JACL ADC Will Take Strong Stand To Fight Segregation in Army

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13—The JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee announced today it would appear before the President's Committee on Equality of Treatment and Opportunity in the Armed Services to oppose the principle of segregation in the armed forces.

Japanese Americans fought in Europe as a segregated unit — the famed 442nd Regimental Combat Team — which won more combat awards and decorations, including presidential unit citations, than any similar unit in combat during World War II.

However, as Mike Masaoka, JACL ADC legislative director and wartime member of the regiment observed: "One of the very things many of us fought for was the right to non-segregated service in all the armed forces — including the air corps, marines and navy — as well as the right to equal promotions."

Masaoka urged that Nisei veterans and servicemen who wish to present their views to the committee should write immediately to:

Committee" be changed to "Board of Trustees" wherever it appears to conform to the wording used in the Articles of Incorporation.

3. That the following be added to Article IV — Board of Trustees. Section 2 Term of Office: "If a member of the board of trustees fails to attend three consecutive meetings, without reason which the board shall deem satisfactory, he may be dropped from membership in this group by action of the board. In such a case, the board shall declare his position vacant and shall fill the vacancy as provided in Article IV, Section 5."

Only members whose affiliation fees have been paid, either individually or by the organization they represent, will be given ballots.

The feature of the meeting will be the "International Smorgasbord" dinner which will be served at 6:30 p.m.

Members who for any reason are unable to attend the dinner may participate in the election and the program which will begin at 8 p.m.

