## OK OF MEASURE FOR EQUALITY SEEN LIKELY

NEW YORK, Dec. 4—Prospects for the passage of a bill for equality in naturalization are better than ever.

This was the opinion expressed by Edward J. Ennis, chairman, Committee for Equality in Naturalization, Robert M. Cullum, CEN secretary, and Mike Massoka, JACL national legislative director, following a special pre-Congress meeting with Representative Emanuel Celler, Democrat, of New York. Representative Celler is slated to be the next chairman of the important House Committee on the Judiciary. Legislation concerning immigration and naturalization matters is referred to a subcommittee of this Judiciary Committee.

In the 80th Congress, Congressman Celler was the ranking Democrat on the House Judiciary Committee as well as on the Subcommittee for Immigration and Naturalization.

Ennis, Cullum and Masaoka met Congressman Celler at the latter's New York office and discussed the effect of the Democratic victory at the polls on such racial legislation as the JACL ADC bill for equality in naturalization.

The Congressman expressed himself in complete accord with the principles of the bill and promised his support. He pointed out that he had previously introduced legislation of this nature and had also worked for the passage of the bills extending naturalization and immigration privileges to Chinese and East Indians.

Congressman Celler expressed the hope that during the next Congress the last remaining vestiges of discrimination against Asians in American immigration and naturalization would be eliminated.

## Tatsuda Passes Bar Exam

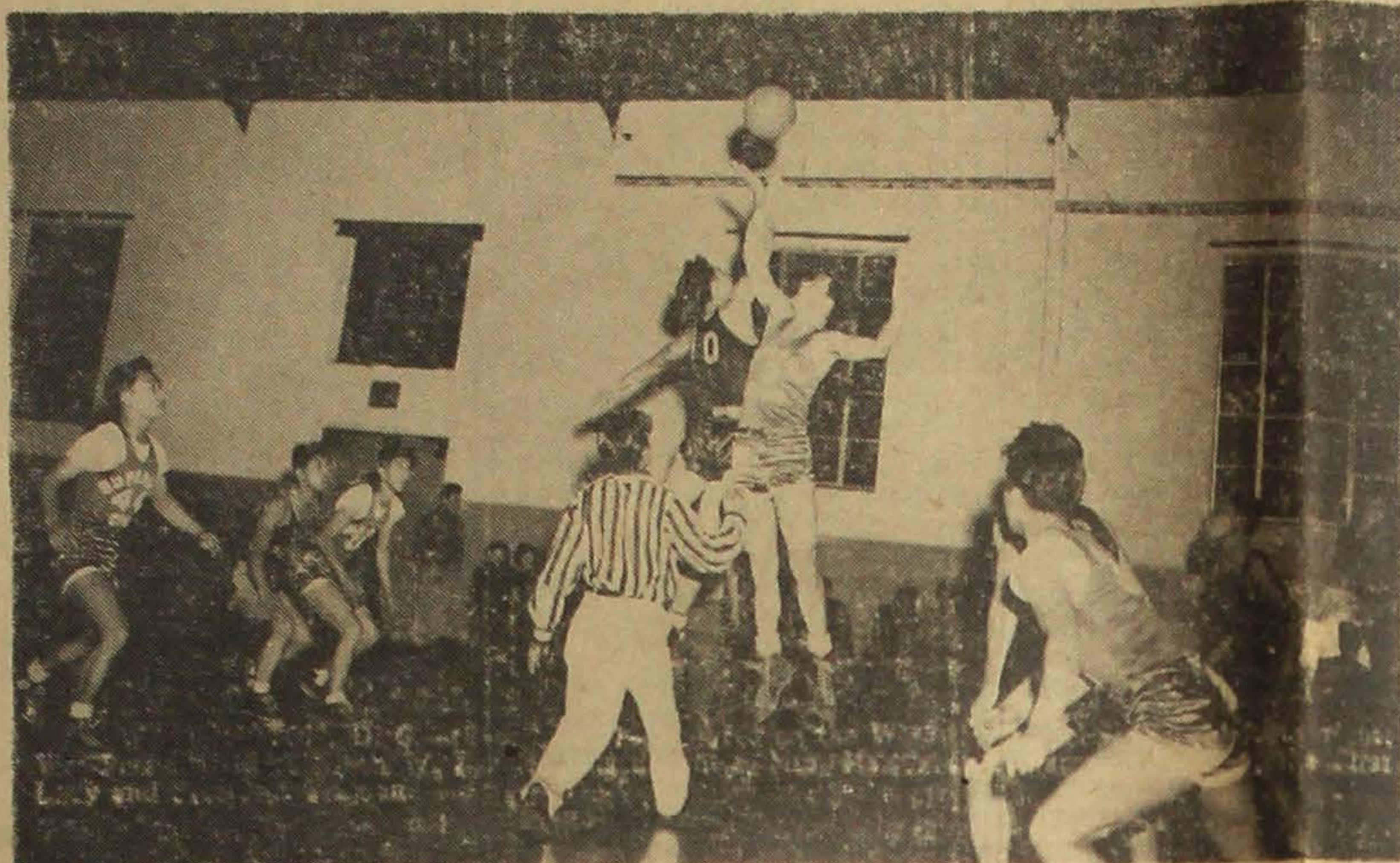
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Dec. 4—Charles Tatsuda, formerly of Ket-chikan, Alaska, and recent graduate of the University of Minnesota Law School, passed the Minnesota Bar Examination last Nov. 5. It was learned this week from the Midwest JACL regional office.

