

RACE PARLEY SLATED HERE ON JAN. 30

A race conference, sponsored by the Washington Congregational Christian Conference, will be held from 2 to 10 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 30 in the Seattle Japanese Congregational church, the Rev. Al Chi Tsai announced today.

The parley, which will attract about 100 delegates from the churches of the Congregational denomination in the Seattle area, also will welcome delegates from other minority groups and civic race organizations. Leaders of various groups in the Japanese community are invited to attend the seminar which will be on "Church and Race."

Dr. Galen Weaver, national director of the Committee on Church and Race for the Council for Social Action, will conduct the seminar. Dr. Weaver, who has spent many years in Hawaii as minister of the Church of the Crossroads, will bring up race relations problems today and what the church can do to solve them.

YAKIMA, Wash., Jan. 22—Iver Takaichi Nii of Nyssa, Oreg., topped the list of thirteen former servicemen whose names were selected here this week in a drawing for thirteen tracts of land in the Roza division of the Yakima Reclamation Project according to an Associated Press dispatch.

Nii, along with Francis A. Cushman, Wapato, and William D. Davis, Ellensburg, will have first claim on the 160-acre government tracts. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Senta Nii, he is at present attending Oregon State college at Corvallis, Oreg.

Illinois Representative Keeps Pledge; Tosses ENI Legislation in the Hopper

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22—Sidney R. Yates, (D., Ill.) a 40-year-old attorney serving his first term in Congress, is a man who believes in keeping a promise.

Because of this promise, a fifth sponsor of the bill for equality in naturalization and immigration has asked the nation's highest legislative body to pass this measure.

Representative Yates tossed the ENI bill in the hopper as HR 1444.

As he did so, he said that it "represents a promise I made to some of my constituents."

"I promised that when I got to Washington, the first bill I would introduce would be one calling for equality in our naturalization and immigration laws."

Now that the bill is introduced, Representative Yates says he intends to work actively for its passage.

The Japanese American population of Representative Yates' Chicago district is larger than any in the nation outside of Los Angeles.

Following Representative Yates' introduction of the ENI measure, Mike Masaoka, national JAACL ADC legislative director, pointed out that the "House" sponsors the bill represent all sections of the United States and is bi-partisan in support.

Representative Francis E. Walter (D., Pa.), represents the East; Representative George P. Miller (D., Calif.), the West Coast; Delegate Joseph R. Farrington (R., Hawaii), the Hawaiian Islands; Walter H. Judd (R., Minn.) and Yates represent the Midwest," Masaoka said.

A native of Chicago, Representative Yates was born August 27, 1909. He earned the Degree of Bachelor of Philosophy from the University of Chicago in 1931, and the Doctorate of Jurisprudence from the same university in 1933.

Since 1933, he has been a practicing attorney. From 1933 to 1935, he was assistant attorney for the Illi-

nois State Bank Receiver, and in 1936 was named to the Illinois Commerce Commission staff and soon became its specialist in traction affairs. In this position he represented the Commission when it required the Chicago street car and elevated system to institute interchangeable transfers. Subsequently he drafted legislation to permit Chicago to acquire the traction system.

The new Congressman from Chicago is an outstanding athlete.

He was selected in 1931 for the All Big Ten Conference basketball team, was mentioned for All-American honors, and holds several championships in golf.

He has served as an adviser in neighborhood settlement problems in Chicago.

He married Adeline Holleb, a university classmate, in 1935. They have one son, Stephen, now eight.

Congressman Yates is a veteran of 26-months service with the Navy.

