

RELIGIOUS, CIVIC LEADERS  
BACK JUDD'S LEGISLATION,  
JACL MIDWEST WORKER SAYS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 4—Outstanding religious and civic leaders expressed their active interest and support for the House-passed bill, H.R. 199, the Judd bill for equality in naturalization and immigration which is now pending in the United States Senate, reports Tats Kushiida, Midwest Regional JACL Representative, who recently spent several days in this city.

Dr. Oscar C. Johnson, president of the World Baptist Alliance, Bishop William Scarlett of the Missouri Episcopal Diocese and a national sponsor of JACL, Bishop Ivan Lee Holt (Methodist), Rev. Francis J. Corley, S. J., executive and editor of the Institute of Social Order of Archbishop Joseph E. Ritter's Queen's Work (Catholic) and Rabbi Ferdinand Isserman of Temple Israel made strong appeals to Senator Forrest C. Donnell (R., Mo.), member of the Senate's subcommittee on immigration in charge of H. R. 199, to give the bill immediate and favorable consideration.

Robert J. Kratky, prominent attorney and member of the St. Louis JACL, John R. Stockham, another attorney who was awarded the distinction as the "outstanding citizen of St. Louis for 1948", Jerome F. Duggan, member of the national Americanization committee of the American Legion, and State Senator Michael Kinney also sent appeals for action on behalf of H. R. 199.

Other individuals and organizations contacted by Kushiida which resulted in similar action were Mrs. Vanderbilt, executive secretary, and Mrs. L. Mathews Werner, president of the St. Louis League of Women Voters; Dr. Sidney E. Sweet, dean

of Christ Church Cathedral and chairman of the social action commission of the St. Louis Council of Churches; and John Lanier Donnell, son of Senator Forrest C. Donnell, who indicated his sympathetic interest for the Judd bill in a letter to his father.

The ST. LOUIS POST DISPATCH, famed Pulitzer newspaper, carried a story in its April 15 edition outlining the beneficial effects which passage of H. R. 199 would bring about by eliminating racial restrictions in our naturalization and immigration laws. The ST. LOUIS STAR TIMES editorially expressed its satisfaction with the passage of the Judd bill by the House of Representatives in early March.

Chi City Council  
Also Approves

CHICAGO, Ill., May 4 — The City Council of Chicago on Friday, April 22, 1949, memorialized the Eighty-First Congress to pass H. R. 199, reports Tats Kushiida, Midwest Regional Representative.

This unprecedented action by the Windy City's legislative body on behalf of Japanese-Americans was the result of a resolution jointly introduced by Aldermen Robert E. Merriam (5th Ward), William H. Harvey (2nd Ward), Francis J. Hogan (6th Ward) and Benjamin M. Becker (40th Ward), and passed at the City Council's session on April 22.

The resolution follows: WHEREAS, Approximately 4,000 Chicago residents of Japanese extraction are not entitled to exercise the rights of citizenship in this city or country because of discriminatory action on the part of Congress in 1924; and

WHEREAS, Some 33,000 sons of these and other Japanese-Americans courageously demonstrated their loyalty to this country by serving in the armed forces during the last war; and

WHEREAS, The President's committee on Civil Rights in its report in 1948, recognized the inequality and injustice of barring these long-time residents of this country from the rights of citizenship; be it therefore

RESOLVED, That the City Council of the City of Chicago do hereby petition the Congress of the United States to enact into law H. R. 199 which will give to Americans of Japanese origin who came to this country prior to 1924, the full rights of citizenship of which they have been denied up to this time; be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to Senators Lucas and Douglas, and to the Chicago delegation in the House of Representatives.

## Favors H. R. 199

CHICAGO, Ill., May 4 — The City Club of Chicago, a highly reputed, non-partisan, civic body, this week urged the United States Senate to give immediate and favorable consideration to H. R. 199, the Judd bill for equality in naturalization and immigration, it was learned from the JACL-ADC Midwest Regional office, whose representative recently spoke before the Club's race relations committee.

The City Club's action reaffirms its position in 1948 when similar action was taken. In 1947, the club also passed a resolution endorsing the JACL-ADC legislative program.

## Evacuation Claims Queries, Replies

This is the 25th and last in a series of questions and answers on evacuation claims prepared by Edward J. Ennis, special JACL ADC counsel, and released as a public service by the Washington Office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee.

Since September 30, 1948, when this series began, 139 questions dealing with every aspect of the law have been answered.

When precedents for the determination of claims are established, and regulations and rules for the processing and payment of claims are announced by the Department of Justice, the Washington Office will resume this service.

If any claimant is interested in the complete series of questions and answers, it is suggested that he contact his nearest JACL chapter. Every chapter has a special notebook containing this series and other pertinent information on the filing of evacuation claims.

1. What if my claim for less than \$2500 is recognized by the Department of Justice after the million dollars appropriated for small claims is used up?

A. The million dollars appropriation is not necessarily the last one. If the awards of claims under \$2500 exhaust this sum, the Department of Justice will request additional appropriations from Congress. There is nothing in the appropriations act or the evacuation claims law that limits the total congressional appropriations to this one million dollars.