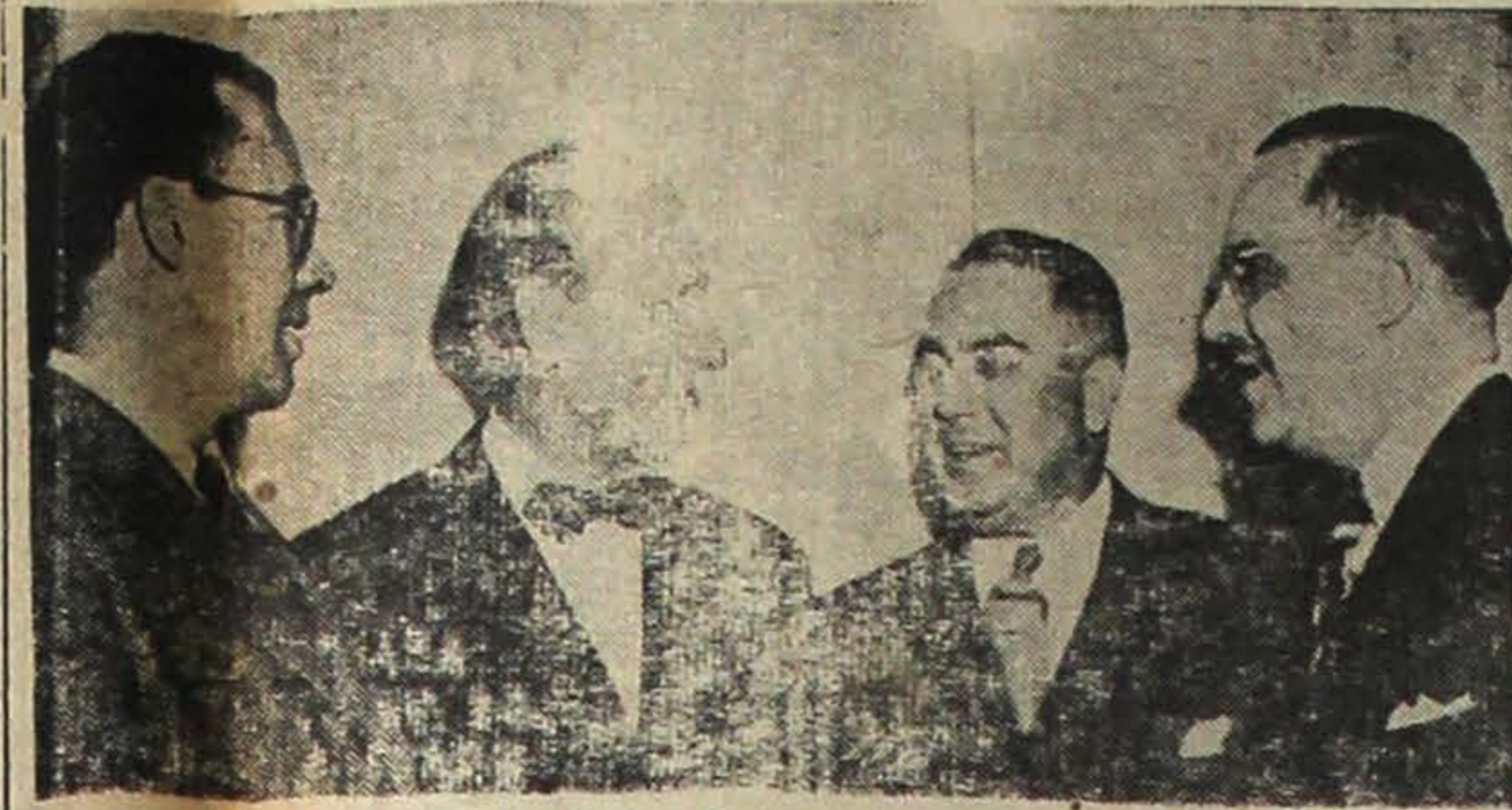

Says Russia May Have Atomic Weapons

U. W. Prof. Ballis Will Discuss 'What Makes Russia Tick?'

The second part of the University of Washington's popular series on "What Can We Do About Russia?" will open Thursday, April 14, and will be concerned with conditions inside the Soviet Union. The series, sponsored by the Adult Education and Political Science Departments with the Institute of Pacific Relations is held in the theatre of the new downtown center, Eighth and Bell Streets, at 8 p.m.

Opening speaker Thursday, with the topic "What Makes Russia Tick?" will be Professor William B. Ballis, who teaches Russian Government and Politics on the staff of the Far Eastern and Russian Institute at the University.

Prof. Ballis is one of the Northwest's best qualified speakers on the

subject of Russia, according to Charles Rockwood, IPR's executive secretary who planned the lecture series with the help of Dr. Raymond B. Allen, who is president of both the University and the IPR. Prof. Ballis was sent as Assistant Naval Attache to the American Embassy in Moscow during the war.

His talk will be followed on the next two successive Thursday evenings by Dr. Ivar Spector, lecturing on "Public Opinion in the USSR," and by the famous photographer, Julien Bryan, who will come from Washington, D. C., to show his late film, "Inside Russia", a rare and unusual color movie of life behind the Iron Curtain.

There will be a modest charge for single talks in the series and a special rate for the three. Tickets are on sale at Harry Hartman's Book Store, and at the Downtown Adult Education Center.

Nisei Hockey Star, 17, Placed On Pro Boston Bruins' List

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Canada, April 13 (New Canadian Dispatch)—Seventeen-year-old Frankie Toyota, star right-winger of the St. Catharines Lions, 1948 all-Ontario juvenile champions, has been placed on the Boston Bruins' negotiation list. This is the first time that a Nisei has been considered for a professional hockey contract.

He was scouted and signed by Harold "Baldy" Cotton, former NHL player with the Toronto Maple Leafs and the disbanded New York Americans. Cotton is presently known as one of the commentators on the Saturday evening coast-to-coast hockey broadcast. He is regarded as an astute scout with a keen eye for budding talent.

To be placed on the negotiation list does not mean that he will be offered a professional contract but it is a step in that direction. This means that no other NHL team can attempt to sign him.

As each team may have only a specified number of amateur players on the list, only players showing definite promise are chosen. Thus young Frankie Toyota is considered a future Bruin hopeful.

From now on, he will be watched closely by Boston. They may invite him to tryouts. If the management feels that he is worth signing then he will be offered a contract as a prospective Bruin. This will not necessarily be a professional contract unless they feel he is ready, but this will make him the property of the Boston Bruins

as a hockey player. Currently his team, the Lions, are engaged in the O.M.H.A. best-of-five juvenile playoffs with the Marlboro juveniles. At the Maple Leaf Gardens on April 1, the Lions took a 2-0 lead as they whipped the little Marlboros 6-1. Toyota scored one goal.

