



The appropriation is the first to 9:45 a.m.—Special Sunday School be authorized under Public Law 886, the JACL ADC endorsed evacuation claims law passed last year It is part of the Department of Justice's multi-million dollar budget requests.

The \$1,200,000 fund was approved by the House as part of the Justice Department's regular appropriations for the next fiscal year which begins July 1. The bill stipulated that \$1,000,000 will be used for payment of claims, and \$200,000 is for administrative expenses.

For the agricultural lands owned by Japanese residents abroad (including those of dual nationality), however, the application of the said provisions was delayed. But it has been decided this time that the agricultural lands owned by all Japanese residents abroad who are registered as Japanese nationals in the records ("koseki") of Japan, as of the date of enactment of the said law concerning Special Measures for Establishment of Owner Farmers, namely, October 21, 1946, should be purchased.

It is provided, however, that perto the Japanese government (minister of Agriculture and Forestry) within a period of twelve months from the date of purchase, together with the documents issued by the official authorities concerned which are competent enough to prove the fact, and that the Japanese govern-

When the Japanese government has purchased any agricultural lands owned by fananese residents. abroad, the writs of purchase of such lands will be sent direct to the owners of such lands by registered mail from the governors of Tokyo metropolis, Hokkaido or other prefectures concerned, as may be the case, together with inquiries whether or not those owners are holders of Japanese nationality. It is suggested, however, that the application for cancellation of purchase, as mentioned above, may be presented together with relevant documents, immediately instead of waiting for the arrival of the said writs of purchase.

It is to be added that the amounts paid as consideration for the agriernment will have officially to be 18 deposited for safe-keeping.

JACL ADC Will Take Strong Stand To Fight Segregation in Army

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13---, ADC Washington office by Monday, appear before the President's Com- fore the committee. mittee on Equality for Treatment and Opportunity in the Armed Services to oppose the principle of segregation in the armed forces.

Japanese Americans fought in Europe as a segregated unit - the famed 442nd Regimental Combat Team - which won more combar awards and decorations, including presidential unit citations, than any similar unit in combat during World War II.

However, as Mike Masaoka, JACL ADC legislative director and wartime member of the regiment observed: "One of the very things many of us fought for was the right to non-segregated service in all the armed forces - including the air corps, marines and navy - as well as the right to equal promotions."

Masaoka urged that Nisei veterans and servicemen who wish to present their point or view to the committee should write immediately to:
