

Ex-Seattleite, Now Spokane Farmer Heads for Japan via Airplane

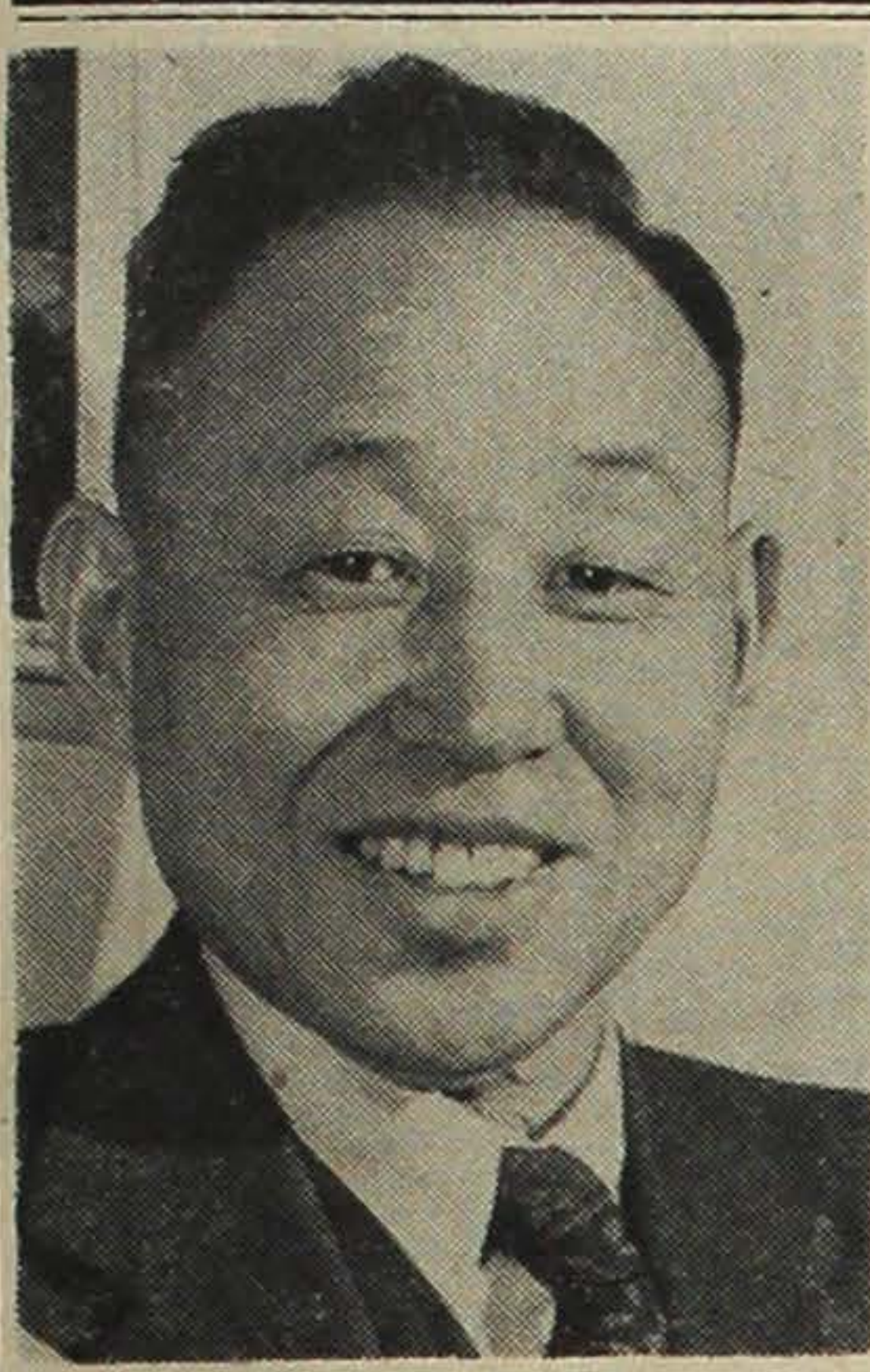

A dream of fourteen years has come true for Kazuo Toba, Spokane truck farmer and former Seattle resident.

