WHO WANTS "HOUSING"?

THE CENTRAL planners are at it again. They are getting set to try to push housing legislation through the special session of congress. There is hardly a bill to be considered that the "planners" and socialist-minded experimenters will push harder than a public housing bill. They realize that government housing, and the huge and wasteful spending that goes with it, would put the federal government right in business.

What is the origin of the idea that our government should subsidize housing and pass the costs of it to the taxpayers? Where does the idea come from that the government of a nation is obligated to furnish houses and lodging to its people? These ideas did not originate in America, the land of the free. They came from Europe and from Russia. These ideas have been tried over there. They have never turned out any results, except colossal failure.

Promise THE ONLY lasting and Spend effect of European public housing has been public debt. Their projects did not give them more houses, nor eliminate slums, nor provide homes for the poor. However, their experiments did give the Socialists and Communists a free ride to power. Time after time, these political gangs rode to power on public housing programs—so easy was it to promise and spend, promise and spend. Now, their people continue to pay heavy taxes for projects long since dead.

It is amazing that lessons of history are thus ignored, and the American people are asked to turn over their housing problems to the government. Our nation is great today, and our land a

land of plenty, because we Americans have had the initiative to do things for ourselves. We have not been willing, in the past, to turn our everyday lives over to an expanding government. Our fathers did not stand back and beg the federal government to do everything for them.

Freedom THE BRITISH people have had unhappy times with public housing and subsidies. During the thirties they tried public housing on a large scale. But it was only after government had failed, that private industry came in and produced a real boom in housing. The present Socialist government in England is interested in public housing. It is routine there to interfere with the liberties and freedoms of the people.

Proper Silver Essential For Baby

The other day my sister Jean and I went shopping for a baby gift. Jean suggested that we select something in silver, because everyone would surely be sending dresses and sweaters and the usual sort of thing a baby gets. So off we went to the jewelry store . . . and we found the most wonderful gift you'd ever dream of . . . a step-up set of 1847 Rogers Bros.' First Love silver.

The complete set consists of a tiny spoon for when the mother starts to feed the baby, a small spoon and fork for when baby starts to feed himself, and a youngster set for when the child becomes expert at manipulating a knife, fork and spoon.

Jean bought the set. The tiny spoon is something very new . . . very small, about the size of an after-dinner spoon. The jeweler told us that many mothers and doctors approve of it because they feel that baby spoons are too large for a baby's mouth. I particularly like the small spoon and fork, or Educator set, as it is called. The youngster set will be very welcome when

the child is older and ready for it.

Children and mothers today are certainly fortunate. So many scientifically planned things to make life easier for them both. With this new step-up set in proper sizes for each stage in a child's development, it's so much simpler for a mother to teach her child how to use silverware properly.

We had an interesting chat with the jeweler. I remarked that I remembered mother buying 1847 Rogers Bros. way back when I was a little girl, and he told us that the three Rogers brothers, William, Asa and Simeon, were the first to turn out silverplate on a commercial basis when, after years of experimenting, they founded the American silverplate industry in 1847. Before that time virtually all silverware was made by melting silver coins and then fashioning the silver into spoons and forks, so that silverware was confined only to the very wealthy. Today, thanks to their efforts, every family is enabled to give its children fine silverware right from the start so they'll grow up with an appreciation for the beauty of correct silver. Aren't we Americans lucky?

ABEL BELIEVES IN EQUITABLE FLOW OF FUND

Harry A. Abel, Jr., of Seattle, the aggressive Republican candidate seeking the nomination for state treasurer, firmly believes there should be a more equitable distribution of the state's multi-million dollar accounts.

Following an extensive statewide tour, in which it is generally conceded Abel made much headway in his drive for votes, Abel asserts: "It is increasingly obvious that

taxpayers throughout the state are becoming more and more concerned about who handles the state's funds. I was repeatedly told that the office should be completely free of political entanglements and the treasurer should not be under obligation to any bank or bankers.

As a result, I am not committed to any special interest groups, and am completely free to administer the duties of the office in the most satisfactory manner.

Abel attended the Naval Academy at Annapolis, graduated from the University of Washington and served as a naval officer in World War II.

Law 877 Providing New Benefits For Veterans Now Effective

All veterans who have been granted compensation awards of 60 per cent or more for their service connected disabilities and who are married or have minor children or a dependent parent or parents are entitled to additional benefits under the provisions of Public Law 877, signed by President Truman, July 2, 1948.

A statement has been issued by the National Commander of the Disabled American Veterans, John L. Golob, in Cincinnati, in which he states:

"Benefits under the law will date from September 1," said Commander Golob.

"We do not know the exact method the Veterans Administration will use in determining entitlement to these added benefits, but we do know the VA will require each veteran drawing compensation of 60 per cent or more to submit legal proof of his marriage as well as official birth records of his child or children if such evidence has not already been submitted."

In establishing the dependency of a parent or parents, Commander Golob brought out that proof of relationship as well as proof of dependency of a parent will also be required. The veteran's birth cer-

tificate will be considered primary evidence of relationship & affidavit evidence as to the dependency of the parent or parents must be submitted before benefits under the new law will be paid the veteran.

Commander Golob stressed the fact that every veteran who believes himself entitled to these benefits should secure the official records and affidavit evidence of dependency as once and file them with the VA. The offices of all National Service Officers of the DAV stand ready to assist any disabled veteran in securing the necessary legal evidence and preparing the required affidavits to establish entitlement.

"Don't write the VA," said Golob, "but do get the evidence we know they will request."

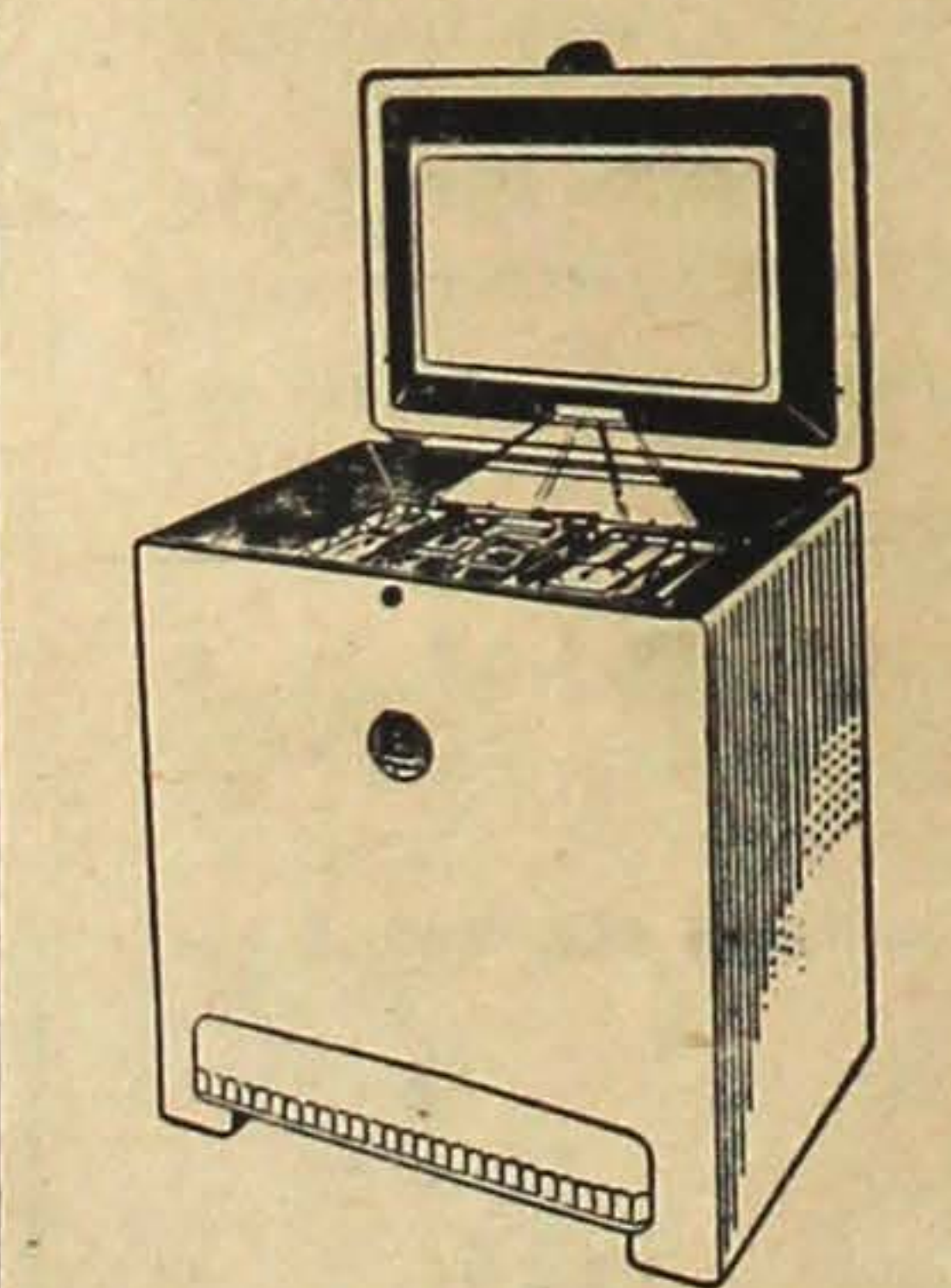
