MASAOKA MEETS JUDD ON BILL TO AID ISSEI

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 24—Prospects of achieving success with the bill for Equality in Naturalization and Immigration were reviewed today with Congressman Walter H. Judd (R. Minn.) by Mike Masaoka, national legislative director, JACL Anti-Discrimination committee and Robert M. Cullum, secretary, Committee for Equality in Naturalization.

This was the first conference held by JACL ADC officials with Mr. Judd since his reelection.

Congressman Judd sponsored the bill in the Eightieth Congress.

Reporting on the conference, Masaoka said no definite conclusions were reached, but the three merely discussed what the election means in terms of the bill, and aspects of legislative procedures under the Eighty-first Congress.

Following the meeting with Judd, the two officials met with Walter M. Besterman (C.), professional staff member, House Subcommittee on Immigration and Naturalization to discuss the possible composition of the subcommittee, now that Democrats will reorganize Congress. A complete changeover of committee members is expected.

BURIAL HELD AT ARLINGTON FOR 412 HERO

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 24—Funeral services in Arlington National Cemetery were held here last Wednesday for Pfc. John Yukio Tanaka, a member of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team who died in action, Jan. 20, 1945.

Army services were conducted for Pfc. Tanaka, along with 13 other combat dead, on a clear, sunny day. Following the army service, private rites were held at the grave of Pfc. Tanaka, attended by the family and a number of friends.

Pfc. Tanaka, who was posthumously awarded the Silver Star, also is the holder of three presidential unit citations, the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Combat Infantryman's Badge, and the ETO ribbon with three battle stars.

Pfc. Tanaka was born in Colusa, Calif., Aug. 12, 1921. Son of Tsunefuro and Tsuyo Tanaka, he was graduated by Roosevelt High School in Los Angeles, and attended University of California at Los Angeles. He entered the Army in January, 1944.

He is survived by his mother; three brothers, Jim, Robert and Floyd and three sisters, Mrs. Anne Sakawa, Ruth and Carol.

Rosary for Staff Sergeant Francis Tsukasa Kinoshita, whose remains arrived in Seattle with military escorts last Sunday, will be said at 7:30 p.m., Friday, Nov. 26, in the Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church (Maryknoll Church), corner of 17th Ave. and East Jefferson St.

Requiem Mass will be said at 9 a.m., Saturday, Nov. 27, in the same church followed by a military committal at 11 a.m. in the Veterans Memorial Cemetery.

Both services will be conducted by Father Swift of Maryknoll Church.

Pallbearers will be Sam Sakai, Raymond Sakaki, Takeshi Suguro, John Yoshida, Taro Takizaki, Thomas Kobayashi, Junichi Ikeda and Joe Kesamaru. The color guards will consist of George Maniya, Akira Kato and Susumu Kashiwagi. The Veterans of Foreign Wars will furnish the firing squad.

Staff Sgt. Kinoshita, who was born Jan. 8, 1923, was killed during the 442nd combat infantry team's final push to capture the port of Leghorn in Italy. He died on July 9, 1944, near Castellino. A squad leader of Company C in the famed 100th battalion, Staff Sgt. Kinoshita was the winner of a combat infantryman's badge, good conduct medal and the purple heart. He was a volunteer for Camp Shelby training in Mississippi, and he also was a volunteer replacement in the 100th battalion.

A 1940 Broadway high school graduate, he was attending the University of Washington prior to the evacuation.

Surviving the deceased serviceman are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred S. Kinoshita of 336 18th Ave.; a brother, Charles; and four sisters, Mrs. Henry Kiga, Mrs. Joseph Hizaki, Mrs. George Tanabe, and Mary.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 24—Funeral services for Pvt. Yohei Sagami has been set for 1 p.m., Tuesday, Nov. 30, at the Tacoma Buddhist Church, followed by a military burial service in the Veterans Plot at the New Tacoma Cemetery. The Rev. G. Nishinaga will conduct the services.