He has one more year of juvenile play but he will try out for the St. Catharines Teepees of the OHA Junior A League, considered to be one of the top junior leagues in Canada. This league has produced more Memorial Cup winners than any other loop.

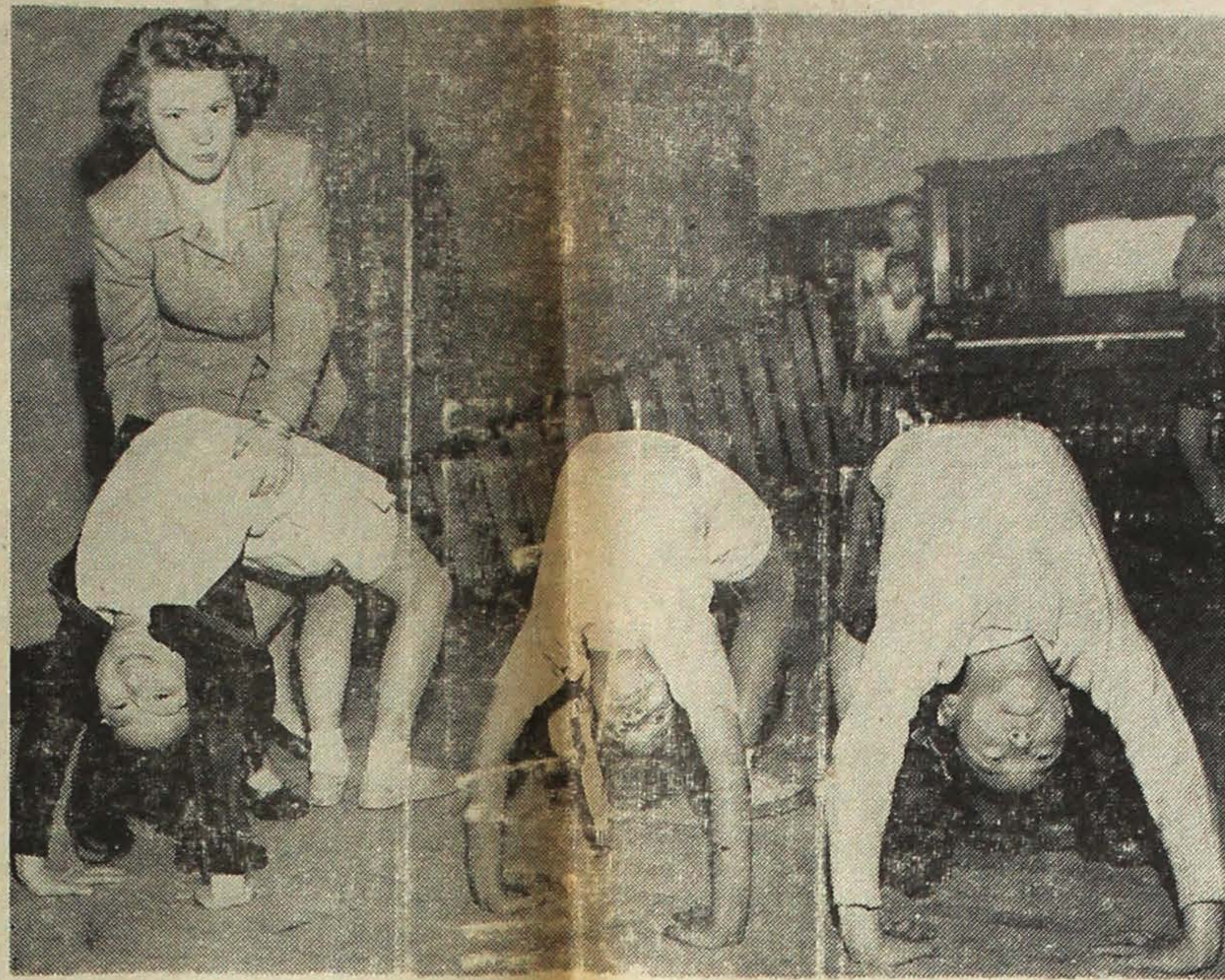
Frank is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Daigoro Toyota of St. Catharines. He is a second year student at St. Catharines Collegiate.

