

ALL PERSONS NOT YET X-RAYED URGED TO SHOW UP FOR EXAMS; ANTI-TB UNITS NOW IN AREA

Appealing to all persons who have not had their chest X-rays during the Garfield High School Area Chest X-ray Program, Alfred Westberg, general chairman, yesterday reminded Capitol Hill residents that X-ray machines will be conveniently located in the area through November 30.

Consult the X-ray schedule elsewhere in the Northwest Times for the information on the exact locations of the units. The X-rays are free, paid for by Christmas Seals and tax funds.

"Although the turn-out has been very good to date, we are still a long way from a chest X-ray of every person 15 years of age and older. One section of population does not seem to realize the importance of having a chest X-ray during this program. Those are persons who have had a chest X-ray within the last year at their private physicians, as a routine X-ray for their employment, at the Health Department, or on the Christmas Seal X-ray Unit," Westberg said.

He appealed particularly to those persons in pointing out that the purposes of the X-ray program are twofold to find all persons with hidden tuberculosis and to get a complete picture of the tuberculosis condition in the city and county. In order to have this it is important to have information on how many persons' chests show no signs of tuberculosis.

"Health officials predict that if every person has a chest X-ray in this program so they will have a complete picture of the problem, this program can pave the way for the eradication of tuberculosis. This disease claimed 200 lives alone in Seattle and King County last year and caused countless others a great deal of suffering and loss of funds," he explained.

About 98 per cent of those X-rayed will receive the good news that there is no evidence of tuberculosis at the present time. About two out of every 100 X-rayed will be asked to have a second X-ray at the Retake Center, X-ray Headquarters, New Field Artillery Armory.

Westberg asked all businessmen to urge their employees to have a chest X-ray during their lunch hours or allow sufficient time during the day for them to be X-rayed while the X-ray machines are nearby.

The X-ray service is limited to those 15 years of age and older because there are relatively few children who have the disease.

The program is sponsored by the Anti-Tuberculosis League of King County, the King County Medical Society, the Seattle and King County Department of Public Health, the United States Public Health Service, Washington State Department of Health and Finland Sanatorium.

"This is an opportunity to deal tuberculosis a knock-out blow. Don't delay, X-ray today," she reminded.

1,073 X-Rayed Need Care

Of the 60,000 persons X-rayed in the Seattle area chest X-ray program, 1,073 have needed medical attention, it was announced yesterday by Dr. Sydney J. Hawley, chairman of the program's professional services committee.

A total of 645 were referred to their physicians or to the Seattle and King County department of public health for study as tuberculosis or suspected tuberculosis cases. Eighteen of these cases have already been assigned to Finland Sanatorium for treatment.

"It may be sometime before definite figures can be obtained on the total number of active tuberculosis cases found in the program because there is often an unavoidable time lag between the date tuberculosis is suspected and an absolute diagnosis is made," Dr. John H. Fountain, tuberculosis control officer of King County, said.

"Prolonged study and observation are often necessary before a physician can arrive at a definite conclusion." In addition to the suspected tuberculosis cases, 232 persons were referred to physicians as suspected cardiac cases, and another 195 with various forms of cancer, silicosis, bronchiectasis and other chest abnormalities.

Of the 2,000 persons called to the re-take clinic at the Field Artillery Armory for further study, 927 needed no further study after large X-rays were taken. Many of these X-rays showed indications of healed chest conditions or abnormalities of no consequence. All re-take films are reviewed by a committee of King County Medical Society members before recommendations for referrals to physicians are made, Dr. Hawley said.

Masaoka Will Visit Chicago First

WASHINGTON, D. C. Nov. 17—Mike M. Masaoka, national legislative director, JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee, today announced he would visit Chicago, Denver, New York City and Boston during the next few weeks primarily to develop a plan of action on the bill for equality in naturalization and immigration.

His first stop will be Chicago, Nov. 17-20, where he will discuss forthcoming legislative strategy with the board of directors of the National Association of Intergroup Relations. Masaoka is a member of the board.

While in Chicago he also will address a panel discussion at the second national conference on Intergroup Relations.

He will be in Denver Nov. 20-22 to attend the organizational meeting of the Mountain Plains District Council, JACL, and confer with Hito Okada, national president, and Mas Satow, executive director, JACL, both of Salt Lake City.