2. What can I do if I think that my claim is larger than the Department of Justice is willing to give me?

A. Under the law, on claims of \$2500 or less, there is no appeal beyond the Attorney General. If the Attorney General allows more than \$2500, but the figure is still less than the amount the claimant

believes he is entitled to, it is presumed that the claimant may make representations to Congress for a larger amount.

3. If my claim as allowed by the Attorney General is over \$2500, who will prepare the necessary legislation for the submission of my claim to Congress for its approval?

A. It is presumed that the Department of Justice will prepare whatever legislation is necessary to take care of all claims over the \$2500 which the Attorney General may authorize.

4. If I have a claim for \$1800 and the Department of Justice disallows or dismisses my claim without any award, what recourse do I have?

A. Under the law, you have none. 5. May a person insist upon a hearing before his claim is adjudicated?

A. Section 3 (a) of the law reads: "The Attorney General shall give reasonable notice to the interested parties and an opportunity for them to be heard and to present evidence before making a final determination upon any claim."

6. If a person is in doubt about his claim, what should he do?

A. File the claim. The Department of Justice will inform you if the claim is not proper, or the amount excessive.

7. Is the Washington Office satisfied with the way the Department of Justice is handling this program up to date?

A. Yes. We are convinced that those who have been assigned to process evacuation claims by the Attorney General are sincere, conscientious men who, with the cooperation of the claimants, will process all claims with efficiency and a sympathetic regard for the evacuee claimant within the dictates of the law and government procedures.

Japan Watches  
Congress Moves

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4—Every action by Congress, no matter how slight concerning legislation for equality in immigration and naturalization, is noted with sharp interest by the Japanese press.

This was the observation today of Esther L'Elcuse, former public relations director for the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee and now an editor with the Allied Translator and Interpreter Service in Japan. Her job is editing a daily rewrite bulletin of Japanese press comments.

In the United States on temporary leave, Miss L'Elcuse, during a visit to the Washington JACL ADC office, said:

"It's amazing how closely the Japanese press watches activity by Congress concerning legislation of interest to Japan. This is particularly true of legislation on immigration and naturalization. 'Just the fact that such legislation was introduced was enough to make front page reading in Japan.'"

Miss L'Elcuse said she recalled an editorial in a leading Japanese daily which pointed out that "even the consideration of such legislation is winning friends for the United States at a time when that country and Russia both are fighting for support of the people of the Orient."

Miss L'Elcuse said she would visit friends on the west coast for several days before returning to Japan.

Three of the speakers to be heard are officials in the governments of their country. They are Senator Michele Giusa, professor of chemistry at the University of Turin and one of Italy's leading scientists, now a member of the Italian Senate; Deputy Pierre Cot, member of the French Parliament who has been in the French government for more than 20 years, was cabinet member in seven different administrations; H. Lester Hutchinson, member of the English Parliament who spent years in India where he became national vice-president of the Indian Textile Workers Union and the Indian Railwaymen's Union.

The two women speakers are Mrs. Mimi Sverdrup Lundén, noted Norwegian author and teacher who has travelled and lectured in nearly every country in Europe, including an official visit to the British Isles in 1946 and Miss Sonja Branting, Swedish attorney and outstanding advocate of peace who is the daughter of the famous Swedish statesman, Hjalmar Branting, Nobel Prize winner and first Labor Party Prime Minister of Sweden.

The Forum group, which will speak in 15 cities in America, was invited here by Henry A. Wallace, who will be moderator of the Forum series. All leaders of millions of peoples in their countries, they come to ask and offer cooperation for peace and earnest effort to remove the threat of war from the world.

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

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## Kansas Citians OK Judd Bill

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 4—Well-known Kansas Citians have lent support to the Judd bill for equality in naturalization and immigration, it was reported by Tats Kishida, Midwest Regional Representative, who visited the home metropolis of President Truman earlier this month.

Requests that H. R. 199 be scheduled for immediate hearings were sent by them to Sen. Forrest C. Donnell, Republican member of the two-man Senate Subcommittee on Immigration in charge of the bill. It was made known by the JACI-ADC representative, who was employed in Kansas City with the War Relocation Authority in 1944.

Herman Langworthy, Sr., distinguished attorney who served as chairman of the board of election commissioners under Donnell during his governorship, Orville Anderson, Donnell's campaign manager in Kansas City, Frank Tyler, president of the Council of World Affairs, Charles Shafer, chairman of the Americanism Committee of the American Legion in Kansas City and Beach Musser, chairman of the Americanization Committee of the Junior Chamber of Commerce were among many who expressed their personal and organizational interests in this legislation.

Mrs. Maynor Brock, executive director of the Naturalization Council of Kansas City, whose thirty constituent organizations include the American Association of University Women, the American Legion, the Junior C. of C., the League of Women Voters and many religious and labor groups, was helpful in urging the passage of H. R. 199 in the House of Representatives and continues, through the organization, to support the bill in the Senate.

Bryce B. Smith, former mayor of Kansas City, and intimate friend of President Truman, indicated his strong personal interest in the Judd bill and has urged the President to request immediate action on it. H. J. Haskell, editor of the KANSAS CITY STAR, the city's only newspaper whose influence extends over several neighboring states, expressed the paper's support for the Judd bill in its editorial columns for Sunday, April 17.

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
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
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
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