Private Sagami was born on April 9, 1922 and was graduated by Pife Wash., high school in 1940. He volunteered from the Minidoka relocation center, Hunt, Idaho, and was inducted into the army in March, 1944.

Serving with Company E, 442nd Combat Infantry Regiment, Private Sagami was killed near Bruyeres, France, in the first day of action in the attack on Hill 555. He received the Purple Heart and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

Pallbearers at the services will be Minoru Uchida, Satoshi Dogen, Hiroshi Yaguchi, Robert Mizukami, Dick Osaka, Harry Asai, George Iwakiri and George Yamamoto.

The Veterans' Aid Bureau of Tacoma, will arrange for the firing squad and the color guards.

Surviving Private Sagami are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fusachi Sagami, 1712 So. Tacoma Ave.; brothers, Jin, Ken, Wakao, Soya, Yachi, Kosumo (now serving with occupation forces in Germany), and Toshio; and sisters, Mrs. Michi Yoshida of Nampa, Idaho, and Hattayo of Chicago, Ill.

Private Sagami's remains will arrive in Tacoma on Sunday, Nov. 28, from Ogden, Utah, Army Graves Registration depot.

Two Tacoma Nisei Join Army

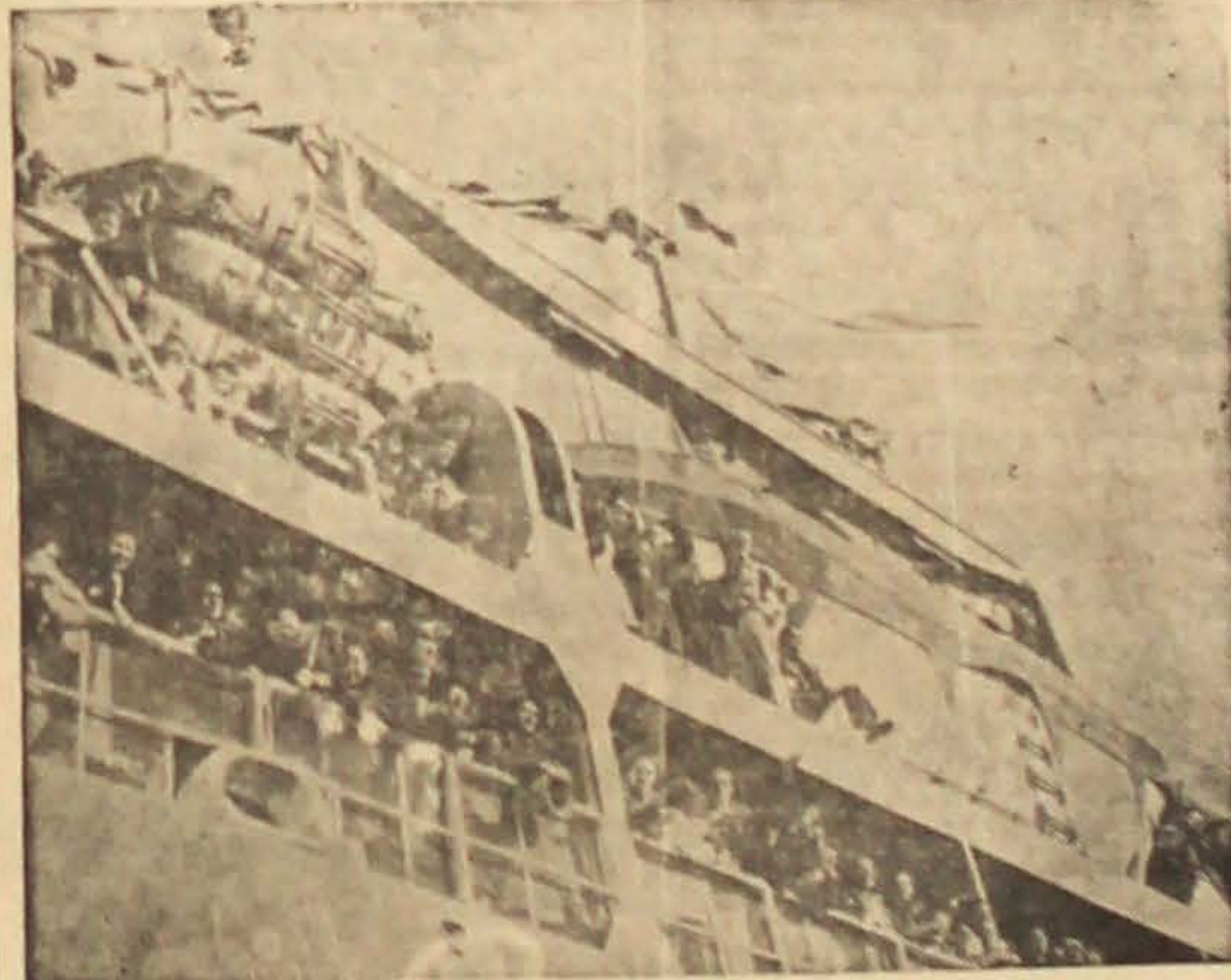

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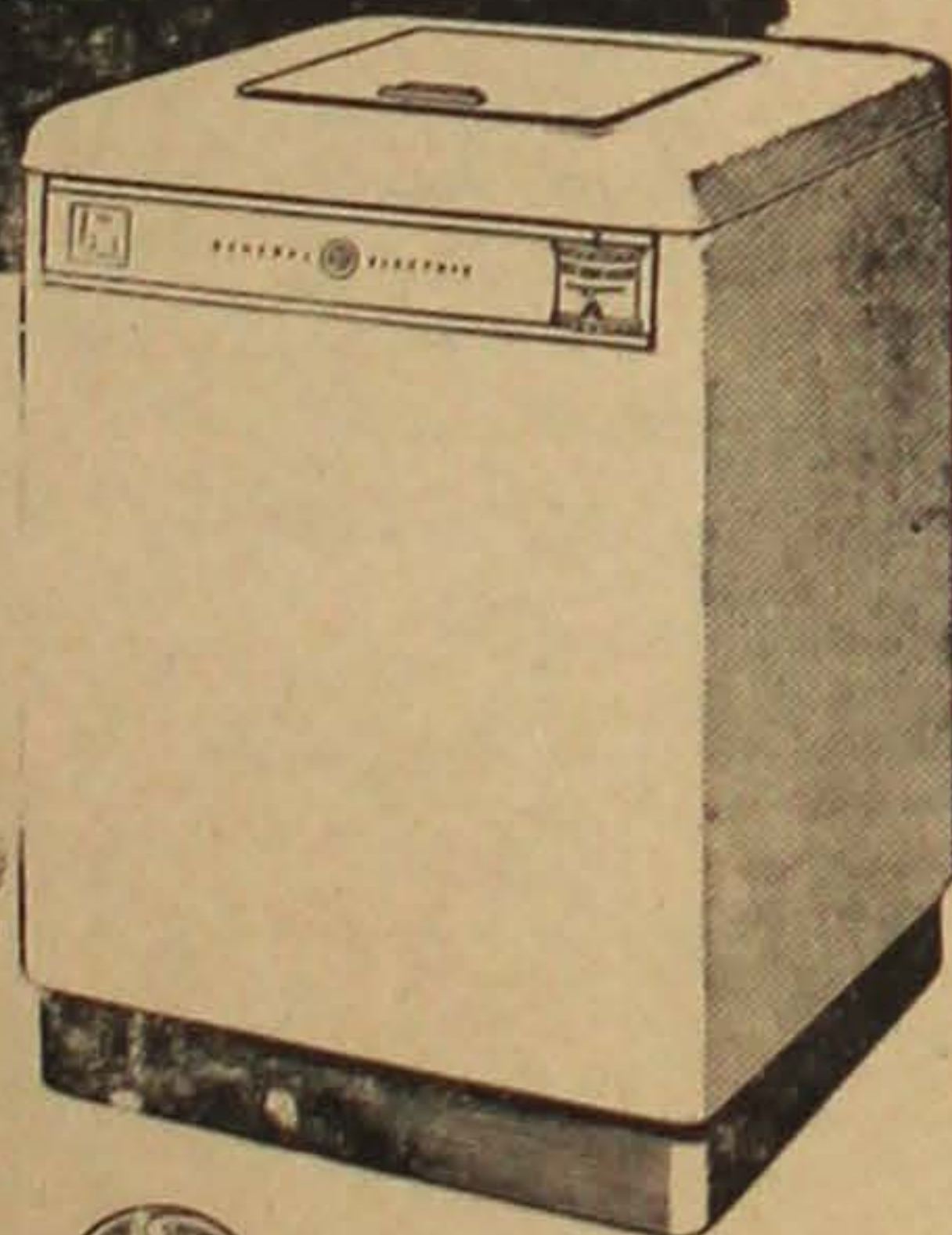