Toba, who flew from Seattle yesterday (Tuesday) over Northwest Airlines' Great Circle route to Tokyo, probably is the first Japanese to visit his family in that country since pre-Pearl Harbor days. He was the first to win approval from the U. S. occupation government in Japan for reunion with his family under the Army's new 60-day visiting period for United States Japanese.

The happy lettuce farmer has not seen his wife and two of his American-born sons since 1935, when the entire Toba family visited Japan. The illness of one of Toba's sons during that visit forced Mrs. Toba to remain in Japan and resulted in the expiration of her permit for re-entry into the United States. Toba was unable to communicate with his wife for six years, prior to and during the war.

Travelers to Japan under the 60-day program are required to bring their own food or to purchase it through Army Overseas Supply Stores upon arrival in that country. Housing facilities must be provided during the entire stay by relatives in Japan.

Seattle-born Ted Toba, 26, and Shiro, 24, were forced to serve with Japanese forces during the war, therefore losing their American citizenship. A third son, Paul, 20, arrived

in Spokane a year ago to be with his father. He is a part-time student at Lewis and Clark high school there. The elder Toba was a Seattle resident for 20 years before moving to Spokane.

Toba also will visit his ailing mother, Mrs. Yasu Toba, 84, who resides together with Toba's wife and sons, in Okayamaken on Honshu island.

Northwest Airlines' short Great Circle route will allow Japanese almost the entire allotted period for visiting. Flying time over the route from Seattle to Tokyo is less than 29 hours.

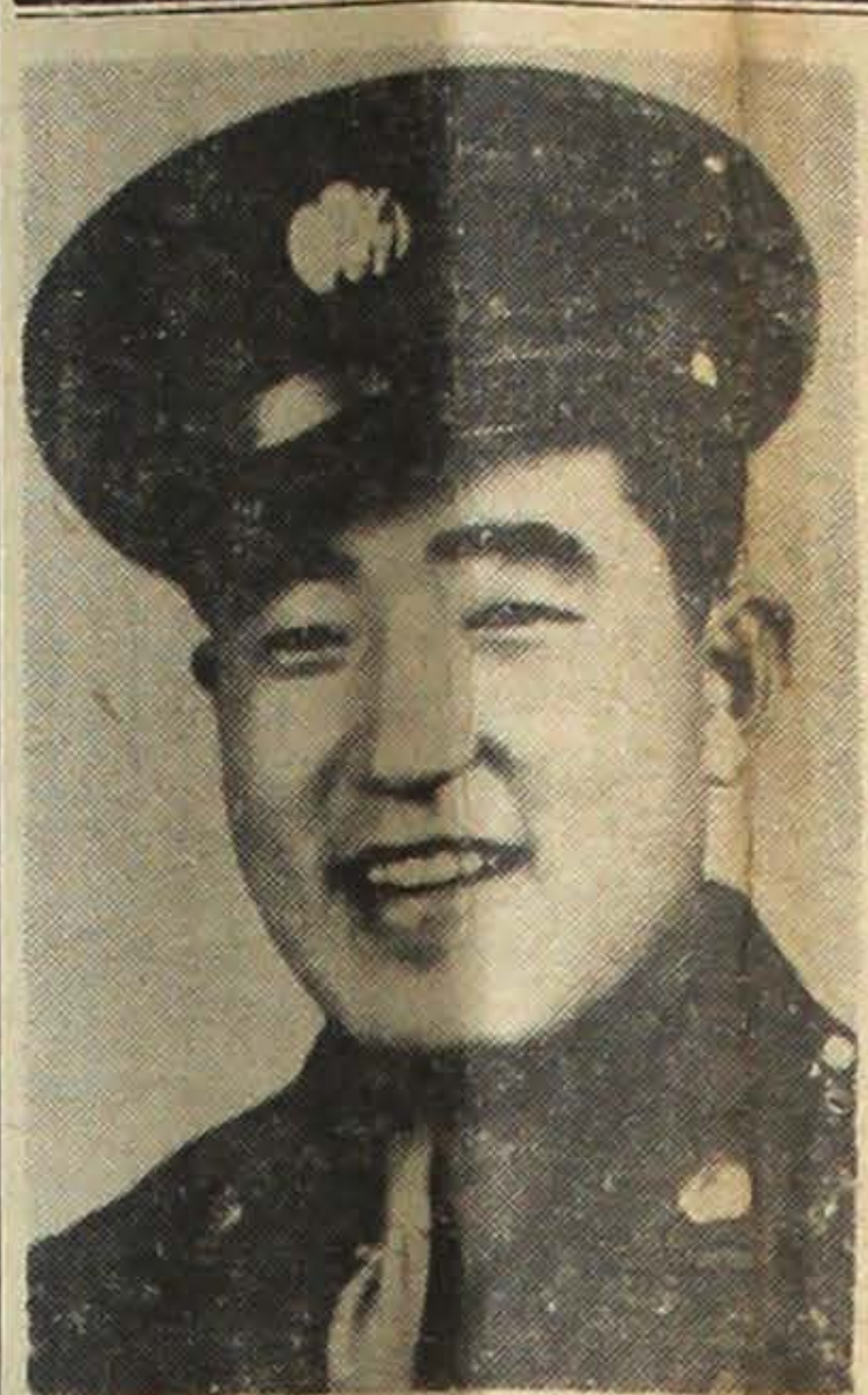
Kawasaki Back From Japan after 2-Month Survey