From Nov. 30 to Dec. 2, Masaoka will meet with the executive board of the Committee for Equality in Naturalization in New York City, and will travel from there to Boston for conferences with Eastern District Council, JACL, officials until Dec. 5.

Throughout his trip, Masaoka said he hopes to confer with national JACL sponsors and meet with a number of newly-elected senators and representatives who are expected to be friendly towards legislation for equality in naturalization and immigration.

Japanese War Brides Welcomed To Join New YWCA Group

Extending a warm welcome to Japanese war brides who have arrived recently in Seattle to make their homes, the Young Women's Christian Association invites these wives to join a new Y.W.C.A. club organized especially for them.

"Activities of this group, the Japanese War Brides' Club, are informal and geared to suit the needs of these young wives," Mrs. Sidney Volinn, of the YWCA staff, explained to the Northwest Times. "Those who do not speak English will find companionship among others who speak Japanese and are also learning a new language."

The club first met in October, with members reminiscing about their homeland and taking a step toward becoming acquainted with their new country. Among Seattle residents who are helping to organize the club are Mrs. Ai Chih Tsai, Mrs. Henry Tatsumi, Mrs. Kazuo Naito and the Rev. Benmyo Oda. These people have also offered to serve as interpreters when necessary.

Parties, discussion groups and other special programs will be planned by members for themselves and occasionally their husbands. Mrs. Volinn, who herself is from Austria and well aware of a newcomer's adjustment problems, will advise and assist the club.

As an introduction to the club and the general program of the YWCA, a Red Feather agency, the brides are invited to attend a club meeting at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, Nov. 22, and later, if they wish, to attend an all-membership tea from 2:30 to 4 o'clock in the lobby. A demonstration of how to wrap gift packages and make Christmas tree ornaments will be given at that time.

Orient Air Route Date Advanced

Northwest Airlines is moving ahead from Nov. 22 to Nov. 19 the date for inauguration of emergency service on its Orient routes, Croll Hunter, President and general manager, announced today.

Seven flights a week in place of the airline's usual four will be at the disposal of American businessmen, missionaries, government officials and military personnel and their families in evacuating Shanghai. The new flights will operate through Seattle-Tacoma airport, as well as Minneapolis-St. Paul, Hunter said.

In directing the emergency preparations, Hunter pointed out that the evacuees are not from Shanghai itself, which is not in danger at present, but from the North, where Chinese nationals and communists are battling. However, they are moving through Shanghai, he explained.

2 More Area GI's Returned to U.S.

Remains of two former 442nd Infantry Regiment Nisei soldiers were among the 7,572 armed forces dead who were returned to the United States aboard the USAT Carroll Victory, the Department of the Army announced today.

The Nisei war dead are S/Sgt. John T. Hashimoto, whose next of kin is Mrs. Amy E. Hashimoto, Rt. 5 Box 690, Tacoma, Wash., and T/Sgt. Jimmy T. Shimizu, whose next of kin is Aijiro Shimizu, 2005 E. Union, Seattle, Wash.

S/Sgt. Hashimoto was with Company L of the 3d Battalion when he was originally listed as missing in action. He was awarded the Distinguished Unit Badge with oak leaf cluster, and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

T/Sgt. Shimizu served with Company F of the 2d Battalion. He received the Purple Heart with oak leaf cluster, and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

The remains of 7,572 dead were originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in France, Belgium and Holland.

The Army stated that each next of kin was notified in advance of the arrival of the vessel, and would be notified again after arrival of the remains at the regional Distribution Centers of the American Graves Registration Service.

VETS IN TRAINING MUST REFUND LOST TIME

Veterans who drop out of school or college before the end of the period for which tuition has to be paid must refund the tuition for time he did not attend, the Disabled American Veterans reports. If he does not, the veteran loses the training time covered by the payment.

This Week in History

November 14 to November 20

By the Editors of the World Book Encyclopedia

167 years ago this week on November 18, 1781, Louis Daguerre, a French painter and physicist, was born in Cormelles, France. To him goes much of the credit for the development of photography. Several men before Daguerre had produced photographic silhouettes of objects but unless kept from the light, they darkened and disappeared. Daguerre found that a silver plate exposed to vapor of iodine became sensitive to light and that he could develop his exposed silver plates by treating them with mercury and "fix" the image with sodium thiosulfate. The result was the daguerotype, forerunner of the modern photograph.

could not afford to have my operation. But the doctor now says I absolutely must have an operation. If I do, would it be possible for me to put in a claim for the cost of the operation?