This Week in History

November 21 to November 27

By the Editors of the World Book Encyclopedia

328 years ago this week, on November 21, 1620, a group of 41 men aboard the ship Mayflower in Cape Cod Harbor, signed their names to the Mayflower Compact, forerunner of the great documents of freedom and law that were to follow in later years. The signers agreed solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one another to form a body politic and to frame such laws as they might need to reach they promised all due submission and obedience. These courageous men were Pilgrims who had sailed from England, more than 100 days before, to seek religious freedom in the New World.

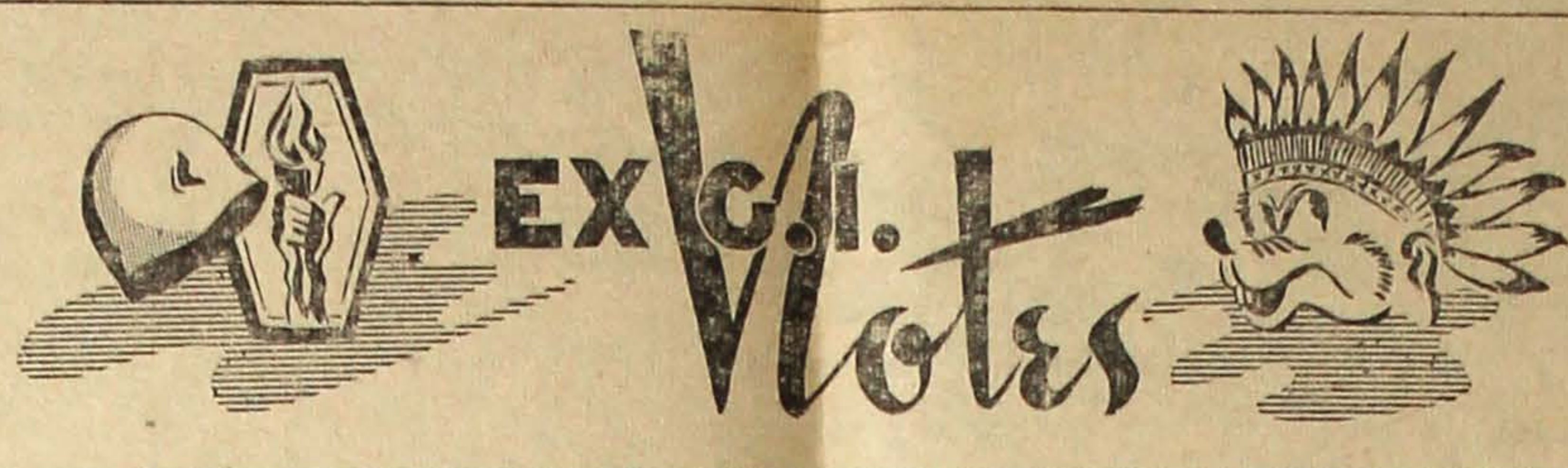

Baby Care Taught By Red Cross

Seattle women interested in learning how to effectively care for a new baby or for the sick at home, may register now at local Red Cross headquarters, 905 Second Avenue Building, for these courses which start Monday, December 6, according to Mrs. S. H. Tashian, volunteer home nursing chairman for the Seattle-King County Red Cross chapter.