During his stay here, Kawasaki spoke to various Issei groups in his "Report on the work of LARA in Japan".

His present home is at 4310 South Berkeley Ave., Chicago, Ill. While in Seattle, he was guest in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Seko, 940 Hiawatha Place.

T-4 Ben Keiji Hara, son of Mr. and Mrs. Seichi Hara, 1732 12th Ave. So., who died in the service of the U. S. Army on October 22, 1945 in Tokyo, Japan, will be reinterred this Saturday, April 9, in the Veterans Plot in Washelli.

Rosary will be said for T-4 Hara from 3 p.m. on Friday, April 8, in the Hara residence. Requiem mass will be said at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church (Maryknoll), 17th and East Jefferson, from 9 a.m. Saturday, followed by a burial at Washelli.

Pallbearers will be Jack Uchida, Tom Kobayashi, Thomas Sasaki, Inoru Uchimura, Robert Handa, Susac Sakamoto, Nobuichi Tanaka and Hideo Hoshide.

The Nisei war dead was born on August 27, 1923 in Seattle. He was graduated by Franklin high school in 1941 and was attending Seattle College, majoring in civil engineering. Inducted into the army on Nov. 17, 1942, he was one of the first volunteers to leave Hunt, Idaho, for the Army language school at Camp Savage.

T-4 Hara took infantry training at Camp Shelby with the 442nd Combat Team before being assigned to overseas duty in the Pacific theatre of operations. He has served in Australia, New Guinea and Philippines before being sent to Tokyo, Japan, to be attached to G-2 section, Advanced Echelon, GHQ.

He has been awarded the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with 2 Presidential unit citations for New Guinea campaign and Philippine liberation, and the Good Conduct Medal. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Seichi Hara, a brother, Norio Ray of Ontario, Oreg., and a sister, Amy Yoshi, of Seattle.

Funeral arrangements will be in charge of Butterworth Mortuary.

Evacuation Claims Queries, Replies

(Ed. note: This is the twenty-second of a series of questions and answers on the evacuation claims law prepared by Edward J. Ennis, JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee special counsel, and based by the Washington Office of the JACL ADC as a public service. This series is based on actual questions asked of this office.)

Any reader who has general questions relating to the law itself or to procedural matters is invited to address a letter with a stamped, self-addressed return envelope to the Washington Office, JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee, Evacuation Claims Section, 300 Fifth Street Northwest, Washington 2, D. C. Questions of general interest may be produced in this series without personal identification.

(No questions involving the legality or value of specific claims can be answered.)