A. The law restricts claims to losses to property which are a reasonable and natural consequence of the evacuation. It is extremely doubtful that you could show that your goiter was a result of the evacuation, unless you can obtain medical testimony that the goiter was caused by your forced change of residence. Even in the case where the physical disability is clearly a consequence of the evacuation, there is a serious question whether the cost of an operation would be a loss of real or personal property within the meaning of the law. Since the Attorney General will not give any advance opinions, the only way this question can be settled is by filing a claim where the loss is the expenses actually incurred to pay for an illness.

The fact that the WRA stated that the cost of the operation would be paid even after leaving the camp does not make this a better claim under the Evacuation Claims Act.

5. Q. For my family of ten I had our family doctor give us inoculations. Can I claim for the cost of this pre-evacuation medical treatment which had been suggested to us by the military authorities?

A. This case presents the question whether expenditures for medical treatment, special clothing or other evacuation expenses can be considered damage or loss to real or personal property within the meaning of the law. Until the Department of Justice actually decides one of these cases, no definite answer can be given. The safest course is to file the claim. A very good argument can be made that these expenditures are real and personal loss directly caused by the evacuation and therefore should be considered a loss of personal property within the meaning of the statutes.

6. Q. The camps to which we were being sent were described as being infested with rattlesnakes. My father bought leather, high-top shoes for our family of eight. We only used them for a day or so in camp. Can we claim for these expenditures?

A. Until a decision or an actual case by the Department of Justice is made it cannot be stated with certainty whether special expenditures of this kind in connection with evacuation constitutes a loss of personal property within the meaning of the law. The only way in which determination can be obtained is by filing a claim.

7. Q. I am a resident of Hawaii. During the war my husband, a Japanese Buddhist minister, was interned at Crystal City. At government request I came with our children, to the mainland to join my husband who expected to repatriate with our family; however, we all remained in America. May I claim for losses which arose when I left Hawaii to join my husband?

A. If the Government request was pursuant to an exclusion order or if your departure from the area was in anticipation of such an exclusion order, it appears that under the statute you may recover from

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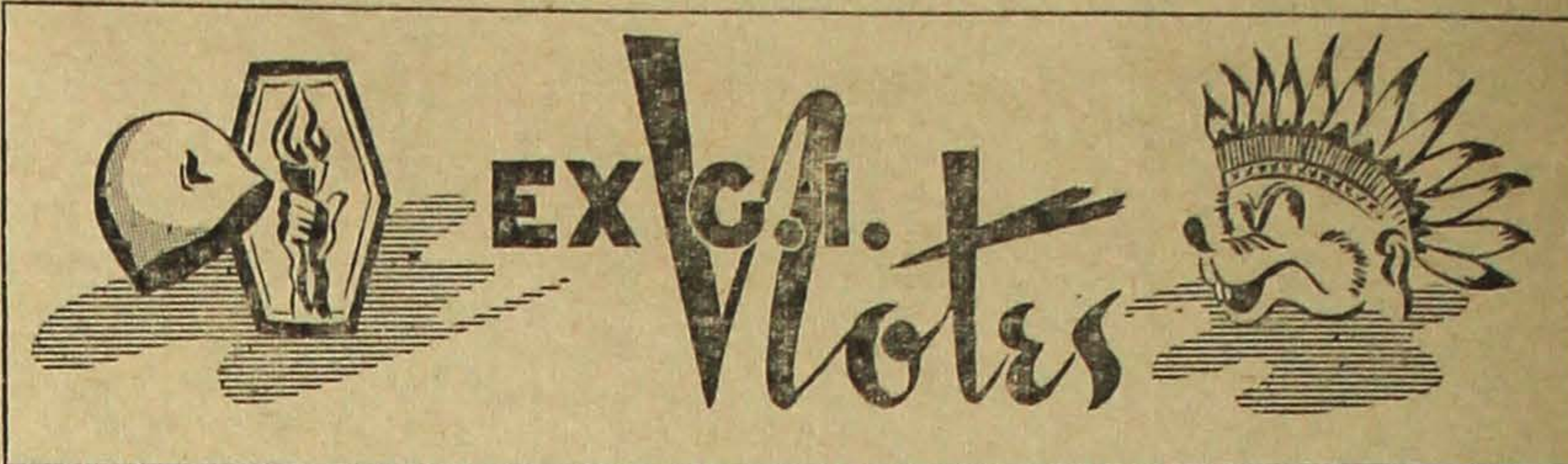
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REUNION

8. Q. I had some "kakemono" (Japanese scroll work). I did not list these under TFR or any other forms. These family heirlooms were destroyed as a result of evacuation when I left them with the tenant with the understanding that they would be cared for. Could I claim for these?