The courses are offered without charge as a community service by the local Red Cross chapter, and are taught by graduate nurses who have had additional intensive Red Cross training. Registrants may choose from classes meeting for two-hour sessions Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for two weeks as follows: mother and baby care, 1 to 3 p.m. and 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.; care of the sick, 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

All classes will meet at Red Cross headquarters, and additional information or registration may be obtained by calling EL 2800.

HERE AND THERE

The tradition of fair weather for reindeer ceremonies was once more upheld as the remains of Robert T. Endo and Takaaki Okazaki, killed in action while serving overseas with the 442nd Infantry Regiment, were laid to rest last Saturday afternoon at Washelli. Watson Endo was unable to attend the final services for his brother, being drafted last week into the Army. Both Seattle dailies carried the story. Shifting to sports,

the Pacific Coast Conference and the Seattle high school league were faced with the same problem after last Saturday's games—that of picking one co-champion as its representative for a post-season game. 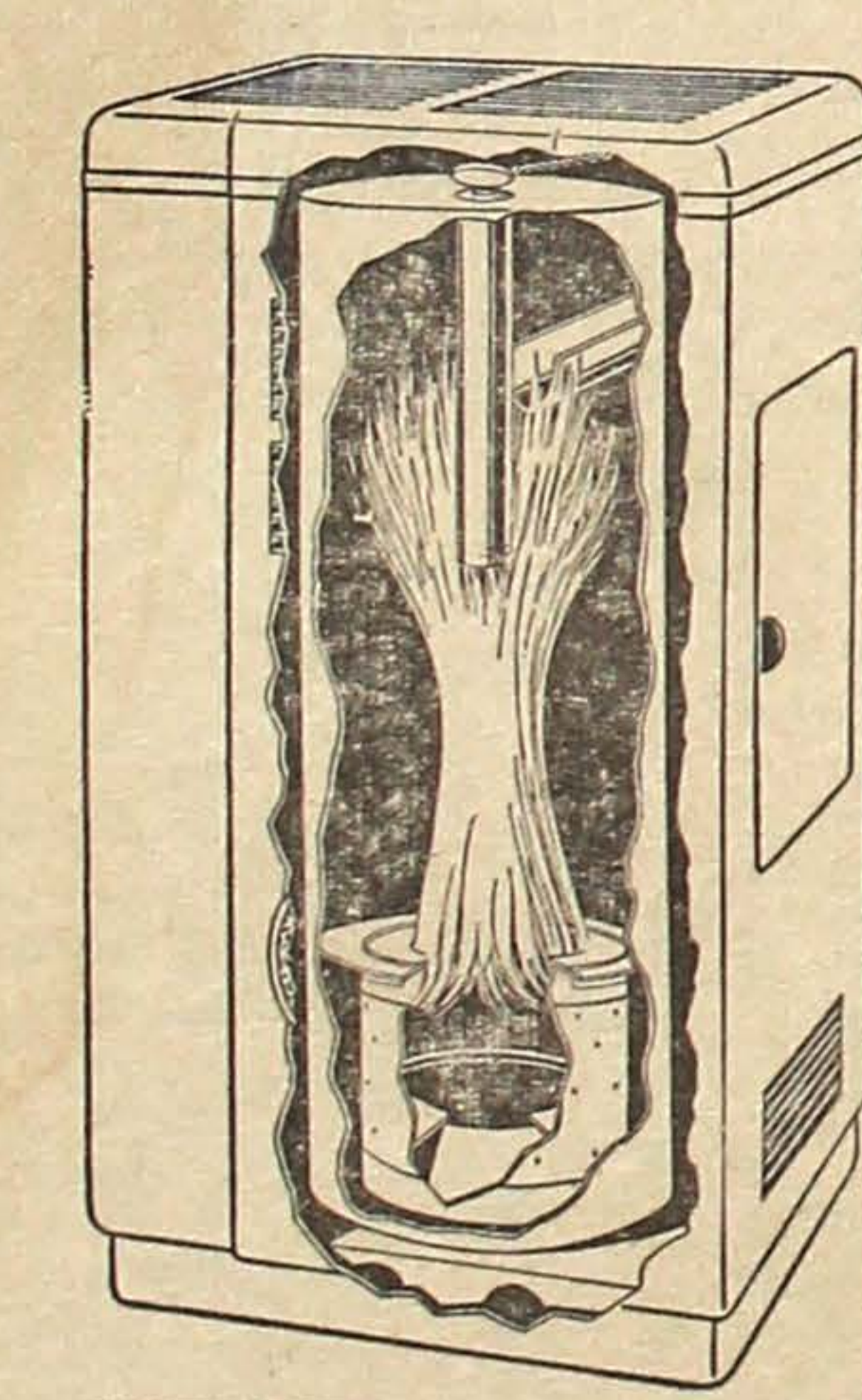