1. Q. In 1942 we were forced to lease our property consisting of 5 acres of fruit and a house

partly furnished for \$600 per year. When we returned in September 1945 we were obliged to rent our own house for \$35 per month until March 1946 at which time the lease expired. In 1941 we cleared \$800 on the fruits. In 1945 we cleared \$2500 on the fruits and in 1947 we cleared \$3000 on the fruits. Am I justified in making a claim for the difference between the \$600 per year rent and the \$1600 which I feel we would have averaged between the \$600 per year rent and the \$1600 which I feel we would have averaged had we taken care of it? Can I make a claim on the value of the rent from the house?

A. You may claim the difference between the fair rental value of your orchards and house and the \$600 per year which you received for the period in which you did not occupy the house. For the period in which you occupied the house at \$35.00 a month whether you had a loss, or a gain to be deducted from the amount of your loss for the period you were out of the house. 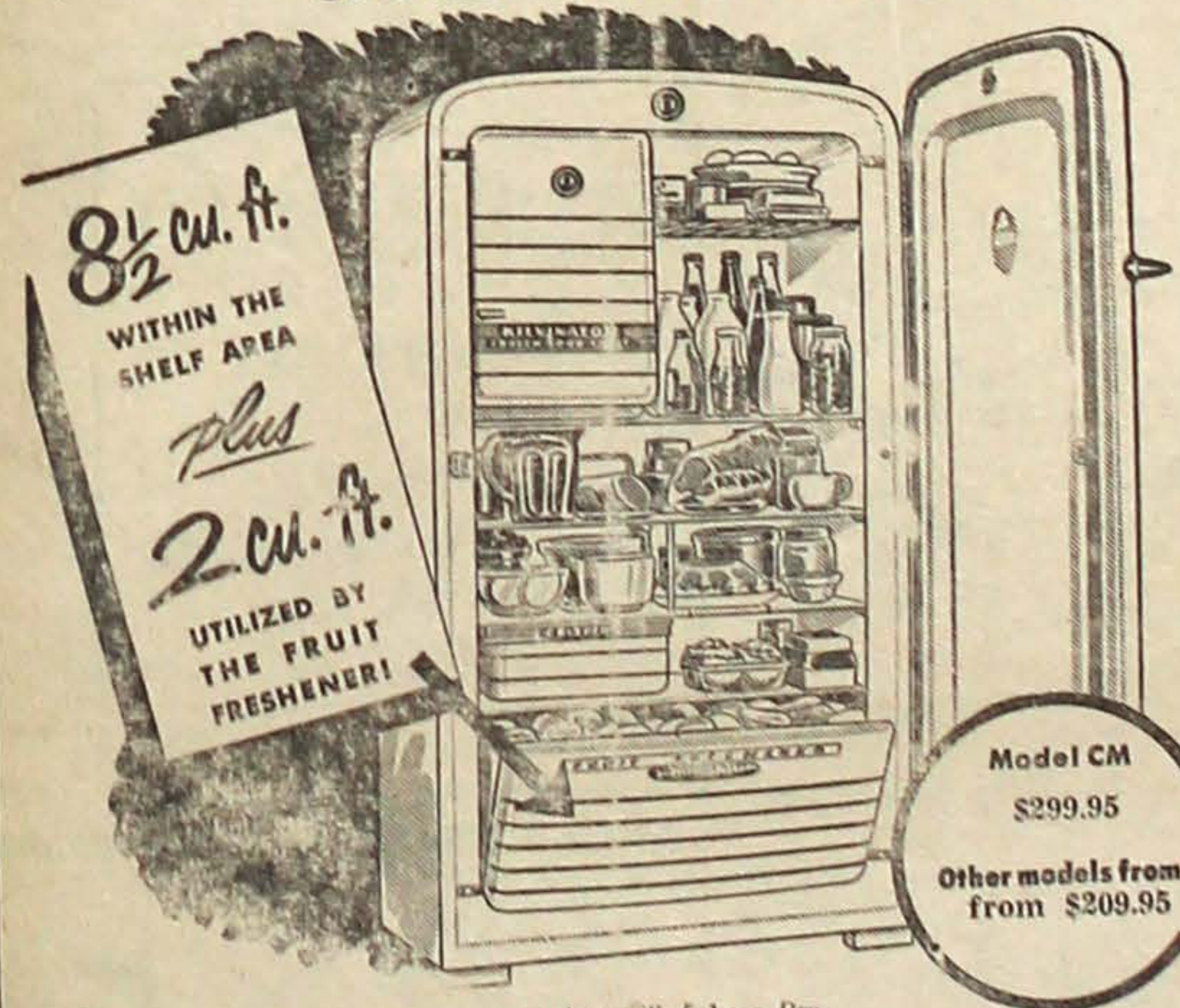