A. You have a good claim for the value of these family treasures lost or destroyed as a result of evacuation.

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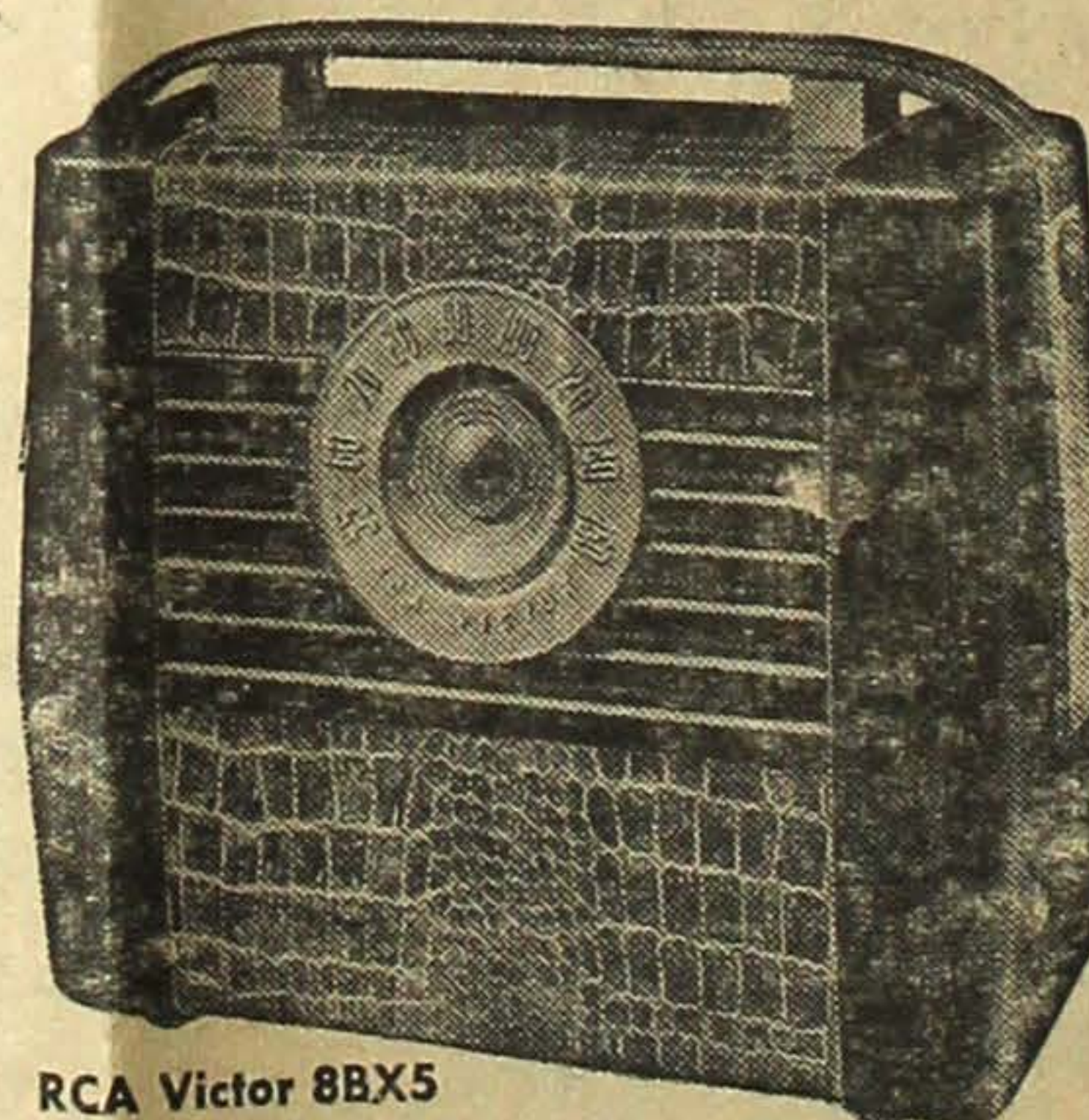
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U. W. Foreign Students to be Guests At Y's 'Friendship Harvest'