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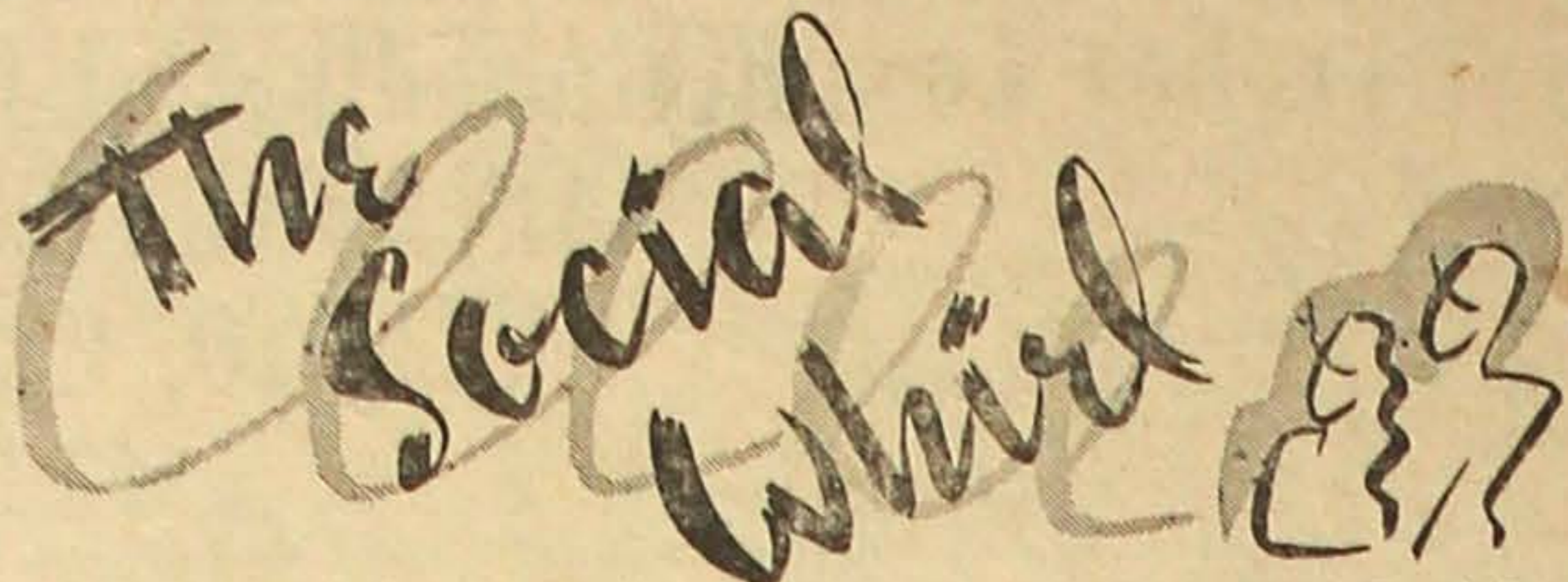

The couple plan to make their home in Seattle.

