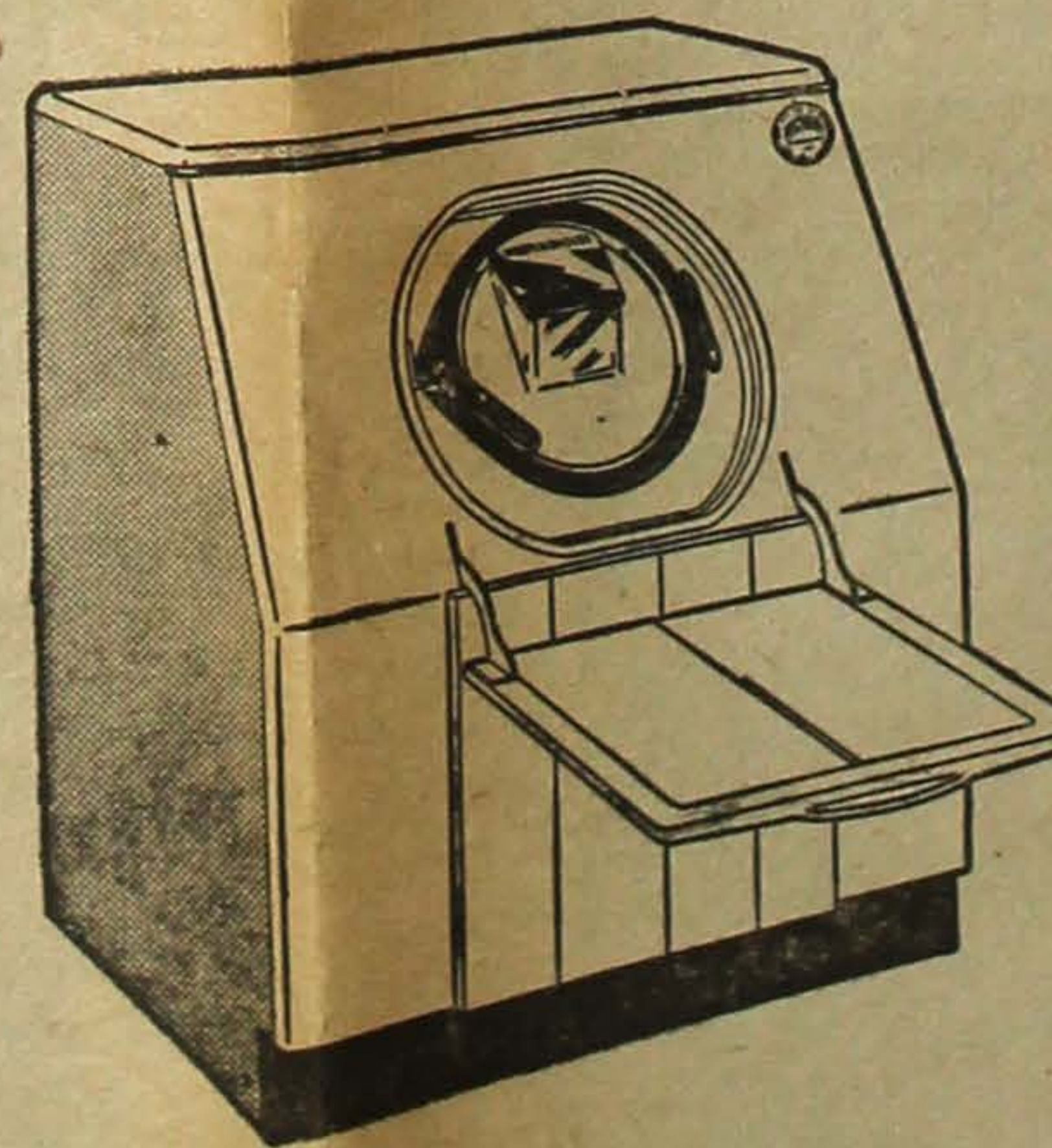