Tatsuda, a veteran of World War II in the Pacific theater, is the first Nisei who will practice law in Minneapolis. He recently met with other Nisei attorneys in Chicago and also attended the Midwest District Council in conferring with Mike Massoka and Edward J. Ennis, JACL legal counsel, on evacuation claims matters.

## CROP Gift

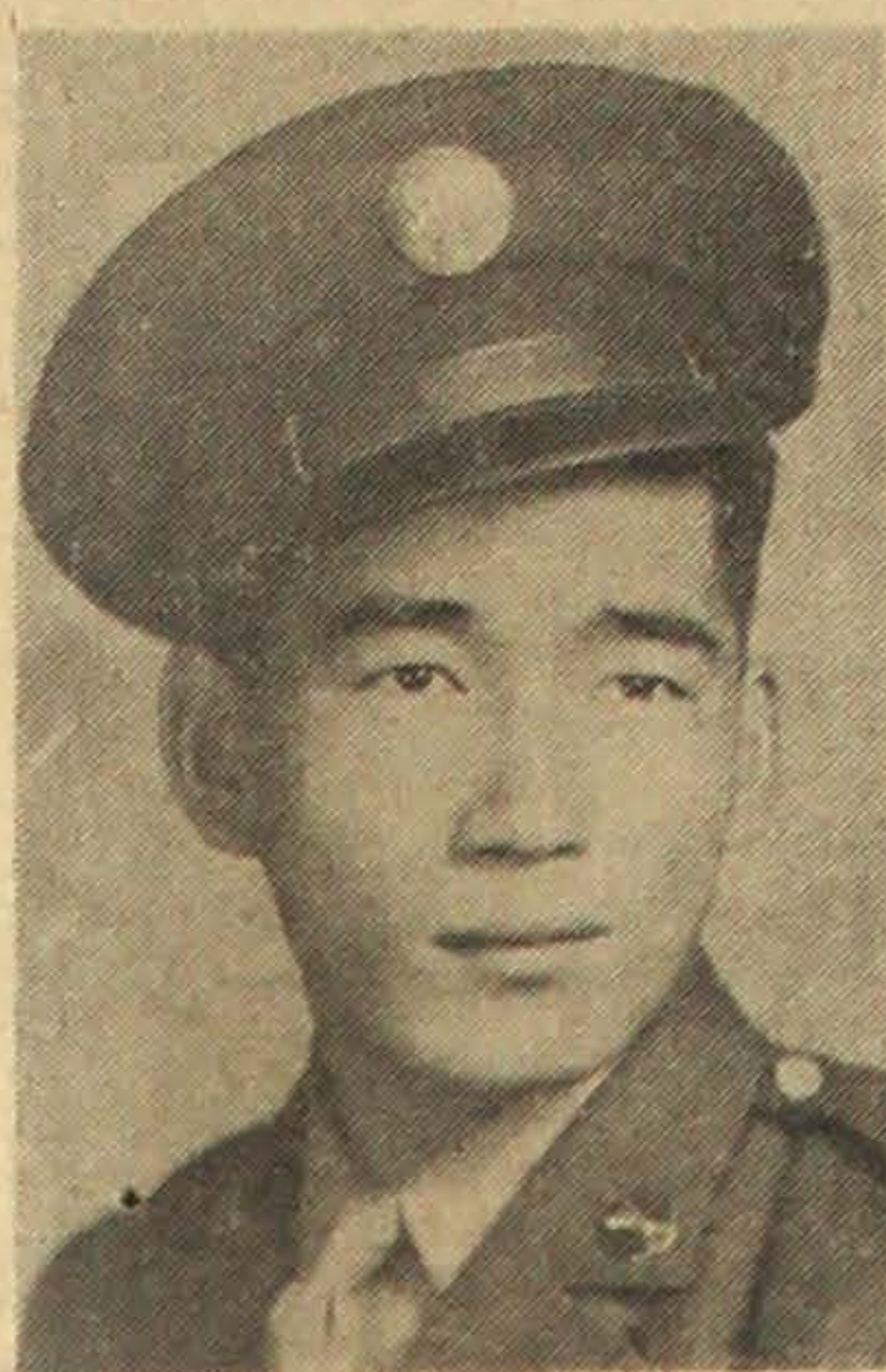


Mary Trick is one of thousands of America's rural folks contributing to the 23 CROP Christmas trains for overseas relief.

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 4—The JACL is among more than ninety community and city-wide organizations cooperating in the second series of conferences on civic unity sponsored by the Chicago Commission on Human Relations. It was announced by the Midwest JACL regional office.