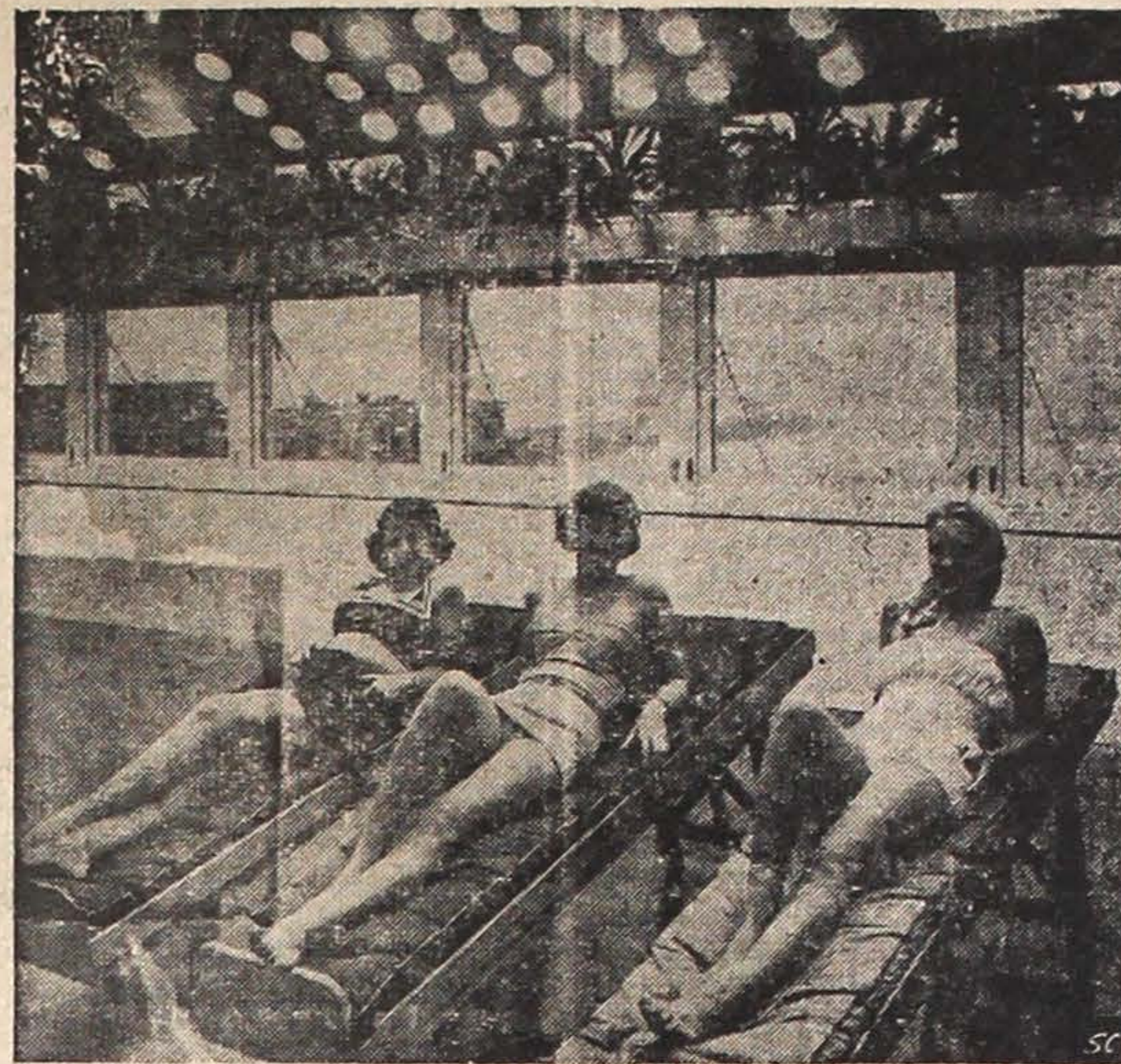

This committee is of particular importance to the ADC because all legislation dealing with immigration and naturalization, as well as civil rights, is considered by this House group.