Also taking place at the Seattle Port of Embarkation April 9 will be a special sight-seeing cruise in Puget Sound in the Port's 130-foot training vessel, FS-210, by some 50 leading high school journalists. The tour has been arranged by the Army Recruiting Service in Seattle.

At Fort Lawton visitors will be taken on a complete tour of the post. Sixteen Army subjects, ranging from ordnance to finance, will be explained in a county fair type of exhibit at the Post gymnasium. A demonstration on the 213-foot long "land ship" will be put on by a port company training for future duty at Whittier, Alaska.

Highlighting Fort Lawton's program will be a water show and beach landing of a dozen amphibious craft from the Second Engineer Brigade, Fort Worden.

In addition to the water show, visitors will be able to view the guard mount, hear the Seattle Port of Embarkation band, attend open house festivities at both the WAC and Security detachments, and inspect a helicopter on the parade grounds. Fort Lawton's observance of Army Day will continue until Sunday afternoon when the public is invited to view rifle and pistol matches.

Souvenir programs containing a schedule of open house events will be distributed to visitors at both the Fort and at Fort Lawton.

To assist with the Army Day observance in Portland, the Seattle Port of Embarkation will use its transport Sgt. Sylvester Antolak to carry 825 Fort Lewis Second Division. (Continued on Page Two)

depends on whether you had been paid for this period at the rate of \$600 per year. If you had been paid at the rate of \$600 a year, or \$50 a month, for this period and recovered possession for \$35 a month, you did not have a loss for this period of occupancy. If, however, you were not paid at the rate of \$50 a month for this period but your tenant said that you could regain possession for \$35 a month, your loss for this period was \$35 a month and you can claim it.

2. Q. How could I prove legal ownership of a business under an assumed name such as XXXXX Florists if I haven't filed the ownership with the state. I have paid the state 3% sales tax through that name.

A. You should have no difficulty proving legal ownership of the business you operated under an assumed name even if you did not file a statement of ownership or doing business under that assumed name. You should have no difficulty in proving that you actually owned the business either by your control and operation of the business or by documentary proof such as cancelled checks showing that you purchased the business. Such documentary proof, however, is not absolutely necessary.

3. Q. At the time of evacuation

I stored my two automobiles with the WRA who later transferred them to the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco as the Fiscal Agent. Two months later the Army offered to buy the cars but the price was so low that I ignored the letter. Subsequently, I was informed that the Army had taken possession of the automobiles and if I wanted to receive the money for them I would have to sign the forms transferring the ownership to them. Can I file a claim for the difference that I received and the prevailing retail price at the time I was able to buy another automobile to replace the one the Army purchased from me? Or, can I claim for the difference between the price paid me and the prevailing retail price at the time the Army purchased my automobiles.

A. You can certainly claim the difference between the fair market value of your two automobiles and the amount the Army paid you. It is not likely that the Government will give you an additional amount based on the replacement cost of these two automobiles at postwar prices. You might, however, put in a claim for the larger amount based on replacement cost with the request that if this amount is not granted that the lesser amount, based on fair market value at the time of sale, be allowed.

sion troops in a voyage from Tacoma to Portland on April 7. The troops will arrive in Portland on April 8 and march in the Army Day parade there. The Antolak will serve as a barracks for the troops and will be open to the public in Portland on Army Day.

As a preview to Army Day activities, two Seattle Civic organizations will hold "Army Day" luncheons.

On Friday, April 8, the Seattle Chamber of Commerce will be host to ranking members of the armed forces and leading Seattle civilians. Maj. Gen. Harry J. Collins, division commander of the Second Infantry Division at Fort Lewis, will be the featured speaker.