The first conclave, the Chicago Conference on Home Unity, was held in November, 1945. The present conference includes a schedule of weekly sessions on recreation, health and welfare, housing, law and order, education and employment, with a plenary session winding up the series on January 10, 1949.

## Joint Rites Set for Six GI War Dead Saturday, Dec. 11, in Bukkyo-Kai; One of Nisei Heroes is Winner of DSC

Joint funeral services and military burial will be held here for six Seattle Nisei War Dead, one of whom was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, next Saturday, Dec. 11, Albert Ichihara, chairman of the Nisei Veterans Committee, announced today. The funeral services will be in the Buddhist auditorium from 1 p.m., followed by the graveside burial at the Veterans Memorial Cemetery in Washelli.

The six returning war heroes are Pfc. Akira Kanzaki, Pfc. William Kenzo Nakamura, Pfc. Tadao Sato, Pfc. Yukio Sato, Pfc. Hisashi Iwai and Pvt. Isao Okazaki. The remains of the Sato brothers arrived yesterday (Friday) from Ogden, Utah, regional army depot, while the remains of the other four will arrive next Friday, Dec. 10.

The Greenwood Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will provide the firing squad. The funeral services will be directed by the But-terworth Mortuary.

The ministers and priests who will officiate at the funeral services were announced as follows: the Rev. T. Ichikawa—Privates Hisashi Iwai and William Nakamura; the Rev. Emery Andrews—Pvt. Isao Okazaki; the Rev. B. Oda—Pfc. Akira Kanzaki; and the Rev. Thomas Machida—Privates Yukio and Tadao Sato.

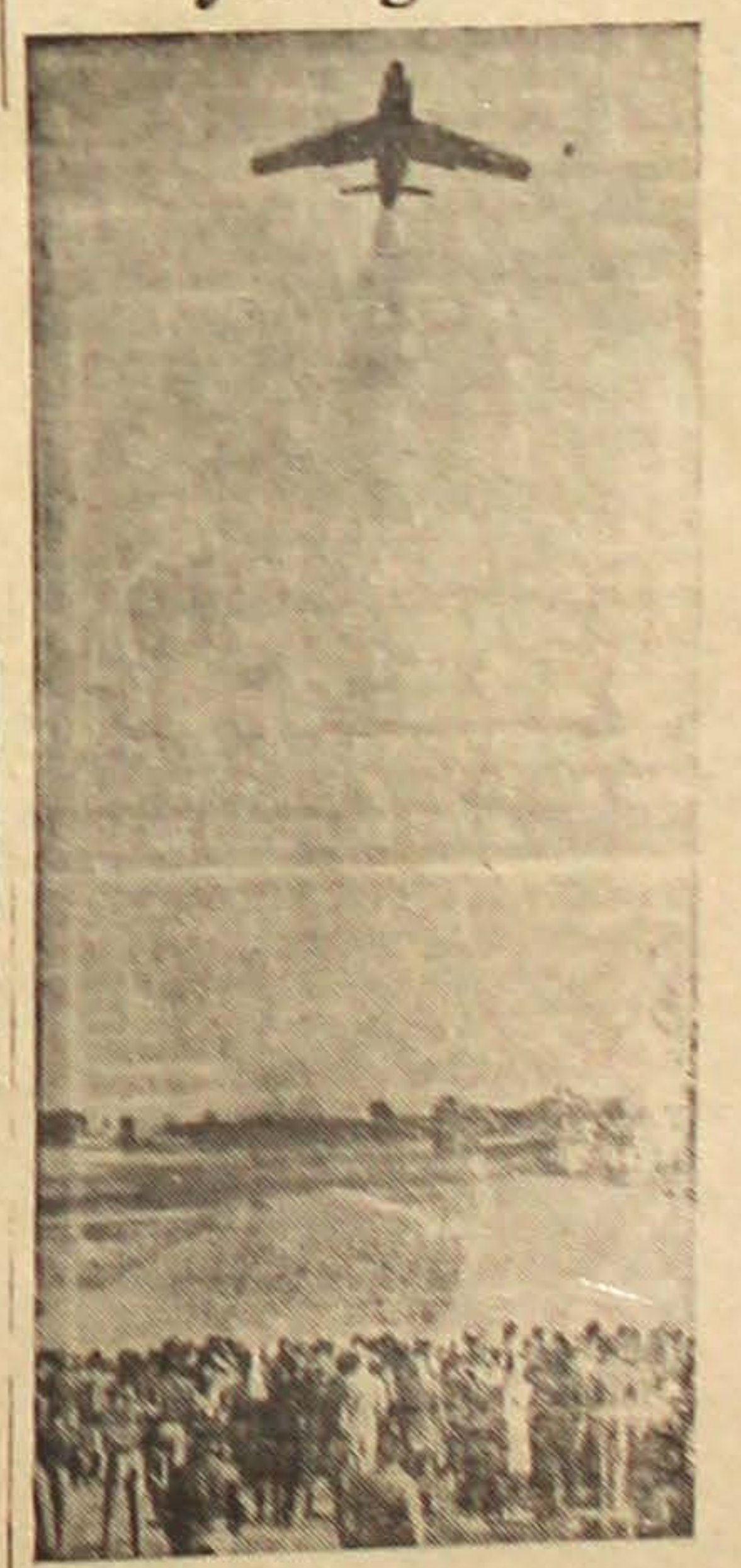
Pfc. Nakamura, winner of the Distinguished Service Cross, posthumously, was born on Jan. 21, 1922 and was graduated by Garfield high school in 1940. He volunteered from Hunt, Idaho, with his brother, George, and was inducted on July 23, 1943. Pfc. Nakamura was killed in action on July 4, 1944 in the capture of Hill 140, near Castellina, Italy, while attached with Company G, 442nd Central Postal Directory.