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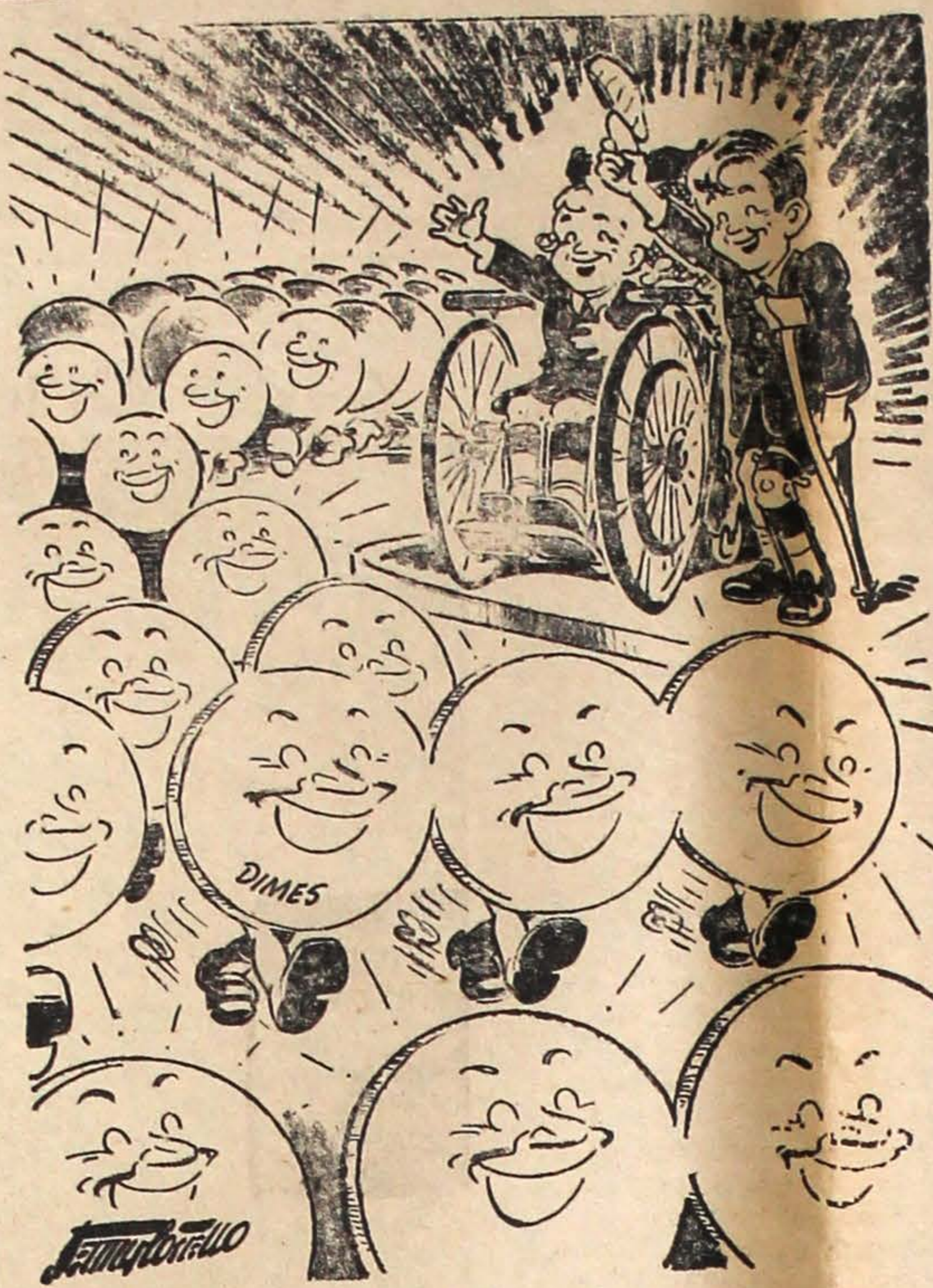

Last Congress, when the Republicans were in control, there were 15 majority party members and twelve minority party members. This year the Democrats have 17 members while the GOP has only ten.

Mike Masaoka, national legislative director, pointed out that none of the members are from any state west of Indiana and that six of the seven new Democratic members come from the Southern States.

He also stated that Celler, the new chairman, has already declared himself in favor of the ADC legislative program, white Walter, the ranking majority member, has introduced one of the five identical bills for equality in naturalization and immigration.

Although the Subcommittee on Immigration and Naturalization, which will consider the JACL ADC ENI bills, has not been named, Masaoka indicated that Fellows, Graham, and Boggs on the Republican side and Chelf and Gossett on the Democratic side all served last session. He expressed the hope that all would be re-appointed by the full committee when it reorganizes next week.