Others scheduled to attend are Mayor William F. Devin, Robert A. Yothers, state commander for the Veterans of Foreign Wars; Dr. Raymond D. Allen, president of the University of Washington; Emmett G. Lenthian, state commander of the American Legion; Joseph Sweeney, chairman of the Sixth Army Advisory committee; Rear Adm. A. M. Blodsoe, commander of the Bremerton Naval Base; Brig. Gen. Fenton S. Jacobs; Brig. Gen. David A. D. Ogden, commanding general of Fort Worden; Rear Adm. H. H. Good, commander of the 13th Naval District; Maj. Gen. William Ray Carroll, commanding general of the 41st Division of the Washington National Guard, and Rear Adm. R. T. McElligott, commander of the 13th Coast Guard district. Music during the luncheon will be furnished by the Seattle Port of Embarkation band and by the Bagpipe band from Fort Lewis.

The 101 Club will honor the Army at a luncheon at the Washington Athletic Club Thursday, April 7. Brig. Gen. David Ogden, commanding general of Fort Worden, will be the guest speaker. Other army officers who will attend the luncheon include Brig. Gen. Jacobs, and Col. F. D. Atkinson, commanding officer of Fort Lawton.

A special "army night" was observed at the Bon Marche on Monday, April 4. Visitors to the store had an opportunity to view the army in action with features rang-

ing from a WAC fashion show and a GI cooking school to a display of small arms and a walkie talkie demonstration. Activities lasted two hours.

The extensive plans for observance of Army Day in Seattle have been worked out by a citizens' committee of fourteen members of the armed forces and leading Seattle civilians, headed by John J. Sullivan.

Other members of the group are Joseph A. Sweeney, chairman of the Army Advisory Committee; Maj. Gen. W.R. Carroll of the Washington National Guard; Charles C. Ralls, national junior vice commander-in-chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars; Ward A. Roney, Military Order of World Wars; B. I. Elliott, Army Day chairman for the American Legion; John M. Sheldon, Military Order of World Wars; Col. A. G. Stone, Army Day Project officer at Fort Lewis; Lieut. Col. John E. Barlow, army instructor of the Washington National Guard; Maj. H. G. Long, Army Day Project Officer; Maj. Don D. DeFord, 2nd Eng. Service Battalion, Fort Worden; Capt. William Wade, control officer at Fort Lawton; Capt. Nevio Petrini, 2nd Eng. Service Battalion, Fort Worden; and Paul B. Lowney, public information officer, Seattle Port of Embarkation.

Army Day was established and first observed in 1928 by the Military Order of World Wars.

While the first observance of the day was held on May 1, in succeeding years the date was changed to April 6, the anniversary of the entry of the United States into World War I.

by the assurance that enough ex-GIs will participate to make such a parade worth-while.

As one of those ex-GIs, your correspondent is well aware of the reluctance which most vets feel toward putting on OD's once again and going through that old "hut-two-three-four" routine. We know all the standard objections, ranging from "We're through with all that stuff," to "It's a lot of foolishness", with all the variations in between.

Nevertheless, to quote Shiro Kashiwa, one of Seattle's most-decorated veterans, "We ought to get out and make one last parade — to honor our buddies and to show people that Nisei soldiers were in the war".

We feel that Shiro and the rest of the NVC parade committee have a big point there. On Memorial Day, the Japanese community's impressive memorial to its 56 war dead hit, will be unveiled and formally dedicated. A parade by Nisei veterans preceding these ceremonies would be highly fitting and proper, both to honor the war dead and to publicize the fact of Nisei participation in the war.

It seems almost unbelievable, but there are still people in Seattle who are ignorant of the combat record of the Nisei in World War Two. A parade by Nisei veterans, which will no doubt be amply photographed and publicized by the downtown press, will have a powerful impact on the public and will be a means of educating those who just haven't heard of the Nisei war effort.

To guarantee a successful parade, at least two hundred veterans — more, if possible — should participate. There are from five to six hundred Nisei vets, at a conservative estimate, in and around Seattle. Judging from these figures, it shouldn't be an impossible task to round up a force of at least company strength for the parade. This venture, to be successful, will

also require some practice and otherwise inconvenience the veterans concerned. We think, however, that these are minor compared with the high objectives to be attained in making "one last parade"; that Nisei vets, recognizing this fact, will lend their support and once again preserve their record of never having failed to reach an objective.