Surviving him are his wife, Mrs. Nakamura, 112 1/2 Ave. A, father, Mr. Tukichi Nakamura; a brother, George; and two sisters, Mrs. George Ishii in Chicago, and June, also in Chicago.

Pfc. Tadao Sato, who was attached to the Cannon Company of the 442nd Central Postal Team, met his death in Italy after the war's end when a jeep in which he was riding, overturned. He was awarded the Purple Heart, the Distinguished Unit Badge and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

Pfc. Kanzaki was born on Sept. 16, 1921 and was graduated by Broadway high school in 1940. He volunteered from Hunt, Idaho, and was inducted into the army on June 1, 1943. Pfc. Kanzaki was killed in action on Aug. 29, 1944 on the banks of the Arno River, west of Florence, Italy, while he was attached with Company E, 442nd Combat Infantry Regiment. He received the Purple Heart and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

Surviving Private Kanzaki are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenichiro Kanzaki, 2635 E. Aloha St.; three brothers, Satoru, Tsutomu and Hitoshi; and a sister, Mrs. Satoshi Miyahara.

Pfc. Yukio Sato served as a platoon radioman with Company I, 3rd Battalion, 442nd Infantry Regiment in Italy. He was killed in action by sniper fire on July 19, 1944 and was temporarily buried near the town of Follonica, Italy.

Surviving Privates Tadao and Yukio Sato are his father, Mr. Chusuke Sato of Chicago; and two brothers, Frank and Kazuo.

Pfc. Hisashi Iwai, who served with Company C, 100th Battalion, 442nd Combat Team, was born on May 8, 1918, and was graduated by Auburn high school in 1936. He was one of the first Japanese American inductees, entering the army on April 21, 1941 at Ft. Lewis, Wash., and later transferring to Camp Shelby, Miss.

He was killed in action on April 19, 1945 near Castelvolturno, Italy, in the final push of the 442nd infantrymen to crack the German Gothic Line. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Combat Infantryman Badge.

Surviving Pfc. Iwai are his mother, Mrs. Shina Iwai, 9125 S.

303rd St., Auburn, Wash.; three brothers, Hideo, Sunao and Harumi, now serving in Germany with the occupation forces; and a sister, Mrs. Ema Mori, who is in Yokohama where her husband is serving with the occupation forces.

Pvt. Okazaki, a member of Company G, 442nd Infantry Regiment, was born on June 23, 1923. A graduate of Garfield high school, he volunteered for army service on May 22, 1943. He was killed in action on July 15, 1944 near Luciana, Italy, and received the Purple Heart and Combat Infantryman Badge.

Surviving Pvt. Okazaki are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matsujiro Okazaki, 2016 Main St.; two brothers, Tom and Raizo; and three sisters, Chizuko (San Francisco), Kimiko (Chicago) and Mrs. Hideko Kikuchi (Chicago).

The pallbearers for the four deceased servicemen will be:

## What's Under the Hood?

MACHINE LOVING, curious Americans, we are. If we buy a new car, most of us want to know what it's got that makes it go. Many a lad, since grown up but still curious, remembers papa's razor-strap or mama's rage because he tore up the Big Ben alarm clock. He just wanted to see what made it tick! The genius of young America today, for understanding things and machines and gadgets, show a quality of mind and spirit that is distinctly American. May we never lose it.

To want to know what's under the hood is a mighty fine thing. But about America itself: the story of our enormous growth, the foundation for our freedoms and prosperity—these things we have not looked into. We know that America is the best land in which to live, but we don't always have the answers why. That's not fair to America, nor fair to the future we all have a right to expect. We ought to know the How's and Why's of the American Miracle.

Seeing is Believing  
EVER SINCE I came back in 1936 from a ten-year stay in China and a look-see at dozens of other nations both ways around the world, I have been plugging for real understanding of America. When we steamed into New York harbor that time, my wee daughter thought! Heaven would be wonderful if it were half that nice. She didn't mind saying so. She was born in China. But I found a nation full of confused people, and I felt that many of my fellow Americans were faint-hearted.

I do not regret having since devoted so much time and energy to the job of reselling everybody I meet on the idea of America. It's not that Americans are against the American way of doing things. We've been so free, and so busy, that we just haven't paid much attention to the reasons for our well-being. Then, when some Johnny Commie happens along to tell us: "Down with capital and hate your boss!"—we fail to have answers ready for him. Such a misunderstanding of America can be serious.