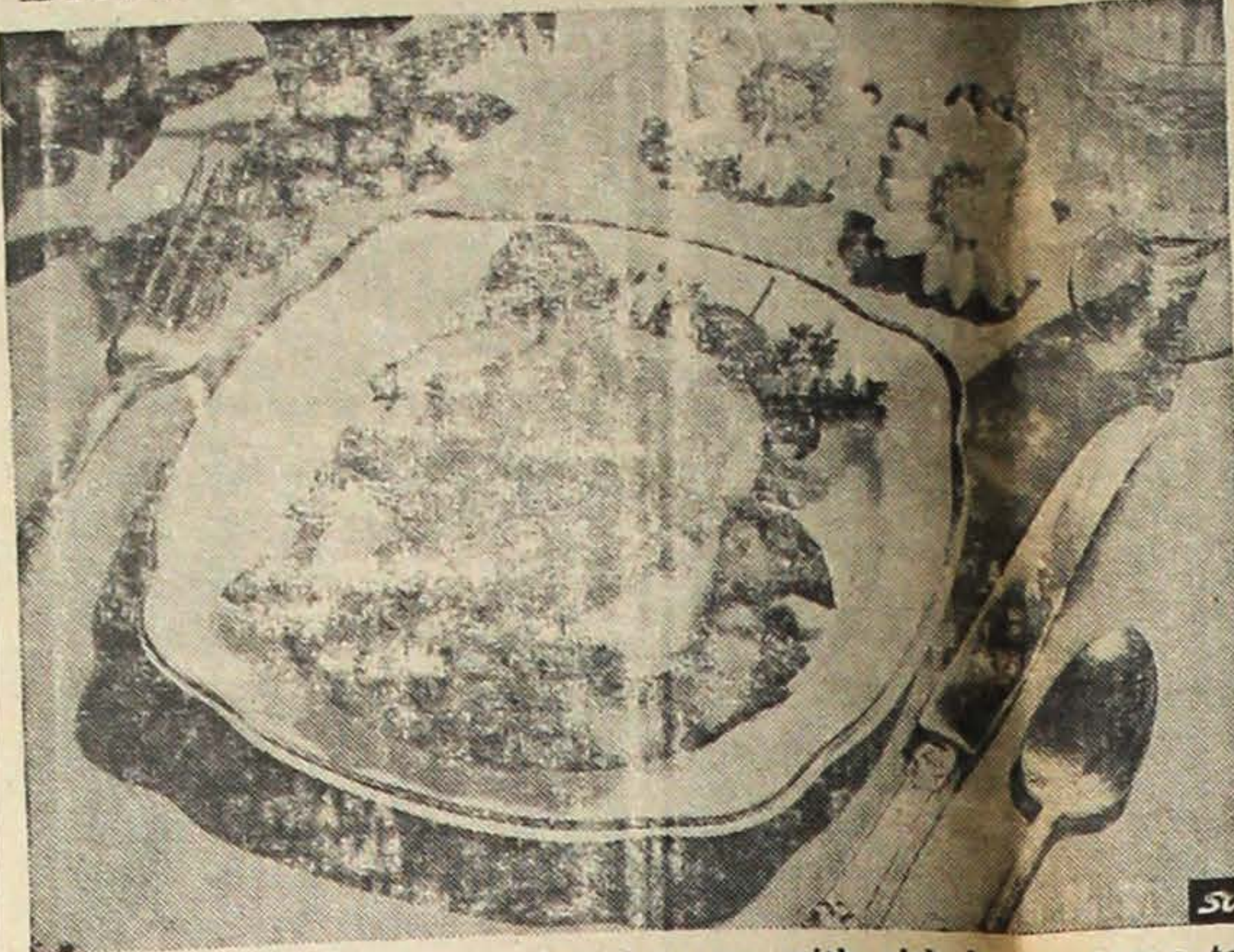

