An additiona 2,000 names, however, were added to the list of those seeking to regain their U.S. rights late in August, extending final settlement in the case for several months.

The original action was filed by Wayne M. Collins, attoreny, on behalf of a group of about 1,000 Tule Lake residents who raised \$100,000 in November, 1945.


Crime Specialist Returns to N. D.



FOR NORMAN THOMAS Dear editor:

Turn the clock back to summer 1944. At that time the world was very dark for us Japanese in America. We were in various camps and mary and juniors. New boys' class there was a powerful anti-Japanese in primary department. campaign, the Chandler and Dies investigations, etc. There were threats to "burn us out" and "mur- sei every Monday. der us" if we were allowed to return to the Pacific Coast.

Then in May, 1944 there was held the national convention of the Socjalist Party led by that noble man, Norman Thomas. A woman delegate from the state of Washington presented a resolution demanding that Helen May Smith, superintendent. the Japanese be allowed to return to the Pacific Coast, be given protection by the government and their civil rights restored and that they be promptly reimbursed for losses caused by the evacuation. This resolution was passed unanimously and Norman Thomas fought bravely for this accomplishment.


Remember this was at a time when we were called the worst enemy alens and "A Jap is a Jap. whether Issei or Nisei." At that time the Democrats and Republicans were demanding sterner restrictions for the Japanese and Henry Wallace then Vice-President, remained silent. Only Norman Thomas and the Socialists fought for the Japanese in this darkest hour. What seemed impossible then has been accomp-I shed-we are back on the Coast. our civil rights restored, evacuation claims bill passed.

The Socialist Party is small, but as the article in Look Magazine states, most of the progressive legislation now adopted was first put forward by that Party. Even if we felt no debt of gratitude we could feel proud to support such a man as Norman Thomas. But the Japarese have as their traditional pride that when we are indebted to another, we always repay in full. It is a distinct pride of our race to uphold this tradition.

I am sorry we Issei have no vote to cast, but I want you Nisel to vote for Norman Thomas in November to make our tradition of repaying our debt. Join with such notables as Dr. John Haynes Holmes, National Chairman of the American Civil Liberties Union in a movement called "Independent Voters for Norman Thomas" and support it with votes, funds and prayers.