A Greater America  
I AM HAPPY to see that the Advertising Council, Inc., a non-profit organization made up of men in the advertising profession, will sponsor the advertisements prepared by the Council. The Ameri-

can Federation of Labor, the Congress of Industrial Organizations, and other groups are helping. If you see any of the ads please read them.

If we count our blessings, and at the same time view our glorious future, it'll not be possible for a single American to fall for anybody's false ideas. There's no country with a past like America's, nor any with as great a future. If we inform ourselves, and determine that our way is the best, we can settle down and get going toward the goal of an even greater America! What's under the hood will take us places!

The brightly colored 1948 Seal features a pajama-clad child seated before a blazing fireplace waiting patiently for Santa Claus to arrive. Barry Bart, internationally known artist and illustrator, designed this year's seal after watching his young nephew hurry silently downstairs on Christmas Eve and take up his vigil near the fireplace.



Although the Hawaii All-Stars will traverse the longest mileage of any team entered in the Oriental-American Basketball Tournament, they probably won't take the most time getting here, as the team is making the entire trip by air. Flying to Seattle on the newly established Pan American route, the islanders are scheduled to leave Honolulu at 10 PM on December 18th, arriving in Seattle at 1:45 PM the following day.

In keeping with their whirlwind mode of travel, we hear that the Hawaii team still plays that tireless brand of fireman basketball which ran most of their opponents into the ground last year. In contrast with their 1947 squad, however, the All-Stars have added more height to the lineup, which should give them more authority under the backboards. The two shortest players on the club will be 5 feet, 6 inches in height, balanced by a pair who will range 5 feet, 11 inches. The rest of the squad will range between these two extremes.

Only three of last year's Hawaiians will be recognized by local fans: forwards Richard Asato and Tets Odo, and Fred Shimomura, who plays guard and center. Smiling Ray Oyama, who made the all-tournament team in 1947, will be unable to make the trip because of work. Replacing Oyama as the

star of the team is guard Herbert Sumida, 19 years old and 5 feet 11 inches tall, who in 1946 was chosen as the "most valuable player" in the territorial interscholastic championships. Another standout is center Dick Kato, the other "tall boy" who is also 19 years old. A good point-maker and pivot man, he will bear watching.

Rounding out the roster will be forwards Mel Kurakako and Richard Shimomura (brother of Fred Shimomura), and guard Ted Tazawa. At 25, Richard Shimomura will be the oldest player on the squad. Team coach is smart and capable Stanley Kudo, with George Ishihara acting as manager, both of whom will be remembered as having acted in the same capacities last year.

To refresh your memories a bit further, here's the 1947 tournament record of the driving, ball-hawking islanders, round by round: Hawaii 33, Berkeley Nissei 33; Hawaii 33, Cathay Post 31; Hawaii 43, St. Mary's Mission 48 (tournament final). Following the tournament, the Hawaiians cleaned up on the best Nisei competition in California, winning something like five straight contests. Preparing to take up where they left off last year, the fiery Hawaiians have been playing together in the Honolulu Senior AAU league, and knocked off the Philippine Olympic team in an exhibition game.

Without a doubt, this Hawaii outfit will be one of the teams to beat in the 1948 Oriental-American tournament—and with just a few breaks (which they might make themselves) they could go all the way. In fact, we wouldn't be a bit surprised if they did.

Yes, it sure is green in this neck of the woods, but we could wish for a little less rain (pardon us, Puget Sound "mist"). That's all!