Incidentally, all reserved seat tickets for the opening Coast League game in Seattle on the 12th have been sold out. . . The addition of Roslyn as the eighth team in the City League means that the Nisei Vets will do quite a bit of out-of-town traveling before the season is over.

Tired and weary Lotus YBA basketball men have returned home after a week's tour of California.

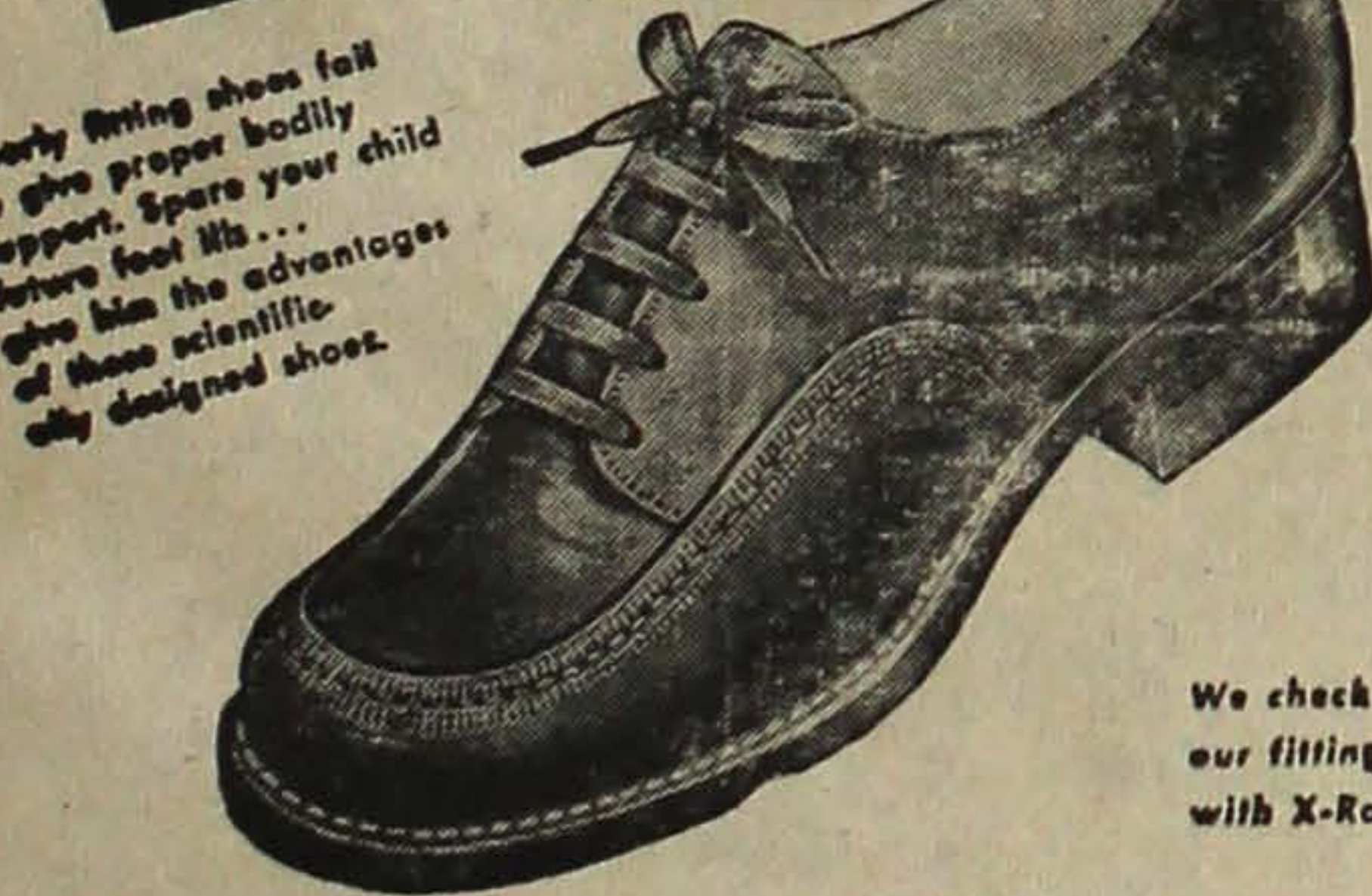

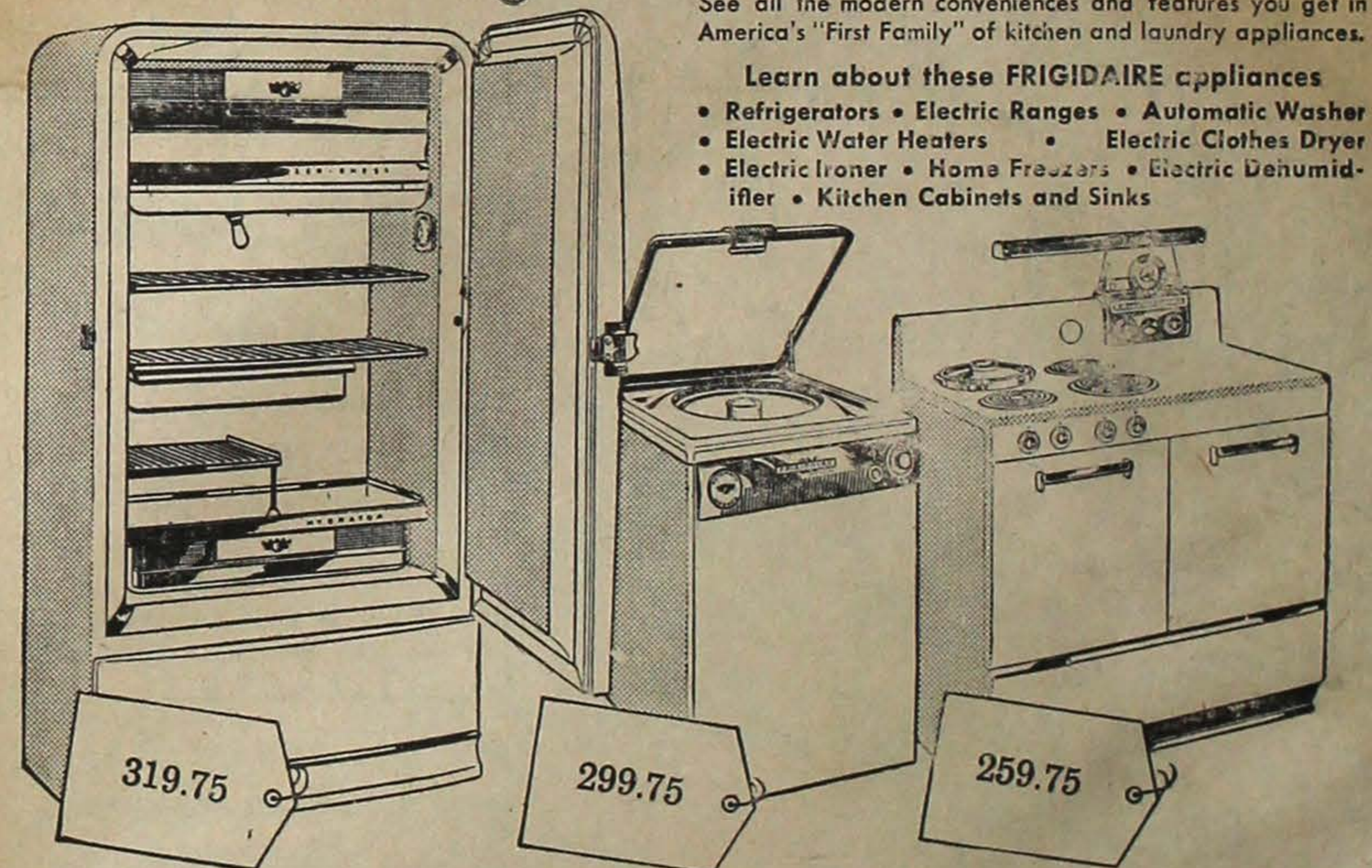
