WHEREAS. Approximately 4,000 Chicago residents of Japanese extraction are not entitled to exercise the rights of citizenship in this city or country because of discriminatory action on the part of Congress in 1924; and

WHEREAS, Some 33,000 sons of these and other Japanese-Ameri cans courageously demonstrated their loyalty to this country by serving in the armed forces during the last war; and

WHEREAS, The President's committee on Civil Rights in its report in 1948, recognized the inequality and injustice of barring these longtime residents of this country from the rights of citizenship; be therefore