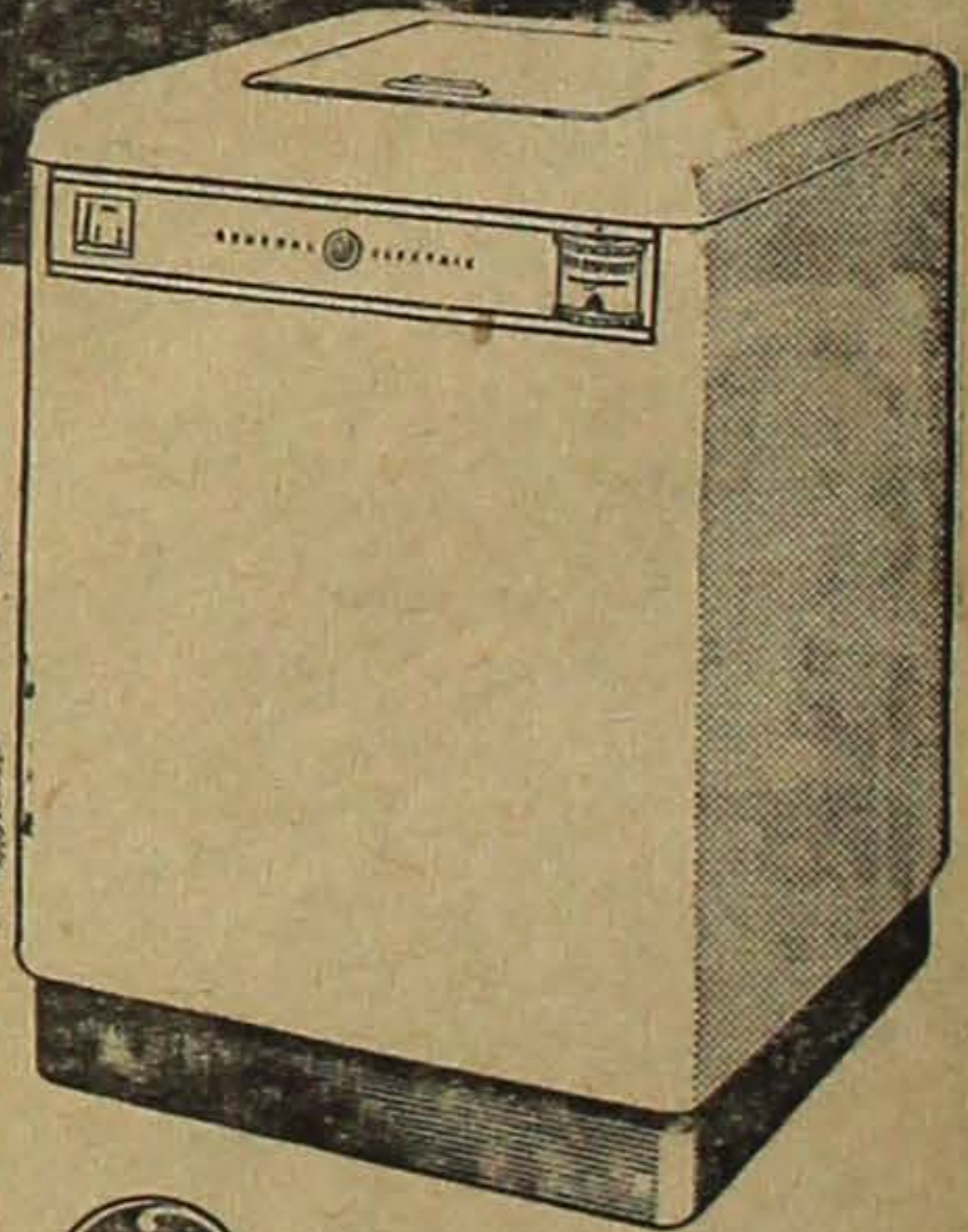

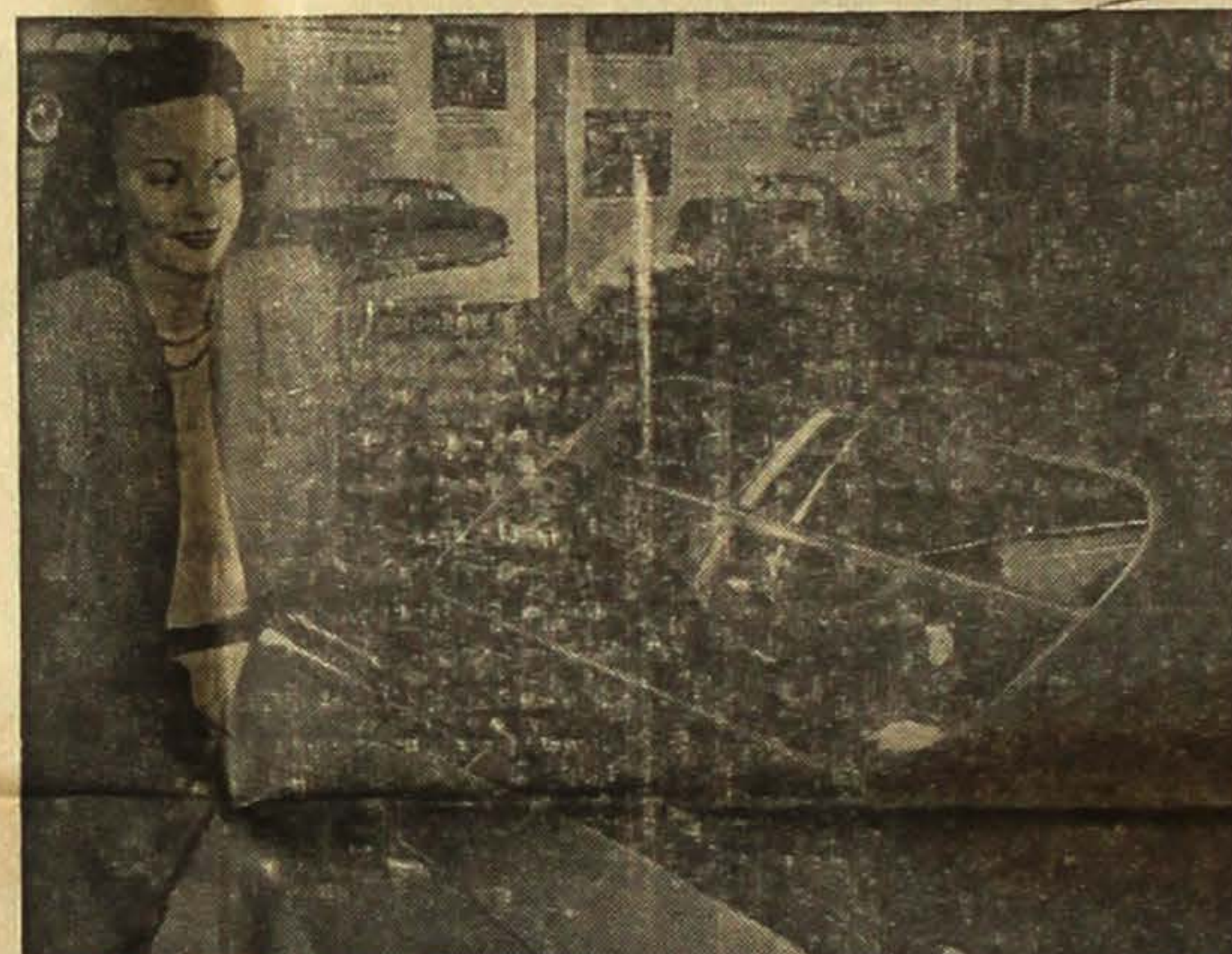

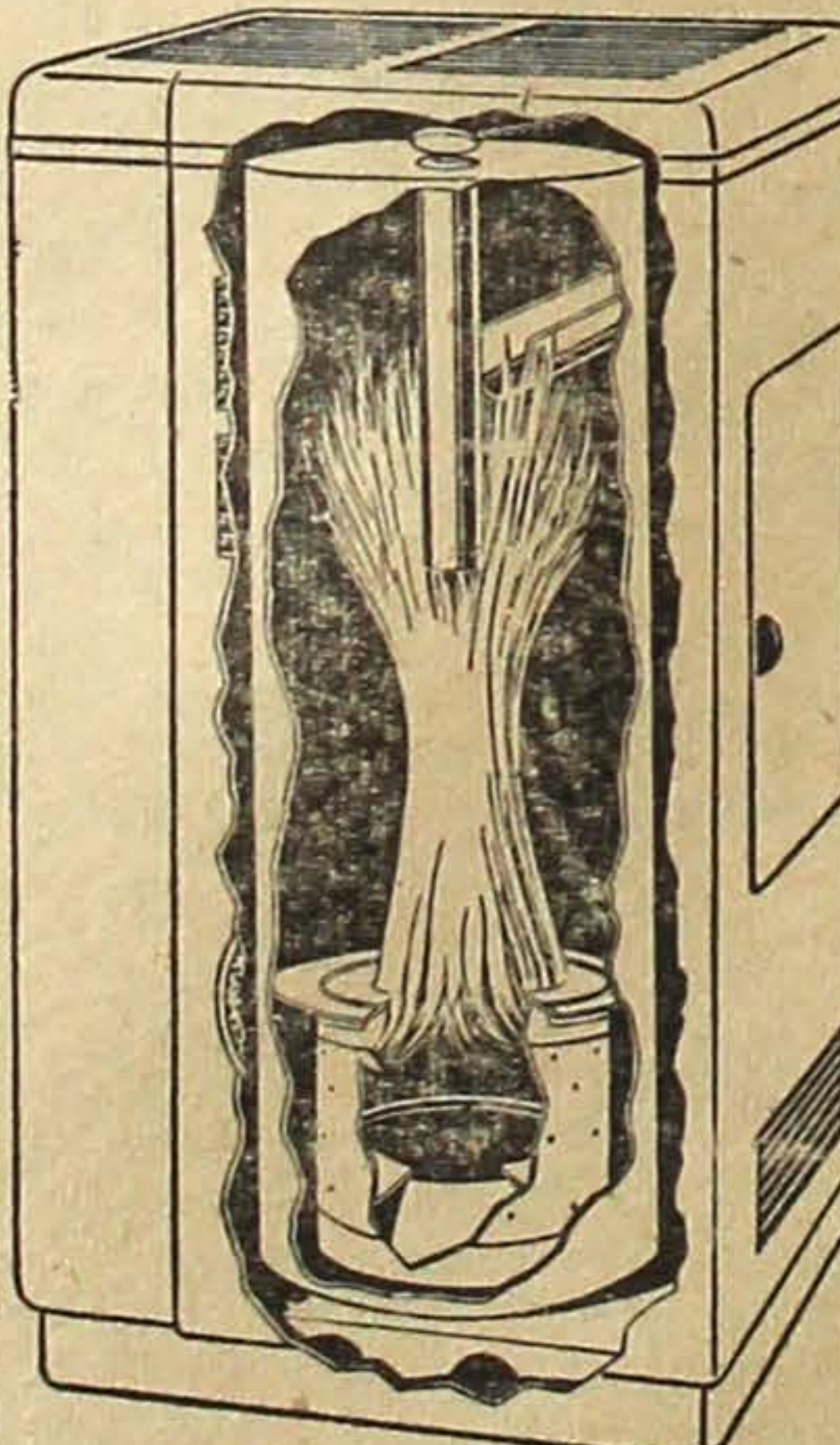

Best man was Mr. Yukio Kuniyuki and the ushers were the Messrs. Taiji Takayoshi and Yoshio Imoto.

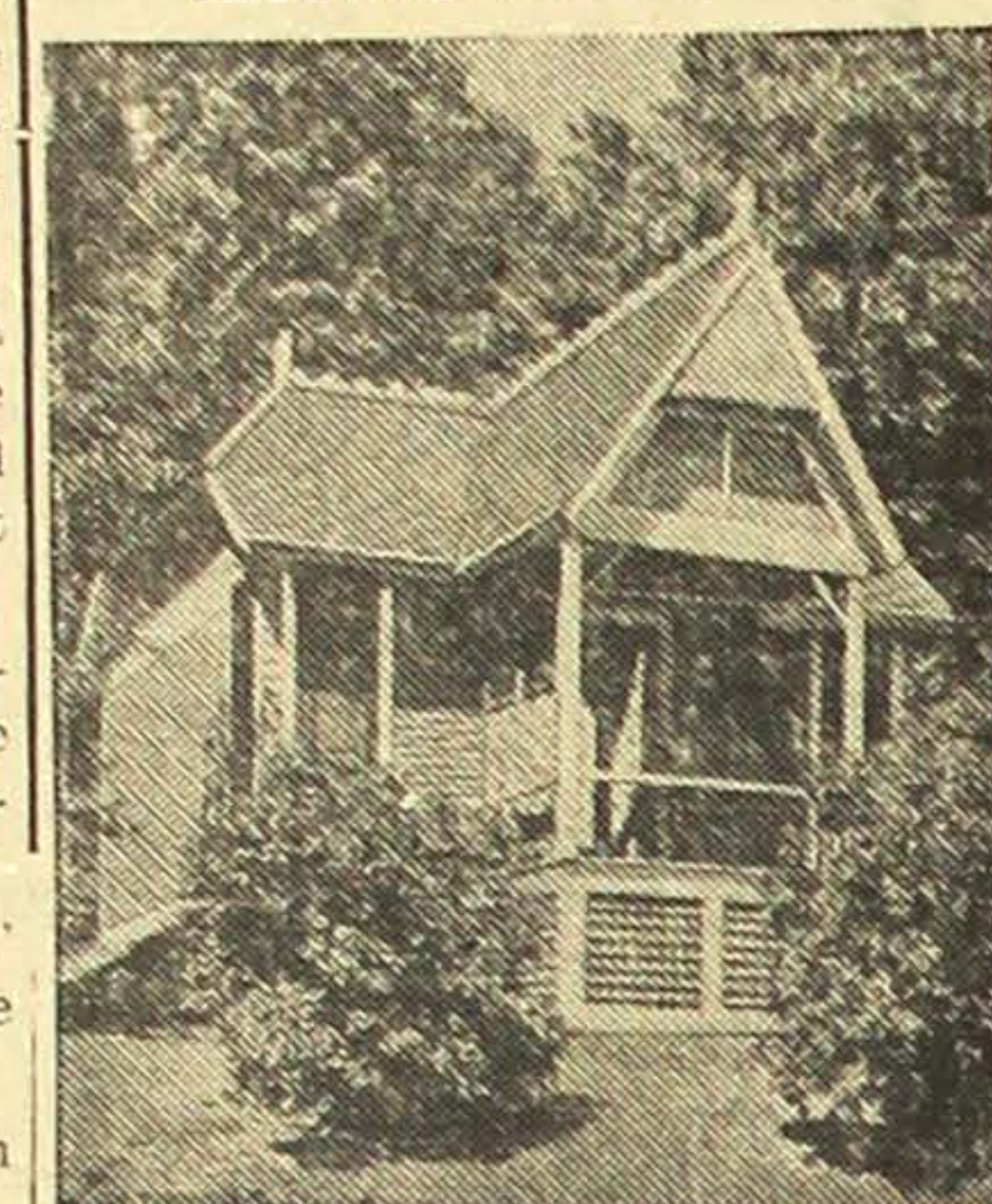
Miss Sachie Uyegaki sang "Always" and "Because", accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Shimomura.

I think that every housewife has at one time or another experienced the real discomfort of tears when peeling or slicing onions — so I'm sure you'll all be glad to learn of a new remedy...A friend of mine tells me it's truly infallible. She simply holds a piece of bread in her mouth and that does the trick! Try it yourself next time you cut onions. Incidentally, if you don't use the whole onion, wrap the unused portion in waxed paper and put it in a cool place to keep the onion odor away from other foods.

And I've discovered several ways to save on dishwashing. For instance, when I melt chocolate for baking I just leave the chocolate square in its waxed paper and put it in the top of a double boiler. Then, when it is soft, I just scrape the chocolate off the paper with a knife. Saves chocolate and dishwashing, too. In baking fish, I put a double layer of waxed paper underneath the fish—then throw it away when the baking is finished. That way all the grease and fish odor is whisked right out of my kitchen.

Another trick...I use the paper that butter or margarine is wrapped in to grease muffin or cake tins. Oh, it's amazing the many, many uses I find for that work-saving waxed paper. It's one product I'm always sure to keep on hand.