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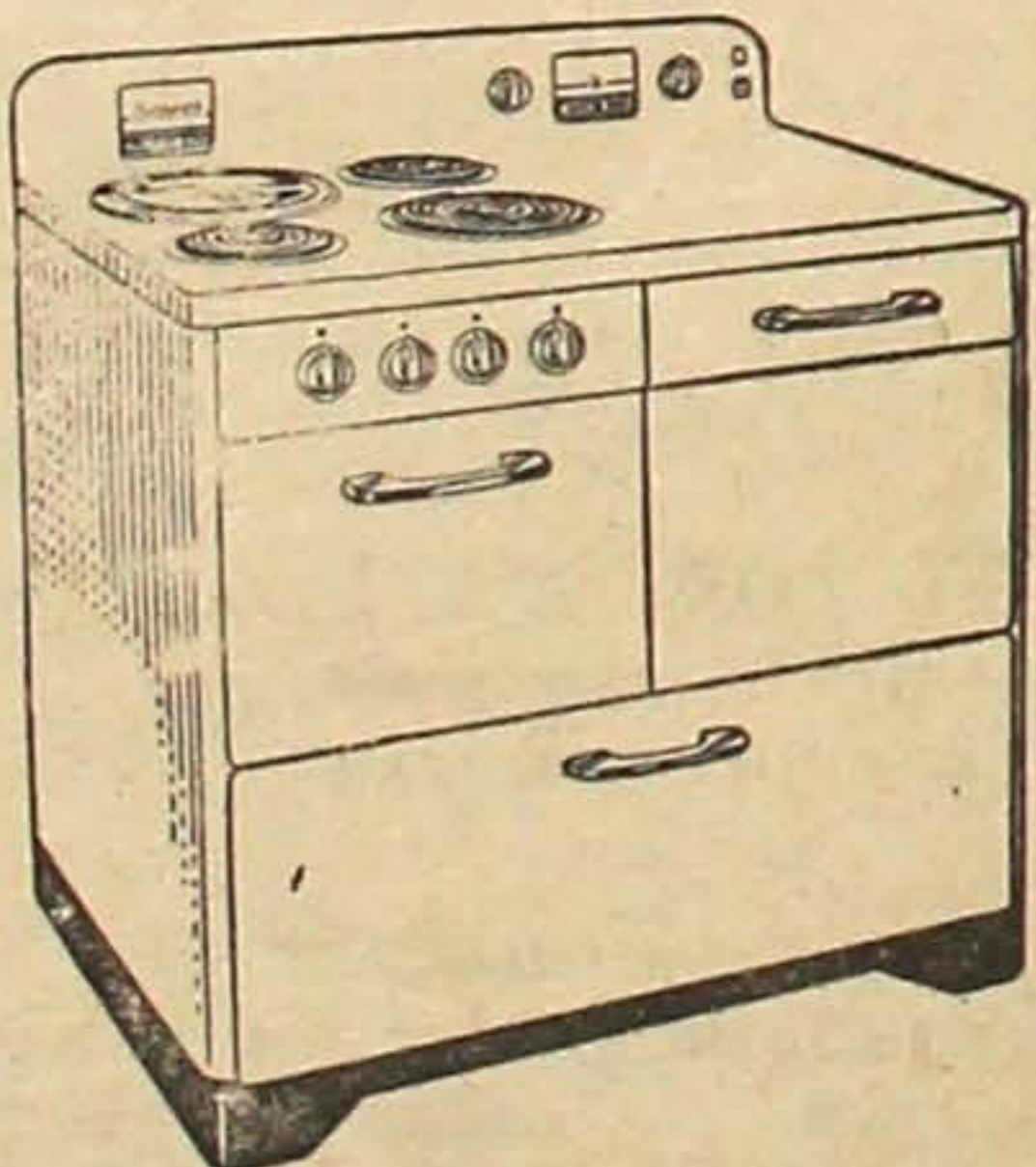
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