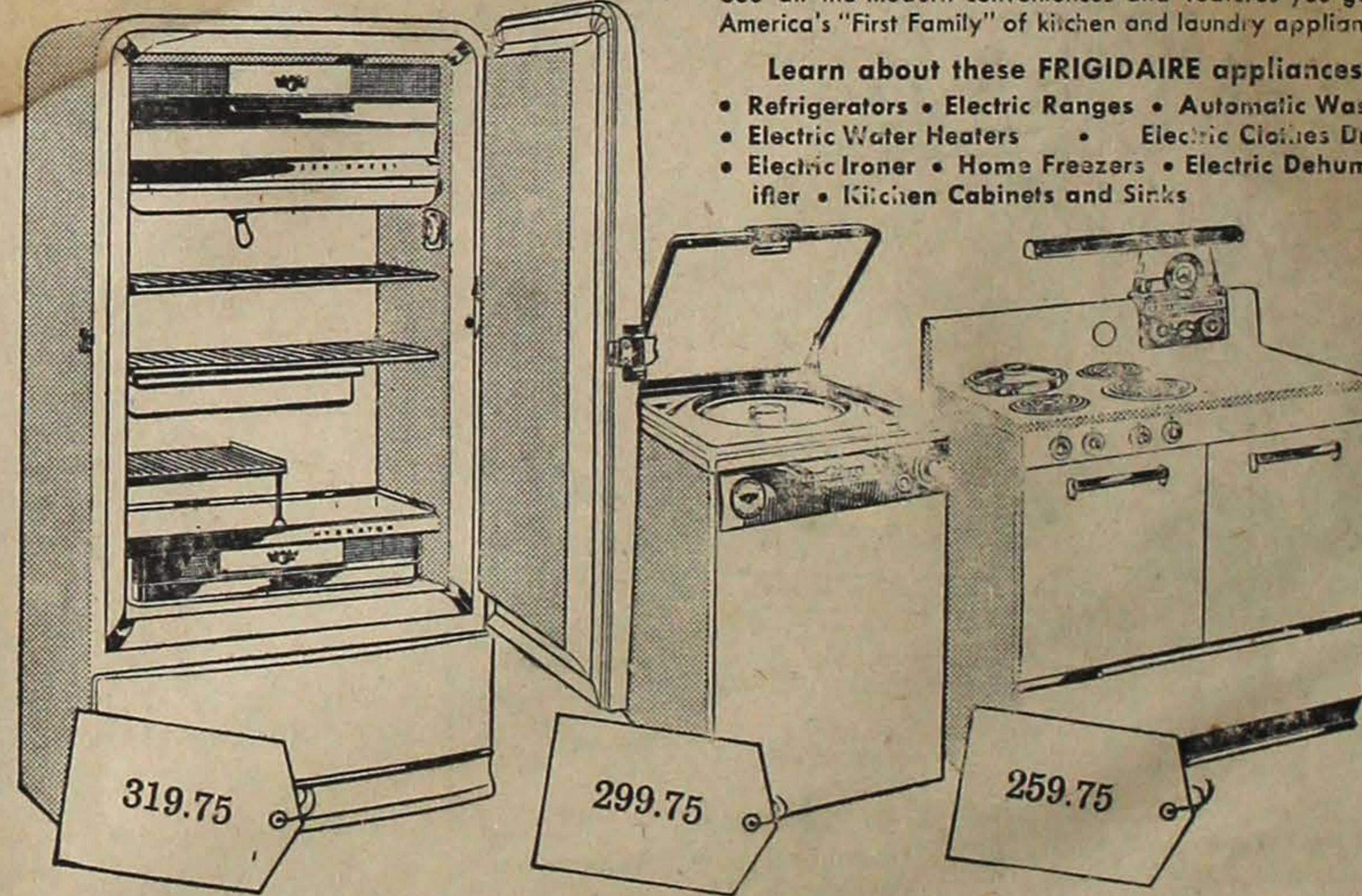
